Cancer Awareness

Dartmouth Cancer Center and Dartmouth Health Children's pediatric oncologist, Julie Kim, MD, PhD, is involved in investigation into why the Northeast region of the U.S. has the highest pediatric cancer rates. In 2018, a paper by David A. Siegel, MD, MPH, of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) made headlines in New Hampshire. The paper reported that the state of New Hampshire and the Northeast region of the U.S. have some of the highest incidence rates of pediatric cancer (age 0-19) in the country. But the report was a descriptive study, and the claims about New Hampshire cancer rates did not take important factors such as race or ethnicity into account. "Pediatric cancer rates are known to be highest in white children than other racial/ethnic subgroups, so we would expect populations with more minorities to have lower rates, which, in part, led us to re-examine the previous report," says Judy R. Rees, BM, BCh, MPH, PhD, a cancer population scientist at Dartmouth Cancer Center who specializes in studying cancer data. Using the Cancer in North America (CiNA) analytical file – the same data used by Siegel – Rees' team examined rates overall, as well as by race and ethnicity, and statistically tested whether New Hampshire really is an outlier, or whether the broader Northeast region (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont) has a higher incidence of pediatric cancer than the rest of the country. The study reveals that the Northeast does have a statistically significantly higher incidence of cancer compared to all other U.S. regions (i.e., Midwest, South, West), but within the Northeastern states, no single state is an outlier. "We see big differences in cancer types by race/ethnicity and region. In particular, the higher incidence of certain cancer types in the Northeast compared to the U.S. were not mirrored in the Hispanic population," says Rees, who notes the importance of trying to understand the risk factors at play in the Northeast, and the reasons why some subgroups, such as Hispanic, and American Indian/Alaska Native children, may have different patterns of risk

As you all must know, Lions Club International (LCI) has Five Pillars of Service: Vision, Hunger, Diabetes, Cancer, and **ENVIRONMENT**. The LCI Environmental Strategic Objective is to "Sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of our communities".

When we hear the word communities, we automatically think of our home town and/or region. Lions International's "communities" are all over the world and have helped establish sanitation systems to provide clean water (reducing water borne diseases drastically- especially in children), create projects to preserve agricultural land (planting gardens to promote healthy eating habits, and generate projects to provide cleaner air in big cities. The Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) has funded grants, and continues to fund, many, many countries, as well as our own United States.

You may wonder, how can I and my Lions Club contribute to the Environmental Service Objective? There are several possibilities listed on the LCI web site. Here are some of them:

1. Plant trees with the advice of local environmental organizations (for location and types)
2. Clean up local community spaces (parks, roads, etc.) - good project for a club work crew
3. Encourage each club member to add one green habit to their daily lives- ex: carry your own reusable bags to grocery store
4. Have a recycling drive where people can donate gently used items to charity organizations
5. Identify where to recycle toxic items and share the schedule to community citizens.
6. Recognize a local organization or community leader for their environmental conservation work
7. Sponsor a training program for gardeners on how to make and use organic fertilizers and pesticides.
8. Encourage walking programs, biking, public transportation, and carpooling (fuel reduction)

There are at least 20 more ideas listed on the LCI website- but we can start with the above small projects and go on from there...

In the words of the Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF):

"With the adoption of the environment as an official cause area, and LCIF's support, Lions are better able to take on the responsibility of protecting our Earth".

What resources are available to feed the hungry?

The New Hampshire Food Bank located at 700 E. Industrial Park Drive, Manchester. Contact information is 603-669-9725 or nhfoddbank@gmail.com. The NH Food Bank is the only food bank in the state helping to improve the overall health and wellness of thousands of NH residents who are food insecure.

The NH Food Bank distributes millions of pounds of food annually to more than 400 partner agencies – food pantries, soup kitchens, homeless shelters, senior centers, after school programs and more – in turns feeds thousands of households statewide. The NH Food Bank also addresses the root cause of hunger through innovative programming, such as culinary job training, mobile food pantries, nutrition programs and SNAP outreach.

The NH Food Bank is committed to empowering people with skills and resources to not only consistently access nutritious food and resources but also become more self-sufficient and improve their overall quality of life.

Programs like Cooking Matters NH helps end childhood hunger by inspiring families to make healthy affordable food choices. It is a hands-on educational program that teaches parents, caregivers, and adults with limited food budgets to shop and cook healthy meals. Cook Matters meets 2 hours once a week for 6 weeks and is for parents, families, adults, and childcare professionals. Through hands on cooking and discussion participants learn cooking skills, meal prep, grocery shopping, food budgeting and nutrition. Participants take home a grocery bag each week to practice their new skills.

Cooking Matters shares information about interpreting nutrition labels, healthy cooking techniques, and healthy food choices and to substitute ingredients when faced with fussy eaters or insufficient food. Becoming informed shoppers, confident cooks, and meal planners not only improves household nutrition and relieves budgets, but also enables the next generation to acquire nutrition knowledge, skills and experience needed for good health.




LIONS CAMP PRIDE CONNECTION
