Childhood Cancer by Michelle Ackroyd

April Childhood Cancer

I read an article recently on Childhood Cancer Lifeline's Facebook page and thought I would Share it with you all.

"If kids are normal, not sick, they like to be treated special. But if kids have a disease, they wanted to be treated normal."
(eleven-year-old girl)

"Longing for normalcy" is a refrain of many children* after a diagnosis of illness. The child often refers to "normal" as how he or she was before the illness, and hopes to be once again. For children with a congenital or life-long condition, the longing is to be part of the "normal" world around them. "Being normal" for children includes being regular (not special), ordinary (not exceptional), and fitting in (not being different).

Children living with illness inhabit two worlds: the medical world and the wider world of "normal." The proportion of time they spend in each of these worlds will shift constantly during the course of an illness. There are times where a child is so consumed by the intensity of illness and treatment that the wider world is only a distant, abstract concept. During periods when a child feels well, the medical world recedes, and they can enter that wider world to re-find their place. Most of the time, however, children "commute" between these worlds, an extraordinary challenge.

Missing out on normal life activities and events is an ongoing reality for these | children. Normal life for children encompasses three overlapping spheres: family, school and pee

When I heard that I had leukemia, I turned pale with shock. I chose yellow – it's a pale color. Scared is red – for blood. I was scared of needles, of seeing all the doctors, of what was going to happen to me. I was MAD [black] about a lot of things: staying in the hospital, taking medicines, bone marrows, spinal taps, IVs, being awakened in the middle of the night. I was sad [purple] that I didn't have my toys and that I was missing out on everything. I chose blue for lonely because I was crying about not being at home and not being able to go outside. Green is for hope: getting better, going home, eating food from home, going to school and seeing my friends.

More than any other activity, school is the defining structure of every child's day-to-day life. It represents constancy, a routine with a predictable set of rules and expectations. Far from their medical world, it provides a safe environment for learning and mastery.

Hard to believe another year has passed and we are celebrating [Earth Day, April 22](#), once again! This year's theme is ["Invest in Our Planet"](#). Everyone is asked to support eco-conscious brands/products and to use your voice and or skills to fight climate change.

[Earth Day](#) is a holiday the whole world can celebrate; we all live on the same planet! Saying that, have you ever wondered how the name Earth came to be? The answer is: no one really knows. The name for our planet Earth is said to go back at least 1,000 years and is considered to be of English/German origin. The first recorded use of the current word "Earth" was in the modern version of the Bible. Previously, the oldest name for earth was Tellus, later Terra, from the dead language Latin (terr), meaning dirt or land. It is interesting that in Roman mythology Terra Mater aka Mother Earth (also known as Tellus) was the goddess of agriculture, earth quakes, marriage, and fertility.

You might then ask why was Earth not named after a god or goddess just like all the other planets?? The answer to that, without going into too much detail, is that "The Earth" (the scientific code) was considered only a sphere like the stars. For 2,300 years, everyone agreed that spheres were round but stationary. Planets, from the Greek word "planeta" meaning wanderer, were also round but moved. Not until Copernicus observed movement and published his book [De Revolutionibus Orbium Coelestium](#) in 1543 did we become a planet!!

What hunger looks like in New Hampshire continues...

Facts about Senior Hunger in America

- Today, there are more than 5.2 million seniors aged 60+ who face hunger. That is 1 in 14 seniors or 7% of all seniors.
- 63% of seniors visiting food banks say they must choose between food and medical care.
- Hunger takes a severe toll on seniors' health and nutrition – putting them at risk for chronic health conditions like depression, asthma, and diabetes.
- Millions of seniors qualify for monthly assistance but only 42% receive benefits.

Some seniors are more likely to face hunger, including seniors who identify as Black, Latino, seniors who live in rural areas, seniors with disabilities and seniors who are renters.

Healthy bodies and minds require nutritious meals at every age. But when people don't have enough food or must choose inexpensive foods with low nutritional value, it can seriously impact their health. Once the cycle of poor diet and poor health begins, it can be hard to break.

When someone is sick, having to choose between food and treatment can lead to serious complications. For Food-insecure adults living with diabetes, the choice between food and controlling the disease can lead to complications like kidney disease, eye disease and nerve damage.

How to help?

Meals on Wheels serves healthy meals to older, homebound, and disabled adults, regardless of immigration or refugee status, ethnicity/race, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity or disability.

The meals provided by Meals on Wheels meet 1/3 of the daily nutrition requirements for older adults and provide 3oz of protein, 2 servings of fruit/vegetables, whole grain baked products, dessert, and a calcium and vitamin enriched beverage mix.

In 2021, despite the COVID-19 pandemic, dedicated volunteers continued bringing food and social communication to older adults in the community.

April is Women's Eye Health Month



- Blindness affects more women than men
 - The National Institutes of Health reports that 2/3 of people with blindness or visual impairment are women
- Hormones play a major part in why this happens, as women have many hormones that men don't have
 - Lifestyle, genetics, and pregnancy can also be a factor
 - Pregnancy causes changes in the eye such as dry eye, puffiness, and migraines that can affect vision
 - Even if not pregnant, taking birth control can cause hormonal changes and blood clots that can affect vision
- Many women aren't aware that they have a higher risk for developing eye and vision problems

Fast Facts:

- Researchers found that 64% of women are visually impaired compared to 36% of men
- Out of 4.1 million Americans over the age of 40 with vision problems and blindness, 2.6 million are women

It ensures the survival of the legacy that started back in the 1980's with the early Lions who worked the bingo circuit to pay all the bills and gave the camp to us with no debt. It is truly an amazing story.

The dining hall bath renovation will be complete by the time you receive this article all that will be left is the cleanup. The new walk-in freezer is in and ready to ship to the camp, just waiting for the mud to go away. The freezer fundraiser held by zone 2 raised more than \$11,000 toward its purchase. Thanks to all who made it a huge success.

Next, it's on to the Salem bunkhouse fully accessible shower/toilet room. Demo is complete and compared to the dining hall work this will be a walk in the park.

Club workdays are scheduled for April 23 and 30, May 14, 21 and 28th. This gives all adoptive clubs the time to get their respective buildings ready both inside and out ready for lease group occupancy. Our first group comes on site June 3, 4 and 5th.

As most of you know Lions Camp Pride received a \$400,000 grant from the State of New Hampshire to help build our new pavilion. This grant + the money already raised will allow for us to make the pavilion bigger and better than any of us could have ever imagined. We now will be able to build a great building and provide all the equipment needed to furnish out the inside with basketball, pickleball, table and chairs, and games of all kinds. This grant is of the reimbursement type which means we pay the bills and then get reimbursed from the State. Thank God for the fundraising or this gift from the State would have not happened.



Got an old computer collecting dust in your closet, or a broken air conditioner sitting on the back porch? What do you do with such items when you replace them? Everything from laptops, phones and computers to TVs cost a fortune to haul away.

Turn all that junk over to the Laconia-Gilford Lions Club during their Electronic Waste Collection Day fundraising event which will be held on Saturday, April 9, in the Cinemas 8 parking lot in Gilford (9 Old Lake Shore Road) from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. **Note: this is a new location as of a few years ago.** For a small disposal fee (most items are \$5), not only will we take your old electronic items off your hands, we will recycle them. The disposal charge is almost always less than the prices at local transfer stations. Cash or checks will be accepted but not debit or credit cards.

Just bring your electronics to Cinemas 8 parking lot, 9 Old Lakeshore Road in Gilford on Saturday, April 9, between 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Lions Club members will even help you unload them! You do not have to be a resident of Laconia or Gilford to take advantage of this fundraiser - it is open to everyone.

Items you may want to consider dropping off are laptops, PC towers, PC LCD monitors, servers, CD/DVD players, camcorders, AV equipment, VCRs, speakers, copiers, faxes, scanners, printers, phones (land and cell), phone systems, humidifiers and computer accessories (all \$5).

In addition, we will also take microwaves, air conditioners, dehumidifiers (all \$10), CRT monitors less than 50 lbs and TVs less than 25" (\$20), TVs 26" and larger (\$30). For TVs needing more than one person to lift or CRT monitors over 50 lbs, the item will be weighed on site and price determined. Anything with a cord not listed will also be accepted.

We are also now accepting Teflon pots and pans for \$1.

You CANNOT drop off: smoke detectors, oils, paints, thinners, batteries (except car batteries), tires, items containing mercury such as fluorescent and CFL light bulbs or thermometers, capacitors, ballasts, or any other hazardous waste.

Don't miss this opportunity or you'll be storing these things another year - "Don't throw it out, Recycle it!" You'll not only help the environment by disposing of your unwanted electronics responsibly but also help the Lions, the largest service organization in the world, raise funds to meet pressing needs in our community: eye exams, eye glasses, hearing aids, food pantries, college scholarships, holiday food baskets for needy families, youth sports programs, are just a few of the local charitable organizations that we assist. 

INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR

Justice Christopher Shea Nickell from Paducah, Kentucky, USA, was elected to serve a two-year term as a director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 102nd International Convention held in Milan, Italy, July 5 through July 9, 2019.

On November 5, 2019, Director Nickell was elected to serve as a Justice on the seven-member Supreme Court of Kentucky. He previously served thirteen years as a Judge on the Kentucky Court of Appeals, having been first elected in 2006 and having been selected Chief Judge Pro Tempore. Prior to becoming an appellate judge, he served 22 years as a trial attorney, prosecutor, public advocate, and university instructor. In 1995, the Kentucky Bar Association recognized him as the Outstanding Kentucky Young Lawyer.

A member of the Paducah Lions Club since 1989, he has held many offices within the association, including club president, district governor, multiple district council chair, and president of the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation. He was a member of the 94th Lions International Convention's Rules Committee, co-chairperson of the 96th Lions International Convention's Nominations Committee, and co-parliamentarian and DG/PDG Banquet chair of the 100th Lions International Convention. He was also a faculty member for the inaugural "Bachelor's Degree" club-level programs of Lions University. In recognition of his service to the association, Director Nickell has received numerous awards, including the Senior Master Key Award and several International Presidential awards. He is a member of the Kentucky Lions Hall of Fame.

In addition to his Lions activities, Director Nickell has been active in many professional and community organizations. An Eagle Scout, he has been recognized as a Kentucky Colonel, Duke of Paducah, Honorary Captain of the Belle of Louisville, and a Sagamore of the Wabash. Director Nickell is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow and his wife, Lion Carolyn S. Watson, MD, a pathologist, is also a Melvin Jones Fellow.

Any new questions I have about my dog, there's the Client Hotline, and I can contact my trainer directly. Or, I can wait until our annual review. TALES OF THE SERVICE TRAIL UPDATE

March 2022

Before my normal discussion, I ask all of us to pray for all Ukrainians, as well the Russian soldiers being forced to attack the Ukrainians. Pray that the leaders come to their senses quickly to stop this destruction and killing. In the meantime, there are now two million refugees who have fled the war scene. LCIF has started a "Refugee and Displaced Persons" fund. We are already funding resettlement camps in Poland and Slovenia. The Lions of Portugal dispatched buses, medical teams, and supplies to the Polish border to bring their own back to Portugal to re-settle. PLEASE - do what you can to assist this LCIF project. This is OUR Foundation working for humanity once again.

To the normal update: What a weird winter this has been! First, we have sixty-degree days and thirty-degree nights. That scene really confuses maple trees into thinking it is an early sap season. Karol and I were hopeful that meant that our travel plans would be smooth and easy with little disruption. So far that has not been true. Our Lions travel team is fabulous and so far, we have made every mid-winter conference and convention in a timely manner. We drove to the MD 33A mid-winter conference in Southbridge, Massachusetts. Most fittingly, the conference hotel was a re-done factory that housed American Optical Company! It is a great facility, and the Lions were just so welcoming and happy to be together: with us and each other. Of the five Massachusetts mid-winters, this was the last one and the only one that managed to stay live. The Sunday MD Council meeting had DGs and others from all over the state so jealous of the "Awesome District's" pulling off the in-person event successfully.

Last weekend saw us in Kearney, Nebraska, a ranching community in the west/central part of the state. Quickly learned that the proper pronunciation is "car-nie," as in fair workers. The event was a double district event on Friday and Saturday. We arrived early in the afternoon, and one of the DGs knew of our birding hobby - wow! Kearney is the center of the migration fly-way of the Sandhill Cranes. He drove us from a brief stop at a conference work project that was finishing sorting food, clothing, and furniture at the Jubilee Center, to the Rose sanctuary dedicated to the birds. Oh my gosh - thousands and thousands of cranes in the harvested corn fields along the Platte River. They get 800 to 900 thousand cranes for about six weeks total, stopping to refuel for the continued migration to Canada and Alaska.

And then we had another great live gathering of Lions who celebrated their first live conference in two years.

Last month, I closed with ten ideas for finding new members (totally stolen from other Lions). The response was warming, so here are ten more ideas:

11. Video your events and post on YouTube.
12. Host an open house.
13. Hold a club meeting solely on membership recruitment.
14. Ask former Leos, Speech contestants, Quest graduates, school contacts.
15. Have a Membership chair report at each meeting.
16. Assemble guest packets (brochures, campus club info, etc.).
17. Advertise your service project meeting the community needs.
18. Invite family members to join you.
19. Distribute business cards with club meeting dates and contact info in town.
20. Send congratulation letters to people in the news and invite them to a meeting.

Another ten next month! Enjoy Lions! Please take care of your Lions and yourself, as well as your communities. Stay safe as this pandemic is waning.

I thank all of you again for this honor to serve Lions and the world. We promise that we will do our best to represent all Lions world-wide.


