Transforming Bread and Wine, Deacon Meghan Murphy-Gill: To make bread and wine, a transformation must take place. Fermentation changes flour, yeast, and water into bread and yeast and grape juice into wine. It takes time, persistence, and faith. Examining and reflecting on what happens for bread and wine to become bread and wine may lead us deeper into the mysteries of ways that we are transformed at Christ's eucharistic table.

How do YOU create? And why? Beth Hall and Father Patrick Raymond: Few of us think of ourselves as an 'artist,' but many if not all of us are, in fact, creative. Father Raymond will introduce a starter theology of creativity. Beth Hall will share her own story of growing interest and skills in crochet and other handwork. We will briefly reflect on ways that creativity can enrich both contemplative life and experiences of community – and all will be welcome to share related experiences or questions.

Atonement, Noah Riegenbach: Atonement is not a word we regularly use, though it lies at the heart of our Christian faith, addressing what we believe about our reconciliation to God through Christ's sacrificial suffering and death. No surprise—there are differing theologies of Atonement. Noah Riegenbach will introduce the subject generally and then do a deeper dive into the Atonement theology of St. Gregory of Nyssa, a 4th century bishop.
