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Academics

- Books Free, low cost, or rentable textbooks for courses on campus.
- Class Sizes Number of students per teacher that ranges from small (5 people) to large (300 people).
- Courses Classes taken for areas of study or major that align with interests.
- Internship/Co-op Student work position to gain experience in intended job field.
- Freshman Forgiveness Allowing freshman to retake course/s they got a low grade in.
- Graduation Rates Percentage of students who started college that graduate. Can be calculated by race and gender.
- Honors Program Programs or courses for high achieving students to study more complex subjects.
- Office Hours Meeting with professors at designated times outside of class for help.
- Study Areas Designated areas to study individually or as a group 24/7.
- Technology support Free computer labs, laptops, or technology needed for class.
- Transfer Policy The ease of changing from one college to another.
- Tutoring 1-on-1 academic support for a wide range of classes, can be free or low cost.

Financial

- · Accessible Scholarships Scholarships offered based on your unique circumstances or credentials.
- Appeals Formal request for more financial aid.
- Cost of Attendance Total amount of money that it costs to go to college for one year.
- Emergency funding Money for emergencies or financial hardships provided by the college.
- Fee Waivers Allows students who qualify to bypass making certain payments (i.e. applications, enrollment, housing)
- Financial Aid Support Office that deals with students scholarships, grants, bills, etc.
- Financial Literacy Workshops Workshops to educate on budgeting, finances, investing, banking, etc.
- Need-based Aid Financial aid based on financial need (i.e low income students).
- SAP Policies Satisfactory Academic Progress i.e certain GPA to maintain eligibility for financial aid.
- State/Local Aid Financial aid offered by the state or local areas to help pay for college.
- Transfer Financial Aid Money for college that can go to a different school if you decide to transfer.
- Upper Classmen Scholarships Applications for free money for students older than freshmen.

Personal/Development

- Alumni Networking Staying actively engaged with graduates of your school/program for increased relationships and opportunities.
- Career Development Offices Supports with career advising, coaching, resumes, interview skills and more to carry out career plans.
- Coaching/Mentor Programs Programs or people that support personal and professional growth and development.
- Counseling/Mental Health Professionals who support with maintaining emotional, psychological and social well-being.
- Dietary Health/Education Understanding of a healthy diet and healthy eating habits.
- Eco-Friendly Enviornmentally friendly processes to help reduce waist and pollution.
- Health and Fitness Mental, physical and social well-being.
- Housing Security Housing that is safe, affordable, quality condition and not at risk of being lost.
- · Location Type of environmental factors surrounding an area such as weather, amenities, distance etc.
- On Campus Employment A job through the college/university that is more accommodating to a students
- Research Opportunities Opportunities to earn money or credit by doing research on a specific topic or study.
- Summer Employment An opportunity to make money or gain experience over summer vacation.

Social

- Athletics/Sporting Events Events you can attend to support your school, socialize & get involved on campus.
- Commuter Experience Understanding challenges and resources to support with traveling to and from campus daily.
- Cultural Exposure An experience that helps develop a better understanding of a particular culture.
- Ethnic/Cultural Community A group of people with common identities like heritage, culture, language or religion.
- On Campus Events Events happening on campus that encourage healthy involvement in campus life.
- Program Community Interacting with peers with a common interest (i.e. major, honors college, career interest)
- Student Leadership Taking an active role in a class, organization or program to guide, motivate and inspire others.
- Student Orgs/Greek Life A group of students united for a common goal/agenda and helps students gain social and leadership skills.
- Student Social Activities Activities that provide opportunities for students to get involved and meet new people.
- Student Support Office Office that supports student success in a number of areas (tutoring, writing, counseling etc.)
- Study Abroad A chance to gain an educational experience in a foriegn country.
- · Volunteer Opportunities Unpaid opportunities to give back by using your free time to help a cause.
