

Lynn and Charles Norris Nominated for First Annual Absalom Jones Dignity Award

We are so proud to announce that Lynn and Charles Norris have been nominated for this award, which honors those who embody the mission of the Absalom Jones Center and the legacy of Rev. Absalom Jones. The recipient will be: recognized at the inaugural Dignity Awards Dinner in February, highlighted in the evening's program and celebrated across the diocese as a model of faithful, justice-centered leadership.

Lynn and Charles Norris, members of St. Nicholas Episcopal Church in Hamilton, are two of the founding members of the Community Remembrance Project Harris County, Georgia. Inspired by Striving for Justice Conversations led by Chattahoochee Valley Episcopal Ministry, The Community

Remembrance Project is committed to memorializing those whose lives were taken unjustly in terror lynchings in the county. At least nine men and one woman were lynched in Harris County between 1861 and 1947. No perpetrators were named and no charges were brought. In 2022 the Hamilton City Council passed a resolution to recognize these victims and commissioned a citizens group to create a memorial park. The group formed the non-profit Community Remembrance Project which aims to inspire and educate the public about racial injustice, ensuring truth telling and healing regarding this difficult history.

Working with the Equal Justice Initiative, Lynn, Charles, and other members of the Harris County Community Remembrance Project Board led their community to begin the steps outlined by EJI with the goal of creating a park to house the EJI memorial marker to victims in Harris County. The Hamilton City Council set aside land in 2023 for a memorial park. The Community Remembrance Project held several public conversations and events, conducted a student essay contest, sponsored trips to the EJI Legacy Museum and Memorial in Montgomery, sponsored racial trust building workshops, and committed to necessary fund raising, which is ongoing. Students from the Tuskegee School of Architecture prepared potential designs for the memorial park and the HCCRP took delivery of the park design plan from their contractor in October of 2025.

The City of Hamilton recently took control of the memorial park effort. The city has not yet explained their reasons for doing so but does say they will follow through on their commitment to create a memorial park and place the EJI marker in the city. Lynn and Charles, working through the HCCRP, continue their ministry of reconciliation by facilitating communication between EJI and the city of Hamilton. The Community Remembrance Project remains committed to truth, justice, and unity activities in Harris County; initiating a local Juneteenth celebration, offering Racial Trustbuilding workshops and other events focused on healing, hope, and relationship building across racial lines. Their website, remembranceharriscoga.org describes their ongoing work.

Lynn and Charles are involved with several racial healing initiatives in their county, in addition to the Community Remembrance Project. They credit an early version of Diocese of Atlanta Dismantling Racism Training as well as Striving for Justice conversations offered by CVEM for inspiring them to begin this work and continue it despite obstacles.
