THE WORD OF GOD

THE OLD TESTAMENT | Isaiah 65:17-25

Lector: A reading from the Prophet Isaiah.

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind.

But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating; for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight.

I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress.

No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime; for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed.

They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit.

They shall not build and another inhabit; they shall not plant and another eat; for like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be, and my chosen shall long enjoy the work of their hands.

They shall not labor in vain, or bear children for calamity; for they shall be offspring blessed by the Lord -- and their descendants as well.

Before they call I will answer, while they are yet speaking I will hear.

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox; but the serpent-- its food shall be dust!

They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says the Lord.

Lector: The word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.

THE RESPONSE | Canticle 9 The First Song of Isaiah Ecce Deus The Canticle is read responsively as indicated.

Surely, it is God who saves me; I will trust in him and not be afraid.

For the Lord is my stronghold and my sure defense, and he will be my Savior.

Therefore you shall draw water with rejoicing from the springs of salvation.

And on that day you shall say, Give thanks to the Lord and call upon his Name;

Make his deeds known among the peoples; see that they remember that his Name is exalted.

Sing the praises of the Lord, for he has done great things, and this is known in all the world.

Cry aloud, inhabitants of Zion, ring out your joy, for the great one in the midst of you is the Holy One of Israel.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

THE EPISTLE 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Lector: A reading from the second letter to the Thessalonians.

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.



Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. AMEN.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.





THE GOSPEL | Luke 21:5-19

Officiant: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down."

They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, `I am he!' and, `The time is near!' Do not go after them.

"When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

"But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."

THE REFLECTION

Luke's apocalyptic Gospel this week is even more intense than Mark's version of last year. These are Jesus' last words to his disciples prior to the Passion. They serve as a prophetic warning—hard words about what is ahead for the apostles and for early Christians as well as for the temple where they are standing.

When Luke wrote this Gospel, people following Jesus had already been arrested, persecuted, and handed over to prisons. The witness of the martyrs had already begun to rival and surpass the power of the temple, destroyed by the Romans in 70 A.D.

The world still faces wars, disorder and devastation. There is likely no such thing as getting through unscathed. The question is how people of faith will respond and where we will find our refuge. We find our refuge in the enduring, loving presence of God and his son Jesus Christ. "By your endurance you will gain your souls." (Luke 21: 19.)

Through our collective stewardship, we do our part to endure -- by sustaining the ministries of St. Nicholas and helping to spread this Good News.

STEWARDSHIP FAQ OF THE DAY

Q: I don't know how much of a financial commitment to make. St. Nicholas is dear to me and I believe in our mission, but sometimes my income can be unpredictable.

A: Despite what we all learned about the necessity of "tithing" (10%) how much you pledge is something for you to prayerfully consider along with all of your household's giving. It should be an amount that makes you feel good about playing your part in the work of St. Nicholas, but which won't create an unmanageable burden on your budget. Every commitment, no matter how small, is valuable to the church and its mission; but especially one made during budgeting season. And know that if your financial circumstances change during the year, just communicate with the Parish Administrator or the Treasurer about your needs.
