- 11:00 am** - **Worship (Book of Common Prayer) with Communion, organ and piano, and the St. Mary's Magnificat Choir**

St. Mary's will worship in their normal style so that we can understand them better as a faith community. This will be an important day, since we are actively engaged in conversations with St. Mary's (along with St. Luke's) about a possible consolidation of our congregations.

And please understand that this invitation is not about whether or not you plan to come with us, should we consolidate with St. Mary's. It's about ALL of us being welcomed by a neighboring Episcopal community. So join us!

## From Fr. William Heisley The gift of rebirth

Winter gets a bad rap. Long faces as the days lengthen betray dark attitudes about what is happening to the earth. Off-handed comments about how cold weather is coming much earlier than is necessary betray a chilling of hope. Images of darkness beckon us to search for the evil that lurks in the shadows. This is winter.

Recently I read something written by a woman who has a very different way of thinking about, feeling about, winter. I think of it as a wholistic Christian way. (I'd tell you who the writer is and where I read it and I'd quote the piece, if I could remember/find it. Sorry.) Her perspective on winter is not that it is isolating and ominous,

but rather that it is God's way of slowing the world – slowing us – for a time of reflection, rest, and recreation. Winter, in her view, is a gift to the natural world and therefore a gift to each of us.

I have never been able to voice such ideas. But they resonate deeply in me. I am often seen as a human aberration in that I love

winter. I love that I have good reason to be inside and to read and to cook comfort food. I love that the nights are long and the depth of the darkness is often so great that a myriad of stars sparkle in contrast to the heavenly sphere. But this author's ideas are a gift to us.

I had a friend in college who loathed winter. He even hated autumn because it indicated that winter was coming and they both said death to him. (He became a Baptist pastor.) But winter is not about death. At least

it's not only about death. It's about the cycles of God's beautiful creation: birth, childhood, youth, adulthood, being a senior, death, and...rebirth. Our northern hemisphere cycles remind us of God's participation in our human cycles and in all of our living in palpable ways. And it is beautiful.

Winter can be very difficult for some people, it is true. I am always sad to hear stories about seasonal affect disorder because I understand that this is a huge problem. And I am always delighted to hear that people handle their difficulty with light boxes, and other therapies. I'm not saying that winter should be easy for or liked by everyone. I'm only saying that we live in a world of cycles and that God is intimately involved in them.

The Church lives deeply immersed in cycles also. We now enter into the beginning of the Church Year, Advent. We long for the coming of the infant Jesus, for the rebirth of light, for the promise of warmth and growth. All over again, just like every year, we start at the beginning of the cycle and it becomes for us a cycle that gives life.

St. James is deeply immersed in this

cycle, too, but this year in a unique way. We begin our new Church Year not knowing where we will end it. We long for the coming of the infant Jesus to bless and guide us in our pilgrimage to a destination off the Parkway. We pray for enlightenment every step of the way that will take us to wherever. And we have a profound longing for the warmth of welcome as we become a new people, growing in Christ with others.

**It's about becoming.  
We are becoming.**

Winter gets a bad rap. Embrace it – in whatever way works for you – as an expression of God's love for creation, for each of us, and for St. James on the Parkway. It's all about becoming. We are becoming.

## Transitions What to say?

News that St. James is closing is out-and-about. And, with increasing frequency, we're all faced with the question of what to say when people ask what's going on. As we each figure out our answers, there's one fact to be clear about. "We'll close our building on June 30, but not our community. In fact, we're working hard to make sure that the mission, ministries and people of St. James continue."

Beyond that, there's so much we can each talk about. Depending on the circumstances, our own feelings may be paramount. "St. James has been so much a part of my family's life. I'm devastated to think we have to give up the beauty of the Parkway." "In reality, the mood at St. James is up-beat and fun-filled. We're all working on this together, and in many ways, we're loving it." "Day by day, I don't know how I feel. So often we're all laughing and loving our work together. Then, from nowhere, I'm fighting back tears." "Anyone who's ever had any responsibility for our building feels, most of all, an enormous sense of relief."

In recent weeks I've said, or heard others say, all of the above. Bottom line is that we all have our own feelings. And sometimes we'll share those with friends and colleagues who ask about St. James.

Or maybe our feelings are irrelevant to a conversation. Maybe the situation calls for some version of the explanation: "We'll likely consolidate with another Episcopal church. That'll mean leaving our building but taking with us the people, ministries, traditions, puppets and candlesticks of St. James. For lots of reasons, not everyone will choose to be part of that. But the chance to make ourselves and others stronger, really does feel like a chance for re-birth."

Each conversation presents its own opportunity to share your perspective on what we're involved in. But, for me, I enter into each with a sense of pride for who we are and what we mean to one another. We all know that a church is more than its building. The people of St. James are living evidence — of real people, in real time, figuring out what that means.

# Financial Report: October 31, 2019

Through October, our budget is roughly where we expected it to be in total. Pledge payments were about \$3,300 below budget, while other income was about \$700 over budget.

Total expenses ran about \$2,700 lower than budget. All expenses relating to the Big Mess have now been paid, as well as the replacement of the furnace that heats the space our Mandala school tenant occupies. Result: an end-of-October operating

deficit of \$25,514, essentially right on our budget estimates.

Our cash balance has fallen almost \$50 thousand since the beginning of the fiscal year, and it looks likely that the cash reserve to cover a deficit will be further eroded by year-end. Think warm thoughts to keep utility bills down and keep those pledges up to date to help us finish the year close to our budget.

The Dahl Fund balance stands at \$352,313.

**Non-budget Restricted Funds:** Non-budget restricted balances on September 30 totaled \$21,827, as follows: Mary Anderson Better Space \$112; Piotrowski-Music \$693; Piotrowski-Altar \$1,754; Haiti \$15,509; Tri-Faith \$3,638; Priest's Discretion \$121.

As you know, the focus of our decade-long partnership with the parish of Bonne Nouvelle in Bigonet, Haiti, has always supported Bonne Nouvelle School. Known for academic excellence and for welcoming all children in the area, regardless of their families' ability to pay tuition, the school was the community's first and biggest priority following the devastating 2010 earthquake. Support from St. James helped enable Bonne Nouvellians to not only rebuild the school but, over the next few years, add several new grades.

That hasn't changed: wherever St. James's upcoming transition takes us, the Haiti Committee remains


committed to helping the school continue to survive and thrive.

Meanwhile, Bonne Nouvellians have painstakingly planned, saved, and slowly begun rebuilding the community's center: Bonne Nouvelle Church, reduced to rubble in 2010. They've gradually started work on a building that, like its predecessor, will serve as so much more than a place of worship. A new building, constructed with local skill and pride, will renew our friends' confidence to do what they've done before: to model the transformational power of listening to and learning from one another, to recommit themselves to God's Beloved Community.

Financial support for this endeavor is outside the boundaries of our parish partnership, focused – by mutual agree-

ment – on supporting the school. We're hoping that, rather than giving money to the church reconstruction, St. Jamesians can advance this effort by marshaling the support of friends, neighbors, and family members.

Simply put, please share this online fundraiser with folks in your circle of family and friends who might be moved to give. \$6 buys one rebar (reinforcing bar). \$12 buys four spools of wire. \$25 buys one bag of washed sand. \$50 buys seven bags of cement, and \$100 buys four bags of gravel. 
