Start the New Year by reading labels on what you eat

Well, it is 2023 and many of us are making the same old New Year's resolutions- gonna lose weight- be careful spending- exercise more, etc. But by the end of January, it's too cold to go for a walk or to the gym and the discount end of the year sales are too good to be true. And we do not even have to mention that salads are not even tempting - we need that good old casserole and other warm and fattening dishes...

So how about adopting New Year's Resolutions that can help us improve the health of our planet?? Here are some eco-friendly promises you can make which are really easy to keep:

1. **Remember your reusable shopping bags:** Plastic bags are not usually recyclable, costly to process and usually end up in landfills and waterways. Whether it is in use, recycled, or landfilled, there is no "away" when we throw out plastic. Reusable canvas, hemp, or cotton shopping bags are low-cost, long lasting and help to reduce the demand for plastic.
2. **Go paperless:** A recent study from the University of Southern Indiana reports that Americans have used 85,000,000 tons of paper each year. That translate to an estimated 500,000 trees cut down just to read your Sunday paper. Instead, opt for paperless bills and receipts, consume your news digitally and/or purchase an online subscription to your favorite publication.
3. **Reduce your meat intake:** "Meatless Mondays" have numerous health and environmental benefits by combating heart disease, cancer, and climate change (less water needed and less methane gas released into the air)
4. **Switch to bar soap and shampoo:** Shampoo and body wash bottles may claim to be recyclable but the truth is that up to 500 million will end up in the landfill. Not only that, most liquid body soaps/shampoos are made up to 80% water- switching to bar shampoo and soap reduces plastic waste and saves you money (more use from your products).
5. **Find new life in old clothes:** Today, the average woman may buy upward of 60 pieces of clothing each year. Yes, we know that clothes shopping is fun and may even be stress reducing but you may not know that the textile industry is the second biggest polluter after gas and oil companies. Challenge yourself not to buy any new clothing until you have gone shopping in your closet. If something new is needed for a special or one-time event, consider a thrift shop, borrowing from a friend, or renting the item. Yes, women can rent outfits just like men already do!
6. **Avoid online shopping- invest in your local merchants:** Of course online shopping is easy, sometimes economical, and offers a larger selection but this convenience comes at a cost. Transporting your packages increases gas emissions and air pollution. Boxes are packed inside boxes with the amount of cardboard used each year amounting to about 1 billion trees. Shopping locally, boosts your community's economy, cuts transportation costs and environmental impacts – lets keep your money where you live and spend it wisely.
7. **Channel your inner handyperson and learn to fix your broken items:** When something breaks, often, we toss it out and buy something new. Repairing it yourself, keeps it out of the landfill- take a class (on line or at the local vocational school) or get knowledgeable friend to help you out
8. **Cut back on the paper towels:** We tend to grab a paper towel for everything from wiping up spills to cleaning your counters. Instead, invest in a few cotton cloths and some fabric napkins and then drop them in the wash on laundry day. Using your cloth alternatives is just as easy as using paper products BUT you only need to buy them once.
9. **Replace your lightbulbs:** LED bulbs last longer than traditional bulbs and you will cut your energy costs up to 80%.

Bathroom remodels continue at the Wakefield and Danville buildings. Sheetrock is finished in both, but the finishes will need to wait for the warmer weather.

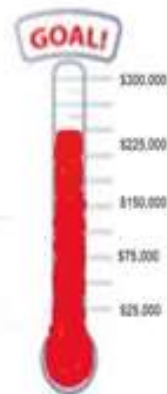
Volunteers have been awesome, but more are needed to finish up in the spring, so get involved!

PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT and
CHAIRPERSON FOR LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

Douglas X. Alexander, from Brooklyn, New York, USA, was elected to serve as international president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 103rd International Convention, June 25 through June 29, 2021. As of June 28, 2022, he will serve as Chairperson for Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) through July 11, 2023.

Past International President Alexander is a retired vice president for J.P. Morgan Chase Bank.

A member of the Brooklyn Bedford Stuyvesant Lions Club since 1984, he has held many offices within the association, including club president, zone chair, region chair, vice district governor, district governor, cabinet secretary, cabinet treasurer and DGE group leader. He also served as a Lions Eye Bank transporter, a member of the District and Multiple District PDG Association, a trustee of the New York State and Bermuda Lions Foundation, and was appointed as the Lions representative to UNICEF-New York from 2012-2014. He has served on the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Planning and Host Committees and has been a presenter at several USA/Canada Forums.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards including the club Lion of the Year, Club President's Award, the Robert J. Uplinger Service Award, several District Governor Appreciation Awards, and the Multiple District Membership Growth Award. He is also the recipient of numerous International President's Certificates of Appreciation, multiple International President's Awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is a Dr. Franklin G. Mason Fellow, a W. P. Woods Fellow and a progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lions activities, Past International President Alexander is active in numerous professional and community organizations. He has served as chairperson of the advisory board for the New York Urban League and as a board member of the St. Francis DeSales School for the Deaf. He is also a recipient of the Congressional Record Award.

Past International President Alexander has two daughters, and his partner in service, Shabiki Cazabon, is a Lion and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Frozen Toes

Winter walking is challenging in many ways. Cold hands are less sensitive to the feel of the guide dog's directions, and stiff muscles make it harder to recover from slips. But to me, the biggest challenge is keeping my guide comfortable as she navigates snow and ice to get to our destination. There is discussion among guide handlers about booties for our guides. I think they interfere with a guide's ability to feel surfaces, thus preventing guides from making the safest choices. The better way, IMHO, is to keep the fur between the toes trimmed to minimize snow build-up, and to use a salve (like Mushers' Secret) to protect the feet from road salt and soothe those hard-working toes. We must go out in all weather, but I have confidence that I am doing the best for my guide as she does her best for me.
