Clergy Report:

Rector's Report (Dr. Blaess):

Dr. Blaess invited the Church to think about groups are formed, especially how Christian groups are formed, including a cycle of sharing a sense of belonging, common behavior, and common beliefs. People typically join a Christian Group because of a sense of belonging. They have a friend who comes to Church are start going to Church and begin to share those beliefs and behavior.

We need to think about how to make "onramps" for people to begin joining our group. Kristine stated she believes the best bang for the buck is to give people a sense of belonging.

The safety committee has been meeting. The City's new homeless taskforce has caused the people who used to camp places where we did not see to relocate such that they are more visible throughout the day.

Sgt. Higgins with the MPD has said that a lot of people who have been homeless are now being homed which is a good thing. We have people camping on the campus. The church now keeps logs of interactions with those people which helps if there is an issue later with people who become a problem.

We have placed no trespassing and no loitering signs at the doors where there has been a problem. Those signs give the police authority to keep people moving along. We have not put signs on the front porch because there are three people known to the Church who are stable and while we do not allow them to stay there, we do not run them off.

We are scheduling de-escalation training for ushers, coldest nights volunteers, and other people who want to attend.

People have been pretty good about getting off of our property in the mornings.

Kristine said a long-term staffing goal is to add a part time position for a director of pastoral care. They would also like to hire a part time director of children's and family ministry.

Kristine presented a strategic plan into the year 2025.



Worship Report July 2022

Music

- We had two responses in the search for an Organ Scholar one was not acceptable, the other too inexperienced.
 - The search continues.
- Allison Blumenthal has stepped down as chorister director due to a shift in her career. Nancy Bieschke will step into the position.
 - Considering moving choristers back to Wednesday because Nancy lives in Mt Juliet and working on what to do with beginning choristers.

Verger/Acolytes

- Only one adult and two youth responded to the call for additional acolytes.
 George Carlson will continue to reach out to the parish in August, once everyone is back to school an in a regular routine.
- No update at this time on investigating the possibility of reducing the Gospel side rail by one section against the wall to allow chancel entry/exit on both sides.

Altar Guild

 Sue Koechlein has retired as co-chair as of May. Gina Garner is the new co-chair with the continuing Marth Worley.

Lector/Eucharistic Ministers

- The 7:30 service is short for EMs, but clergy have improvised.
- Due to difficulty scheduling four EMs for each of the 8:45 and 11:00 services, the schedule has cut back to two at each service instead of four, at least until the fall.

Tech Team

- Streaming- the streaming team is doing a great job delivering live services for St. Paul's.
 - There are some technical issues with the equipment's autofocusing ability and the camera management software that the support company is working on resolving.
- Parish Hall Projector is nearing the end of its lifespan, dim and renders poor color reproduction. Audio Video Elements quote for a laser projector is \$4,248.95.
 - Estimate attached.
- Communion-Time Intercessory Prayer Prayer is powerful, and especially so when we pray with and for each other. St. Paul's has a long and impactful history of prayer ministry, including the incredible faithfulness of our Daughters of the King.
 - This autumn we prototype this new ministry of listening to the Holy Spirit and praying for members of our church family. During the 11 a.m. service beginning August 14 through September 25 we will host prayer stations during our communion distribution.

- There will be two stations each Sunday -- one near the piano and the other in the baptismal nook. Each station will have a team of two prayer ministers who will pray for anyone who comes for prayer after they receive communion.
 - The prayer team might pray for each person for a minute or 90 seconds.
 - Ten parishioners, so far, have volunteered to be a part of the prayer team.
- O At the end of September, we'll evaluate to see what we have learned, discern if the ministry should continue or expand to other services, and see what tweaks should be made.
- Lectio Divina/Centering Prayer after the loss of Nancy Carter
 - o To be followed with small groups, such as reunion groups.
 - Lectio Divina with Judy Brookshire and three others.
 - Centering Prayer with Kristi Hay and four others.

Thoughts and Comments from members of the Pastoral Ministry;

Jennifer Mcguire, Church Nurse - Still seeing Cate Stogner weekly. Had a couple of phone calls this month.

Cathy Sniderman, Home Visits - Four personal Holy Eucharists were brought to parishioners during the month.

Sandy Gleaver, Ushers and DoK - It's really a struggle to build back up our usher roster. Lance Ikard is switching from 11am to 8:45am service and I asked him to see if he can commandeer additional ushers for the 8:45 services. We have 9 ushers for the 7:30 service, 9 ushers for the 8:45 service and 15 for the 11 service. The ideal would be 12 ushers for the early services and 20 for the 11 service.

I am currently working on the next 3 month usher schedule and pulling together the DoK monthly meeting for July 16th.

Jerry Reddick, Grief Ministry - I feel very blessed that I have the honor and privilege of chairing this ministry. I emphasis the time (not the energy or emotional investment) only to let you as the vestry know what is involved in providing this amazing ministry.

To provide an example of the versatility of this ministry: June 3 brought the visitation prior to funeral for Tue Radcliff with interment in the outside columbarium: June 24 was an interment for 2 former members in the inside columbarium with light refreshments provided for the family members who came: June 2 was the memorial service for Gina Garner's mother who died in another state. The

reception was held for family and those attending the service immediately after; On June 25 Nancy Carter died and almost the entire week was devoted to preparations for the visitation and service for her which took place on July 1 and 2. As the visitation for approximately 400 persons and approximately 60 family members was held at St. Paul's this involved much coordination regarding funeral home, florists, family, and various members of the funeral reception committee and clergy. The record shows we participated in 4 events-all very different, but all just as important.

While this was not a typical month, I would venture that it took for than 100 hours on the part myself and those involved directly and indirectly(hosting phone calls, planning shopping activities, preparing food, cleaning up and preparing the spaces, attending to family, etc.) during these events. This does not include time spent by other ministries.

This ministry exists because it is an extension of the St. Paul's community in showing our love, respect and hospitality. We are part of the sacramental ministry of the Body of Christ. It is done prayerfully and with great love and devotion by a core group who are helped by several others as the need indicated.
