


Julia Robson -- In Action



Julia Robson (Waukesha County Parks Conservation Biologist) has over ten years of experience working in natural-resource management. She has worked throughout the Midwest on various projects including multi-taxa biodiversity assessments, habitat restoration, environmental education and community engagement, and environmental planning.

Before coming to Waukesha County in April of 2018, she worked for the Urban Ecology Center for three years and Milwaukee County Parks for over seven years. In addition to her full-time professional work, Julia also serves on several conservation-related boards and committees including the Southeastern Wisconsin Invasive Species Consortium, the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory, Friends of the Cedarburg Bog, Midwest Partners in Amphibian and Reptile Conservation, and WCLC's land-management committee.

In 2016, Julia's community-based wetland-monitoring program, which she developed for Milwaukee County Parks, was awarded the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' Citizen-Based Monitoring Program of the Year award. In 2017, she was named the Public Policy Forum's "Jean B. Tyler Leader of the Future." Julia graduated from the University of Wisconsin–Milwaukee (UW–M) in 2012 with a BS in biological sciences and a BS in conservation and environmental sciences, and in 2018, she was named "Graduate of the Last Decade" by UW–M's alumni association.
