## **Class Information**

## LIVE FIRE INSTRUCTOR (24 hrs.), DPSST #21F022 Instructor: Jamie McCamman

This curriculum is designed to deliver a comprehensive live fire instructor training program. This course is designed for firefighting personnel qualified to become live fire instructors and satisfies the requirements of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1041 Standard for Fire and Emergency Services Instructor Professional Qualifications, Chapter 7, "Live Fire Instructor", within a safe and controlled environment, in accordance with NFPA 1402, NFPA 1403, and NFPA 1500. It is designed around classroom lectures, group discussions, and group exercises to enhance skills needed to act as a live fire instructor and safely provide live fire training to emergency responders. Both lecture and practical will be used allowing participants to apply knowledge of the above standards to training activities. You will develop skills such as applying safety guidelines and implementing live fire training procedures before, during, and after training evolutions.

Prerequisites/Requirements: NFPA Certified Firefighter 2, NFPA Certified Fire Instructor 1, three years' experience as a certified firefighter. Students must wear NFPA compliant PPE for interior firefighting, consisting of structural firefighting coat and pant with liners, rubber or leather boots gloves, hood, and helmet. Students must also provide an NFPA compliant SCBA with mask and spare bottle. Student must provide current passing SCBA fit test completed no more than 12 months prior to June 2023.

## ROPE RESCUE (32 hrs.), DPSST #32316 Instructor: Travis Reid

This course will train firefighters and emergency responders in the use of rope, rescue equipment, and mechanical advantage systems for high-angle rescue environments. This course is applicable for rescuers seeking to initially acquire these skills or to refresh and expand upon existing skills.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** Good boots: for varied terrain including hill sides and rock; helmet: climbing type or swift water; harness: waist or full body; gloves: comfortable gloves you can still tie knots and hitches with; personal carabiners: 3-4 aluminum; locking carbineers; cordage: to make your own parcels: 35 ft of 6mm for an edge tender line, and 35 ft of 8 mm (not as important as the 6 mm).

## FIRE OFFICER 1 (32 hrs.), DPSST #4772 Instructor: Joel King

This course introduces basic concepts of management and supervision by concentrating on such topics as Organizational Structure, Communication Skills, Human Resource Management, Public Relations, Planning, Emergency Service Delivery, and Safety.

Prerequisites/Requirements: FF-2 Certification

## FIRE OFFICER 2 (32 hrs.) Instructor provided by: Marion County Fire District No. 1

This will be a full in-class instruction of Fire Officer 2. This class is packed full of chances to discuss ideas with peers in the Oregon fire service as well as perform in activities to solidify knowledge. Come to class prepared to talk about your experiences and be willing to share with peers in the class. Students will walk away from this class with knowledge and skills to be an outstanding leader in their organization and a renewed passion for the fire service.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** Students must be Fire Officer 1 certified.

## SWIFT WATER RESCUE (24 hrs.), NFPA 1006 & 2500 Instructor: Bryan Lewis

This training provides rescuers with the fundamentals of survival in moving water and is recommended for anyone who may be called upon to effect in-water recues. Students gain knowledge in hydrology and river classifications, size-up, site control and scene management. Practical skills include self-recue, swift water swimming and the fundamentals of short, boat, and in-water rescues. Additionally, students are introduced to the basics of boat handling and the fundamentals of rope rescue including mechanical advantage and anchor systems.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** Water helmet (must cover the head especially the back and have holes for drainage); PFD (Personal Flotation Device– Lifejacket) USCG Type III or V; Water shoes or booties (tennis shoes will work); and full wetsuit or dry suit.

## PUMPER OPERATOR (24 hrs.) Instructor provided by: Marion County Fire District No. 1

The course will cover pump construction and operation, hydraulics, water supply, sprinklers, and standpipes.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** Must be driver operator certified and must bring structural PPE.

## **ACTIVE SHOOTER (ASHER Program) (8 hrs.) Instructor: Chris Heppel**

Identifies the minimum program elements needed to organize, manage, and sustain an active shooter/ or hostile event response program. The ASHER program includes topics that will assist in the reduction or elimination of the risks, the effects, and the impact on an organization or community affected by these events.

Prerequisites/Requirements: None

## FORCIBLE ENTRY (8 hrs.) NFPA® 1001, 5.3.4 Instructor: Brett Kruger

This course will teach the basics of one man and two man forcible entry on both inward and outward swinging doors using the tools typically carried on a fire engine such as a sledgehammer, flat head ax, and Halligan.

Prerequisites/Requirements: Full turnouts (bunker pants and jackets), helmet, gloves (leather or structure), and eye

protection.

FIRE INSTRUCTOR I (16 hrs.) Instructor: Adam Wiley

Fire Instructor I is designed to teach firefighters the knowledge and ability to deliver instruction effectively from a prepared lesson plan, including instructional aids and evaluation instruments; adapt lesson plans to the unique requirements of the students and authority having jurisdiction; organize the learning environment so that learning is maximized, and meet the record-keeping requirements of the authority having jurisdiction.

Prerequisites/Requirements: N/A

## **VEHICLE RESCUE TECHNICIAN (BASIC) (16 hrs.) Instructor: Shaun Wagner**

This course is geared toward both beginners and more experienced rescue workers, as it includes reviews of new vehicle technology including anatomy, airbags, pretensioners, and hybrid vehicles. Students will participate in both classroom lecture/discussion and in hands-on training, putting the lessons learned inside to work. They will learn techniques designed to take advantage of and conquer today's vehicles. Hands-on training will include scenarios with vehicles on their tires, side, and on their top. Patient care and removal will also be addressed during this class.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** Bunker coat, pants, helmet, eye pro, gloves, and boots.

## LIVE FIRE (8 hrs. Friday or Saturday), DPSST #12793 Instructors: Bobby Edwards and Jamie McCamman

This live fire class will give the students a general understanding of what to expect as a nozzle team member within a burning structure. Students will learn fire behavior, fire control basics and hose handling techniques in the nozzle and back up.

**Prerequisites/Requirements:** All appropriate PPE, DPSST snapshot, verification of current FIT test, SCBA + 2 bottles.

## **DEMENTIA TRAINING FOR 1st RESPONDERS (2 hrs.) Instructor provided by Oregon Care Partners**

This is a free two-hour training offered to all personnel regardless of conference registration status. Oregon Care Partners offers free dementia training with a Positive Approach to Care® Certified Dementia Training Expert to help emergency personnel recognize and provide effective service when dementia is a potential factor.

This training was created to equip personnel with the information and skills needed to navigate challenging interactions and improve outcomes for individuals living with dementia.

#### Prerequisites/Requirements: None

## HAZARDS OF FIREFIGHTING & ELECTRICITY SAFETY TRAINING (2 hrs.)

#### **Instructor: Daren Beede**

Response to an emergency involving both electricity and fire necessitate special precautions and procedures to save lives, prevent injuries, and protect property. This primary training focus is on the safety of your Fire Department personnel. This training covers the most common electrical hazards and how first responders and electrical utilities work together to ensure everyone remains safe while at the scene

of an incident.

#### Prerequisites/Requirements: None

#### EMS TOPICS (8 hrs.) Instructor: Suzy Ryan

A full day of EMS training including four mini courses: Stop the Bleed, OB, Medical Spanish, and Mega Code.

Prerequisites/Requirements: N/A



Hydration is key to the health and safety of wildland firefighters. However, many volunteer fire departments have limited budgets, making it difficult to purchase all the provisions their firefighters need, such as a sufficient supply of drinking water. To help combat this issue and free up department funds for other necessities, Anheuser-Busch has partnered with the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC) for the sixth year to award canned drinking water to volunteer departments that respond to wildfires.

The Emergency Drinking Water for Wildland Firefighters program is an expansion of Anheuser-Busch's longstanding tradition of providing emergency drinking water and supplies for disaster relief efforts. In 2024, the program will donate 1.5 million cans of clean drinking water to help volunteer firefighters stay hydrated as they respond to long incidents or disasters such as wildfires. Since the program's inception in 2019, over 8.9 million cans of water have been donated to volunteer fire departments.

To apply for the emergency drinking water, departments must be located in the U.S., annually respond to wildfires, be over 50 percent volunteer, and serve a population of 25,000 or less.

His EMS career paralleled his military duties as he worked as a paramedic in private, cooperate and hospital-based EMS systems in Atlanta and Las Vegas. Chris developed and coordinated the High Threat Tactics, Techniques and Treatments (HT4) course. Over 1,600 responders have received this 10-hour hostile threat awareness level course. He is a graduate of the National Fire Academy's Executive Fire Officer Program and holds the designation of Chief Emergency Medical Services Officer with the Center for Public Safety Excellence. Chris is the recipient of the Oregon EMS and Trauma Systems Meritorious Service and Commitment to Quality Awards.

#### Joel King

Joel's firefighting career began in 1976 as a volunteer with Douglas County Fire District #2. Joel became Fire Chief for the City of Sutherlin. After a very brief retirement from the fire service, he found his new home as a volunteer with North Douglas Fire where he currently serves as a Captain/Paramedic. Along the way he served as the Program Coordinator for the

Paramedic Program at Umpqua Community College and later as the Fire Science Program Coordinator and Paramedic Program Clinical Coordinator. He currently teaches Fire Science classes online.

Joel holds a BS from Eastern Oregon University in Fire Service Administration, and AA, AS degrees from Umpqua Community College. He is a DPSST certified Fire Officer 4, Fire Instructor 2, and Firefighter 2.

#### **Brett Kruger**

**Brett** has worked as a Firefighter/Paramedic with the Keizer Fire District for two years. Prior to Keizer, he worked as a Firefighter/Paramedic with Portland Fire & Rescue as well as Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue. He started his fire service career as a Volunteer with the Aurora Fire District in 2015 and became a Paramedic in 2018.

#### **Bryan Lewis**

Bryan has been in the fire service for 20+ years. He started as a volunteer in 2002 in Newton, Iowa. He moved out to Oregon in 2008 and was hired with Salem Fire Department in 2009. He became part of SFD water rescue team in 2013. He became a deckhand, swift water technician, technical rope rescue technician, rescue boat operator in 2013-2014. In 2016 became an in house instructor for his agency. In 2022 he became an independent instructor with Rescue 3 International. He also teaches and assists in the fire and rescue classes through Chemeketa Community College. He is still an active member with SFD water team.

#### Jamie McCamman

Jamie started in the fire service in 1983 with the Boring Fire District. He rose to the rank of Captain serving as a member of the training cadre from 1996 until 2013. Jamie was a member of the Sandy Fire District from 2012 until 2019, moving up to A/O and assisting training recruit firefighters. He presently works for the Netarts-Oceanside Fire District as the Training & Operations Chief. He currently is an NFPA FF2, EMT-B, Instructor2, Officer2, Live Fire Instructor In Charge and Swiftwater Rescue Tech, along with other certifications.

#### Kyle McMann (Marion Co. Fire)

**Kyle**, Fire Chief with Marion Co. Fire joined MCFD1 in 2001 as an Engineer/Paramedic after completing the Chemeketa Fire Program and Umpqua Paramedic Program. He has served in several capacities over his MCFD1 career, including Firefighter, Engineer, Captain, Emergency Medical Services-Operations Captain, Battalion Chief, and Deputy Fire Chief. He also serves as a Task Force Leader for the Marion County Fire Defense Board for Wildland Conflagrations.

**Travis** is an International Rescue Training Professional with 30+ years of guiding, guide training, and agency experience. He also has In-depth knowledge of water
