Going forward Lions International has adopted eight Global Causes. Five core global causes which are then tied into the additional foundation causes:

Core Causes Hunger Environment Diabetes Vision Childhood Cancer LCIF Causes LCIF Youth LCIF Humanitarian Efforts LCIF Disaster Relief

Each of these may have a special meaning to us - each in his or her own way. This gives us even more reasons why an individual would want to join our organization, to engage in the power of 1.4 million members worldwide, providing service to take these causes head-on.

In this issue and in future issues, I plan on sharing information with regards to all eight causes.

Disaster Relief and the Environment seem to go hand and hand.

In a nutshell, global temperatures are now rising at an accelerating rate, which began in the 1800s. This is entirely due to greenhouse gas emissions buildup from human activity - the burning of fossil fuels. You be the judge and make a personal decision about how your actions can positively impact the future.

Each individual and each club may also have a cause or causes that are important to them. For me it is <u>Cystic</u> <u>Fibrosis</u>. When the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was established in 1955, people born with the disease were not even expected to live to attend elementary school. Faced with insurmountable odds, but determined to save the lives of their children, a group of concerned parents came together to form the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Today, because of our progress in research and drug development and high-quality, specialized care, people with CF are living into their 30s, 40s, and beyond. Read about the incredible journey to cure cystic fibrosis in future months of this newsletter.

This is the logo we are to use. It only has two colors. If you are printing flyers to distribute or on Facebook, Instagram, etc. this is it. It is easily <u>downloaded from the Lions International website</u> along with the logos depicting the service initiatives. The website has information to print or download on all things involving the Lions Brand. Any questions? I'm in the directory.

Not going to the USA/Canada Forum? Do the next best thing. Study at home in your own time. Check out Lions University online. Each course of study consists of 10 classes with another list of electives to choose from to complete your bachelor's degree. The classes are 50 minutes to an hour in length and there is corresponding paperwork that's available for printing and/or downloading. At the end of each class there is a short test that is pass or fail. Classes include Member Motivation, Conflict Resolution, Public Relations, Community Service Projects as well as other Lions related subjects.

The goal for the rollout of the new Lions Portal is mid-September. The plan is to make sure the cabinet is fully trained, including all the zone chairs. The next step is to make sure all presidents and secretaries are compliant with the system. Training will probably take place on a small scale with one to three clubs at a time. The goal is to make it easier for people to learn as well as for the trainers to teach. International does not want to roll the new program out until they have most of the bugs worked out and the district will bring it to you as soon as it is released.

Pets – A quick personal story...

My Dr and I have been changing up some of my medications. Over time, the new medication should help to lower my glucose levels, so we have a plan to adjust other medications when certain my glucose levels hit specific numbers. It was all going as planned, and as the levels went down, I would adjust per the instructions.

I have a cat. If you have ever had a cat, you know they rule the roost and tell you what they want when they want it. And they can kind of be jerks about it. I found that I was waking up in the middle of the night with 17 pounds of cat on my chest, patting my face until I woke up. I just assumed he was being a pest, petted him for a few minutes, then set him outside of my bedroom and closed the door. The other night, something told me to check my glucose. It had dropped below the range my Doctor had set for it to be in. Suddenly I realized that my cat could tell and was waking me up to let me know. Not so pesty, huh?

We hear about guide dogs for helping the sight impaired, but how many of us know there are Diabetes Alert Dogs out there. These dogs are trained to detect high and low glucose levels by smelling the chemical changes in their human. These dogs can sense the changes quickly enough to alert their human to check their glucose levels and make the adjustments needed to avoid a crisis. Now my cat certainly wasn't trained (ever try to train a cat to do anything?), but he knows me well enough to sense these changes. I'm sure he's not alone.

Service Project ideas:

- Have a fund raiser to support one of the organizations training Diabetic Alert Dogs. I found many in my research, two of which are below:

- Reach out to your local animal shelter and find out what they could use and have a drive to collect those items
- Reach out to your local food pantry. See if they take donations of pet food for their patrons. Your donation may help someone to keep a pet that may be their alert pet.

Read on for a great recipe!

Recipe: Turkey Stuffed Bell Peppers (courtesy of Taste of Home magazine)

5 Med peppers½ tsp salt2 tsp olive oil½ tsp pepper1-1/4 lb lean ground turkey1-3/4 shredded cheddar1 lg onion – chopped1 ¼ C soft bread crumbs1 garlic clove, minced¼ tsp paprika2 tsp ground cumin1 tsp Italian seasoning

Directions:

- 1) Cut peppers in half lengthwise and remove seeds. Place in 15x10x1 in pan coated with cooking spray
- 2) In large skillet, heat oil and cook and crumble turkey with onion, garlic, and seasonings until meat is no longer pink (6-8 minutes). Cool slightly. Stir in tomatoes, cheese, and bread crumbs
- 3) Fill pepper halves with mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 20-25 minutes (until filling is heated through and peppers are tender

ENVIRONMENT

Have you heard the newest buzz word-"Precycling"??

Precycling is the practice of avoiding waste before it is created- it requires thinking before you purchase... <u>Precycling</u> differs from recycling because it focuses on the prevention of waste production by taking measures before a substance, material or product has become waste. <u>Precycling</u> involves taking action before existing waste is abandoned to nature.

There are aggressive ways to practice recycling (such as questioning the practices of business owners, either in person or when shopping online- if you do not like what you hear- do not buy!- they will get the message). Expressing your precycling choices will help set standards that companies must meet to get you to spend your money -think of precycling as "not buying less" but rather "buying smart".

Before you make a purchase, ask yourself:

- 1. Is this product made from recycled materials?
- 2. Can this product, once it is no longer used, be recycled?
- 3. How much packaging does this product have and can that packing be recycled?
- 4. Do I really need this product?
- 5. Do I have something I could reuse or repurpose instead of buying new?

Most of us would prefer to start precycling at a smaller scale. Examples of what we can do, if you are not doing already:

- 1. Bring your own reusable bags to the grocery store
- 2. Buy reusable napkins, dish cloths and razors instead of items that are tossed after once used
- 3. Pack your snacks /lunches/leftovers in reusable containers instead of plastic bags or wrap

Everything from laptops, phones and computers to TVs cost a fortune to haul away.

Turn all that junk over to the Laconia-Gilford Lions Club during their Electronic Waste Collection Day fundraising event which will be held on Saturday, September 30, in the Cinemas 8 parking lot in Gilford (9 Old Lake Shore Road) from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. **Note: this is a new location as of a few years ago.** For a small disposal fee, not only will we take your old electronic items off your hands, we will recycle them. The disposal charge is almost always less than the prices at local transfer stations. **Cash or checks will be accepted but not debit or credit cards**.

Just bring your electronics to Cinemas 8 parking lot, 9 Old Lakeshore Road in Gilford on Saturday, September 30, between 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Lions Club members will even help you unload them! You do not have to be a resident of Laconia or Gilford to take advantage of this fundraiser - it is open to everyone.

Items you may want to consider dropping off are laptops, PC

One bite of these caramel apples, and you'll never want the store-bought version again. Our Honey Roasted Peanuts take this classic fall treat to a new level.

Ingredients

- 4-5 Medium clean apples
- Wooden sticks one per apple
- 1/2 cup Butter
- 2 cups Packed brown sugar
- 1 cup Light corn syrup
- Dash salt
- 1 can (14 oz) Sweetened condensed milk
- 1 tsp Pure vanilla extract
- 1 cup Terri Lynn Honey Roasted Peanuts (chopped)

Directions

First Layer

- 1. Insert a wooden stick into each apple.
- 2. In saucepan combine butter, brown sugar, corn syrup, condensed milk and salt. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Lower heat to medium and continue to cook, stirring constantly for about 25 to 30 minutes or until a candy thermometer reads 248 degrees F. The caramel should coat back of a spoon.
- 3. Remove mixture from the heat; stir in vanilla.
- 4. Dip apples into hot caramel sauce and turn until evenly coated. Allow excess caramel to drip back into the pan. Place on parchment.
- 5. Refrigerate for 1 hour.

Second Layer

- 1. Reheat the remaining caramel and repeat dipping directions.
- 2. While the caramel is still hot, roll in chopped nuts.
- 3. Store in Refrigerator.


- · Line an 8x8 baking pan with parchment paper.
