Welcome back to Fall!

By now, most of our Lions Clubs are planning their activities for the upcoming year. Since Lions International has several “focus” areas, one of them being preserving the Environment; now would be a good time to think about what **your** club could be doing to meet the International Lions Strategic Objective of “Sustainable protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of all communities”

All Lions and Leos Clubs are encouraged to perform one environmental project each year. As a club, what are some ideas for fulfilling your environmental focus?

Some of these ideas are already in place by many clubs:

- Clean-up of local parks, streets or public areas- make it fun by awarding a prize to the Lion who finds the weirdest item...
- Plant a tree, or better yet, a couple of trees- check with your local parks department
- Electronic Item Drive/Recyclable events- collect “e-waste”. Co-ordinate with local electronic waste plant- this could also be a fundraiser
- Wakefield Lions hosted a free “Shredding Event” which was sponsored by a local bank- great idea!
- Collection of old cell phones – this could be a potential fundraiser- more on this in next month’s newsletter
- Collect used ink cartridges and turn into Staples for recycling
- Trek Program- collect 500 lbs. of plastic and film coverings and get a free trek bench for a location of your choice.
- **Sign up to help at Lions Camp Pride- always need help with the waterfront, raking, etc.**
- Clothing and household equipment that is no longer used- donate to a local charity that may work with the homeless and/or families in need

Advocate for Federal Nutrition Programs

About one in four Americans depends on USDA food and nutrition assistance programs to help feed themselves and their families.

These programs, such as SNAP, WIC and public school breakfast and lunch provide over 20 times more food than food banks, food pantries and soup kitchens do, which is why it is so important to advocate for government policies that help hungry people, especially as Congress considers deep cuts to these programs.

Support grassroots solutions

Many people in need are making their own change and working to improve access to healthy food in their own communities. Building a stronger local food economy can create jobs, keep money in the region and give people control over their own food. You can support these efforts in community gardens, co-ops, farmers markets, youth empowerment programs and similar work.

These are just a few ways to support local efforts to feed the hungry.

October is Blindness Awareness Month

Blindness Awareness Month launched in October 2009 from The Little Rock Foundation. World Sight Day is held on the second Thursday of October. This year it will be on October 14th.

According to the World Health Organization, “everyone, if they live long enough will experience at least one eye condition in their lifetime”.

Worldwide there are 285 million people who are visually impaired, 39 million are completely blind. Cataracts are the leading cause of blindness worldwide.

Uncorrectable vision impairment affects 4.2 million Americans age 40 and over; this number is expected to more than double by 2050 due to the increasing epidemics of diabetes and other chronic diseases.

National Braille Week: October 11-17

This week aims to raise awareness of the importance of Braille and other alternative formats. It is organized by the charity Royal Blind and runs the second week of October, coinciding with World Sight Day.

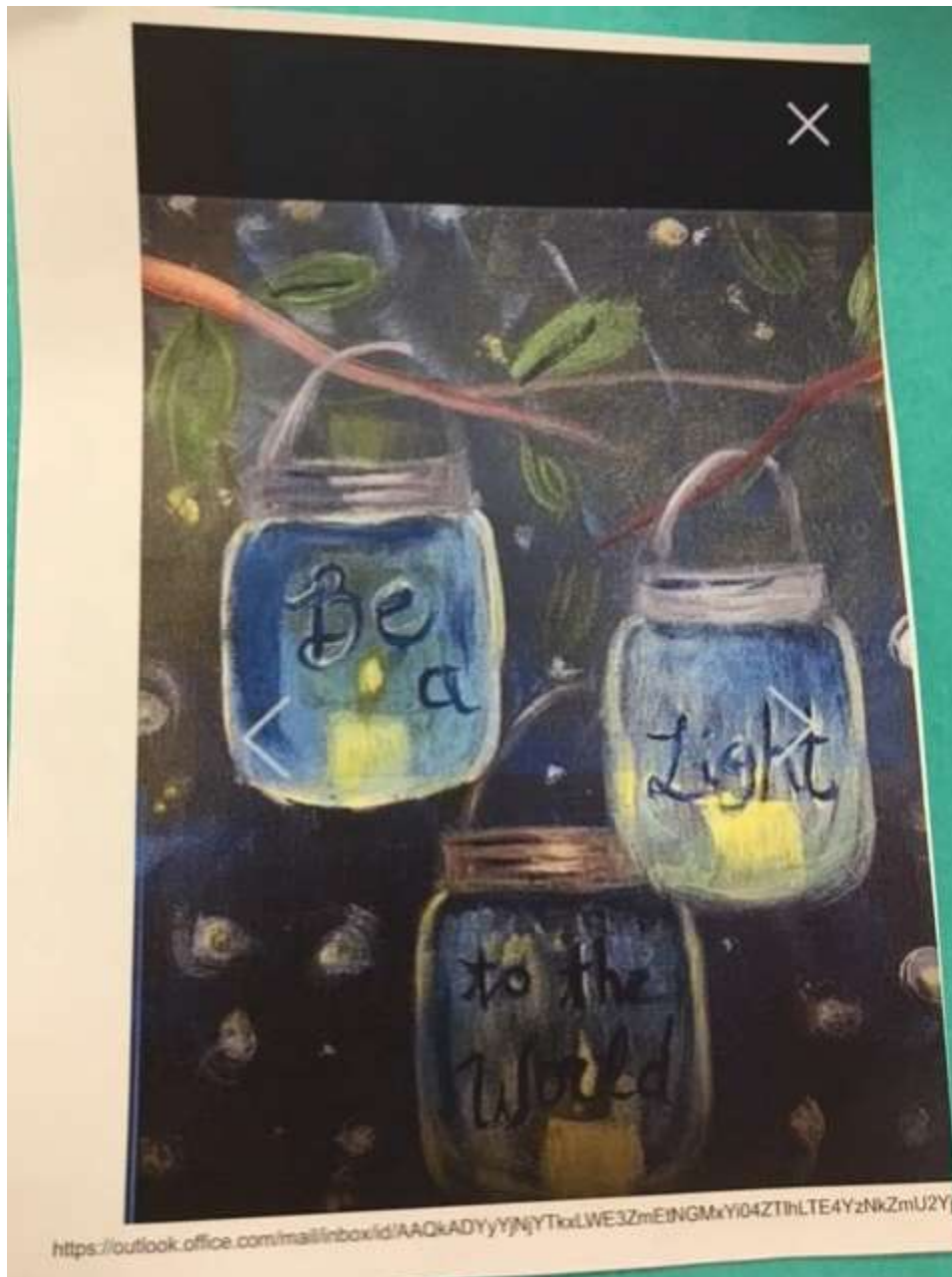

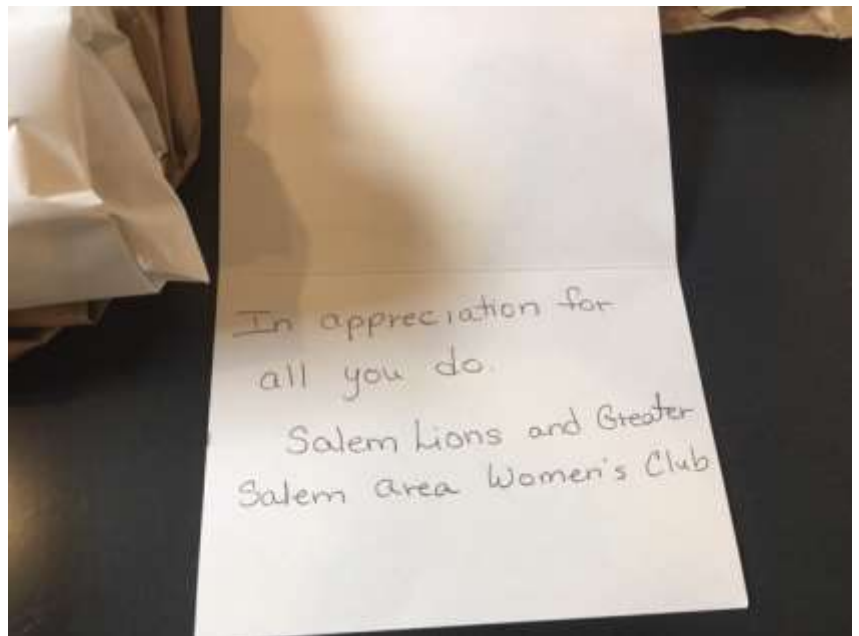

September 9, 2021 Meeting -

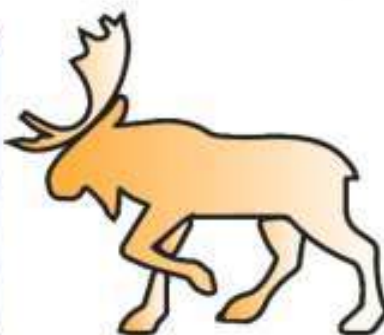
