8:15 PM-8:45 PM: 70 Faces of Zionism with Rabbi David Baum During our first session, Rabbi Baum will introduce our theme for the evening. Participants will explore different definitions and viewpoints of Zionism and how they connect to Israel on a philosophical and spiritual level.

For example, is Israel 'the Shining City on the Hill' or Masada? If we can understand that our differing positions are the consequence of different visions and aspirations that we have for Israel, rather than disagreements about facts and politics, we may be able to develop a richer and more tolerant Jewish discourse.

2:15 AM-3:00 AM: The Conservative Movement and Zionism with Rabbi David Baum

Join Rabbi David Baum in an exploration of the intersection between the Conservative Movement and Zionism, as we delve into the rich perspectives of influential Jewish thinkers. Through an engaging learning session, we will delve into texts by renowned figures such as Solomon Schechter, Mordechai Kaplan, Abraham Joshua Heschel, and Chancellor Arnie Eisen, deepening our understanding of the dynamic relationship between Zionism and Conservative Jewish thought.

3:15 AM-4:30 AM: From the Outside Looking In: Jewish-America, World Diaspora, and Attitudes Towards the 'Land' of Israel with Rabbi David Baum Land as a value is understood differently by Jews living outside of Israel. Throughout history, Diaspora Jews have looked longingly and idyllically toward their ancient homeland, while simultaneously engaging in activity, renewal, and growth outside of the land. During our class led by Rabbi Baum, we will explore diasporic conceptions of the place of land in Judaism and how they shape the way one views Zionism.

4:45 AM-5:30 AM: A Light unto the Nations: The Idea of Exceptionalism with Rabbi David Baum

It is often said that Israel is held to a different and unfair standard, and that its policies are judged and assessed not merely in comparison to others but also in comparison to aspirational and sometimes mythic notions of what Israel ought to be. During our class, led by Rabbi David Baum, we will explore the idea of Jewish exceptionalism from within the Jewish tradition and explores how this idea can impact Israel's place in the world today.
