#### **Academics**

- · Books Textbooks for classes that can be free or low cost.
- Class Sizes Number of students that make up how big or small a class is.
- Courses Classes that you must take for school (ex. Biology for nursing)
- Internship/Co-op Student job to gain experience in area of interest.
- Freshman Forgiveness Allowing new students to retake classes they got a low grade in.
- Graduation Rates Percentage of students who started college that graduate. Can be calculated by race and gender.
- Honors Program Classes for students who do well to study harder topics.
- · Office Hours Meeting with teachers to get help on class work.
- Study Areas Specific areas to do homework after classes.
- Technology support Free computer labs, laptops, or technology needed for class.
- Transfer Policy How easy it is to change from one college to another.
- Tutoring Private lessons on class subjects that can be free or low cost.

#### **Financial**

- · Accessible Scholarships Scholarships offered based on you, your upbringing, skills or performance.
- · Appeals Requesting more money for college.
- Cost of Attendance Total cost of college for one year.
- · Emergency funding Money for emergencies provided by the college.
- Fee Waivers Allows students to not pay money for certain things because they can't afford it.
- · Financial Aid Support Office that deals with student scholarships and money for college.
- Financial Literacy Workshops Workshops on saving money, paying bills, using banks, etc.
- · Need-based Aid Money for college based on how much (or little) your family makes.
- SAP Policies Certain grades that determine if you can continue receiving money for college.
- State/Local Aid Money offered by the state or local area to help pay for college.
- Transfer Financial Aid Money for college that can be moved to a different school if you want to change schools.
- Upper Classmen Scholarships Application for free money for students who have been in college longer than 1 year.

# Personal/Development

- Alumni Networking Meeting and talking with others who attended the same school as you to learn and grow.
- Career Development Offices Helps to prepare you to get a job after graduation.
- Coaching/Mentor Programs Programs or people that help you reach your goals.
- Counseling/Mental Health Someone to talk to about feelings and emotions that affect how we think, feel, and act.
- · Dietary Health/Education Learning and understanding why healthy eating habits are important.
- Eco-Friendly Protecting the environment by reusing trash for other things.
- Health and Fitness Getting regular check ups, eating healthy foods and staying active.
- Housing Security Having a safe place to live.
- Location Type of area a school is located in (city, country, weather, restaurants, activities etc.)
- On Campus Employment A job at the college or university you attend.
- Research Opportunities A chance to study and learn more about a topic.
- Summer Employment A job that a student does over summer vacation.

## **Social**

- · Athletics/Sporting Events Fun events you can attend to show school spirit and meet new people.
- · Commuter Experience Driving to and from class every day because you don't live on campus.
- Cultural Exposure Learning about the importance of other cultures.
- Ethnic/Cultural Community A group of people who share things like race, language or where they are from.
- On Campus Events Events to get you involved in campus life.
- Program Community Finding people with similar interest to learn and grow with.
- Student Leadership Taking on responsibility and supporting others.
- Student Orgs/Greek Life A group of students that come together to achieve a goal.
- Student Social Activities Activities where you can be social and meet new people.
- Student Support Office Office that helps students be successful.
- Study Abroad Taking classes in a different country to learn something new.
- · Volunteer Opportunities Using your free time to help in some way that you are not paid for.
