The WECAN Board has made an on-going commitment to work consciously and intentionally with the themes of inclusion, diversity, equity and access (IDEA) in Waldorf Early Childhood Education. Below is an overview of recent events and information on some of the activities taking place during this school year:

Summer DEI Update:

Through our collaboration with AWSNA, the Council of Anthroposophical Organizations, the Alliance for Public Waldorf Education, our WECAN Community, and other organizations, many of us had ample opportunities this summer to work toward a better understanding of the effects of racism and to commit to anti-racist thinking and activity.

We thank the Council of Anthroposophical Organizations for making possible a workshop with the [Racial Equity Institute](#) for leaders in our organizations. Several members of the WECAN Board and IDEA Committee were able to attend - along with members of AWSNA, the Alliance for Public Waldorf Education and other anthroposophical organizations - and found it extremely valuable.

We are also deeply grateful to Kirsten Ivey-Colson and Lynn Turner at [The Anti-Racist Table](#) for the incredible 30 day anti-racist challenge that they offered to our community this summer. The challenge was made up of extensive educational and artistic resources paired with inner work and was transformative for Waldorf educators and many others. Thank you Lynn and Kirsten for your remarkable work.

And another thank you to AWSNA's BIPOC Networking Forum for providing a panel webinar for Waldorf educators on [White Supremacy in Waldorf Schools - Our Stories](#). Hearing the panelists' personal stories helped participants to better understand Waldorf schools from a different perspective. Their honest sharing was of tremendous value.

Ongoing and Upcoming DEI Activities:

AWSNA is hosting monthly Pedagogical Webinars this year. One series is called "[What Steiner Actually Said - Examining Steiner's educational ideas which have manifested as white-centered educational practices](#)" and the other series is called [Reimagining Waldorf Pedagogy: Nurturing social renewal through education for racial justice](#).
