Childhood Cancer by Michelle Ackroyd

As the American Cancer Society's childhood cancer initiative, Gold Together empowers individuals to help raise funds to directly support research, education, advocacy, and services, as well as promote cancer prevention efforts that could reduce children's risk for cancer later in life.

Research that reaches Kids- The American Cancer Society funds scientists who conduct innovative research on childhood cancer. As of March 1, 2021, they are funding 46 active multi-year grants totaling \$27 Million that are specific to Childhood Cancer.

Through their partnership with the St. Baldricks Foundation they are funding more than \$4.4 Million in childhood cancer research grants that could positively impact mortality and quality of life for children.

The Challenge of Childhood Cancer

1. Cancer is the leading disease-related cause of death for children and adolescents ages 1-19 and the second most common cause of death among children ages 1 to 14.
2. 1 in 266 children and adolescents will be diagnosed with cancer before the age of 20.
3. 10,500 new cancer cases in children ages under 15 and 5,090 new cases in adolescents ages 15-19 are expected to be diagnosed in 2021.

On June 18, 2022 the Salem Lions in conjunction with the team Cathy's Angels have decided to participate as a Gold Together Sponsor with American Cancer Society at Pinkerton High School, in Derry, NH at the Relay for Life. The Money that they raise will go directly to Childhood Cancer research they would love to have Lions in the surrounding communities join them to give Kids More Hope through Gold Together. Diabetes Awareness

5 Surprising Facts About Diabetes

It affects 25.8 million Americans, but researchers are still discovering new ways to prevent—and treat—diabetes. Read on for some surprising facts about how to ward off this disease or live well if you have it. Now more than ever before, hope is on the horizon.

- **1. It may be reversible.**

Doctors once thought type 2 diabetes was incurable. But promising new research suggests that with major lifestyle changes, some people can go into remission for *years, if not permanently. Even if healthy eating and physical activity don't eliminate your diabetes, they can help you stay healthier.*

- **2. A virus could be involved.**

In [type 1 diabetes](#), the beta cells in your pancreas are damaged and stop producing the insulin you need to control blood glucose. Scientists believe this sometimes | occurs after genetically susceptible people are exposed to a virus. Their own immune system then begins to attack their pancreas.

- **3. Your risk could be in your cup.**

For each sugary soda you drink per day, your risk of developing type 2 diabetes increases more than 10 percent, according to a recent study in [the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition](#). In contrast, each cup of coffee—regular or decaf—was linked to an 8 percent reduction in risk.

- **4. Eating mindfully can help.**

Mindful eating involves slowing down, paying attention, and distinguishing between true physical hunger and psychological desire to eat. Training in this technique helped people with type 2 diabetes lose weight and control their blood glucose in a 2012 study published in the *Journal of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics*.

- **5. Beans can protect your heart.**

Foods low on the glycemic index—meaning they don't cause sudden blood sugar spikes—are a good bet for diabetes diets. One winner: legumes. One cup of beans, lentils, or chickpeas per day helped lower blood sugar and reduce [heart disease](#) risk in a recent study involving people with type 2 diabetes.

ENVIRONMENT

As we anxiously wait for spring to actually arrive, we are constantly being seduced by all those beautiful plants and fresh seed packets that are now in the local garden shops. You may wonder if this is the year that I will have the best garden ever!! Well, mulching your plants is the answer- mulching is defined as basically any material that is put on top of your soil to retain moisture, suppress weeds, regulate temperature and prevent erosion.

A good mulch is great for the environment! Mulch can stop frost from damaging plants, regulate drainage in your flower beds (stop soil erosion) and remove residual effects of pesticides/fertilizers.

Disadvantages of mulching: inexperienced gardeners may over mulch (more than 4 inches) which leads to overheating and starving them of sunlight and water, also may create a hiding place for harmful insects

There are two types of mulch: organic and synthetic:

Organic mulches, if used at the correct depth for your plants, (2-4 inches thick-at the most) Organic is definitely the preferred mulch

Bark- can be shredded, chipped or chunked- pine, cedar and cypress are the most common and easily purchased.

Leaves- abundant in the fall- they can add phosphorus, carbon and potassium to your soil.

Grass cuttings- freely available but be careful not to apply more than the 2-4 inches recommended.

Pine needles: create a fine layer over your soil but too many may introduce acidity into soil as they decompose.

Organic wood chips/sawdust: wood products that haven't been treated. Treated wood will smell sour when rotting and will release high levels of acid into your soil.

Straw: abundant and inexpensive but may become black and messy looking as it decomposes.

Newspaper- shredded (non-glossy) newspaper is a free mulching option but not recommended as harmful inks may seep into the soil.

Synthetic mulches: Synthetic mulches can be really brutal for your soil as they completely suffocate growth for vegetables and flowers- great for weeds, however...

Gravel & stone chips: a decent option for certain types of gardens and plants. Once down, they may be difficult to remove and as the sun bakes down on the gravel it can cause the soil to overheat.

Dyed wood mulch: wood is dyed in various colors to make your garden look "pretty". Chemicals in dyes can seep into soil and harm your plant roots.

Black plastic: completely suppresses weeds but it will make your soil extremely hot and dry (even if you poke holes in it). It may end up killing plants and beneficial soil microbes.

Landscaping fabric: More porous than black plastic - can still dry out and overheat soil and killing all plant roots

What hunger looks like in New Hampshire continues...

Facts about people in rural communities facing hunger

People who live in rural areas often face hunger at higher rates than people who live in urban areas. Living in a rural community comes with unique challenges. These challenges include lack of transportation when the closest grocery store, food pantry or food bank could potentially be miles away. Also, job opportunities that are more concentrated in low-wage industries and higher rates of unemployment.

- 2.1 million households in rural community's face hunger.
- Rural communities make up more than 63% of counties in the United States and more than 91% of counties with the highest rates of overall food insecurity.
- 80% of the counties with the highest percentage of children at risk for food insecurity live in rural communities.
- Poverty is worse in rural communities than in urban communities. More than 13% of all people in rural communities live below the poverty line compared to the 10% of people in urban communities.

Family members in food insecure households are more likely to struggle with psychological and behavioral health issues. And kids struggling to get enough to eat are more likely have problems in school and other social situations.

How to help?

- Developing a system where mobile food banks make their way to the rural communities.
- Working collaboratively with families, food networks and nutrition programs so that families can learn to grow their own food.
- Adding agriculture courses to the curriculum in rural school districts.

7. Wear sunglasses that block 100% of UVA and UVB radiation.

- Decreased vision
- Eye pain
- Drainage or redness of the eye
- Double vision
- Floaters (tiny specks that appear to float before your eyes)
- Circles (halos) around light sources
- See flashes of light



Justice Christopher Shea Nickell from Paducah, Kentucky, USA, was elected to serve a two-year term as a director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 102nd International Convention held in Milan, Italy, July 5 through July 9, 2019.

He previously served thirteen years as a Judge on the Kentucky Court of Appeals, having been first elected in 2006 and having been selected Chief Judge Pro Tempore. Prior to becoming an appellate judge, he served 22 years as a trial attorney, prosecutor, public advocate, and university instructor. In 1995, the Kentucky Bar Association recognized him as the Outstanding Kentucky Young Lawyer.

A member of the Paducah Lions Club since 1989, he has held many offices within the association, including club president, district governor, multiple district council chair, and president of the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation. He was a member of the 94th Lions International Convention's Rules Committee, co-chairperson of the 96th Lions International Convention's Nominations Committee, and co-parliamentarian and DG/PDG Banquet chair of the 100th Lions International Convention. He was also a faculty member for the inaugural "Bachelor's Degree" club-level programs of Lions University. In recognition of his service to the association, Director Nickell has received numerous awards, including the Senior Master Key Award and several International Presidential awards. He is a member of the Kentucky Lions Hall of Fame.

In addition to his Lions activities, Director Nickell has been active in many professional and community organizations. An Eagle Scout, he has been recognized as a Kentucky Colonel, Duke of Paducah, Honorary Captain of the Belle of Louisville, and a Sagamore of the Wabash. Director Nickell is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow and his wife, Lion Carolyn S. Watson, MD, a pathologist, is also a Melvin Jones Fellow.





3 easy steps to remain in good standing with the NH State secretary of State and the IRS

1] NH ANNUAL REPORT

Every year an Annual Report (NHCT-12) must be filed with the State of NH on or before **November 15th** (Fiscal Year July 1 through June 30) These are now done on-line. If you wish a paper form you need to notify the State of NH either via e-mail or telephone call at annualreport@sos.nh.gov or 603-271-8200 You will need to provide the business name, ID number and name and address for them to mail or e-mail to.

2] NH 2025 & EVERY 5 YEARS AFTER NON PROFIT REPORT

Every five years a Non-Profit Report is due to the NH Corporate Division, providing the Business Name, Type, Business ID and State of Incorporation; Current Principal Office Address, Current Mailing Address if different; New Principal Address and mailing address; Principal Purpose and Officer and Director Information (names, address and titles) There are filing fees for the Annual Reports and Non-Profit Report. Existing registered Clubs should have last completed this form in 2020.

3] ANNUAL FILING OF INTERNAL REVENUE TAX FORM 990-N, 990-E OR 990

Many clubs have income of \$50,000.00 or less annually, must electronically file 990-N; other clubs, bring in \$50,000.00 or more file either form 990EZ or 990. The filing is due no later than **November 15**, each year (based on the Lions Fiscal year of July 1 through June 30).

- ☐ Certificates of Insurance, which provide evidence of the automatic coverage provided for a specific event, can be downloaded.
- ☐ This is a legal liability policy only and does not provide "accident" insurance that will pay for injuries regardless of fault. Limited "Medical Payments" coverage is provided, but it does not apply to a person injured while taking part in athletics.
- ☐ Insurance limits:
 - ✓ Products-Completed Operations Aggregate \$2,000,000
 - ✓ Designated Location/General Aggregate Limit \$2,000,000
 - ✓ Personal & Advertising Injury Limit \$1,000,000
 - ✓ Each Occurrence Limit \$1,000,000
 - ✓ Damage To Premises Rented To You \$1,000,000
 - ✓ Premises Medical Expense Limit (Any one person) \$5,000
- ☐ The Liquor Liability exclusion applies. Liability arising out of the sale or serving of alcoholic beverages is NOT covered. The Association's experience in liquor liability situations is such that it cannot recommend, and in fact discourages, clubs from participating in events involving the sale or serving of alcoholic beverages.
- ☐ If events are sponsored by Lions but conducted by others, be sure to obtain Certificates of Insurance indicating that the operator conducting the activity has adequate liability insurance naming the Lions Club as additional insured. If you undertake a joint project with another organization, the cosponsor is NOT protected by our policy and should have adequate insurance of its own.

New Method of Applying for LCI Insurance Certificate

As you probably know, when a Club has a fundraising or community service event at a location that requires proof of insurance, you can apply for that insurance certificate from LCI. The process recently changed. If you are not aware of the change, following are the steps for the new procedure.

1. Go to the www.lionsclubs.org website.
2. Click on "Resources For Members" at the top of the screen. On the dropdown menu click on "Resource Center."
3. In the Keyword Search box, enter "Insurance" and tap the Search button.
4. On the resources that show, click on "View" for the "Certificate of Insurance Request Form - US" and the form (as shown below) should download. You may have to click on Open File in the Downloads window.
5. Print out the form and fill in the required information for your event.
6. Do one of the following:

Dues Adjustment Resolution Will Be Voted on at 2022 International Convention

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, hybrid convention, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.
