Environment

"Pollinators" have been in the news lately because their numbers are drastically declining! Sadly, the health and population of our pollinators are being threatened by insecticides (neonicotinoids), loss of their habitats and global warming.

Pollinators are insects, birds, bats and other animals that carry pollen from plant to plant. Typically we think of bees doing this valuable service but butterflies, birds, bats, moths and beetles also help out. Even the wind and rainfall help with pollination. Why is pollination important? Without pollination many of the foods we eat would not be available; at least 80% of our world's crops require pollination to seed – that's an estimated 1 out of 3 bites of food we eat!

What are the things we all can do to help?

- Install butterfly, bat, and bee houses- available at garden stores, online or build yourself
- Plant milkweed: for Monarch butterfly caterpillars; plant seasonal flowering plants for adult Monarch butterflies. Border your vegetable garden with native flowers to attract the good guys- check with local nurseries for the best plants to buy - select plants with different bloom times
- Reduce or eliminate the number of pesticides you use- many herbal recipes are out there for your garden- garlic and basil help keep your soil and plants' immune systems healthy.
- Avoid mulching: 70 % of bee species dig a nest in the ground to raise their young, mulch will prevent this so leave a little bare ground.
- Plant clover instead of grass seed: clover is affordable, easy to grow, simple to maintain, and drought-resistant. Moreover, clover attracts pollinating insects like bees, requires no fertilization, grows in poor soil, and requires very little attention and no mowing. Clover can also be seeded over an existing lawn and grows well with grasses.



Did you know?

There are nearly 20,000 species of bees in the world- best known are the honey bees and bumble bees.

Bumble Bees are better pollinators because of their size and flexibility, honey bees are smaller and tend to stay within a very small area (your back yard)

Honey bees live in a hive, bumble bees live in nests in the ground. Bumble bees can sting multiple times, honey bees will die after a single sting. Both will not sting unless aggravated

Hunger by Martha Ackerman

Hunger August 2022 The New Hampshire Food Bank

Imagine having to choose between paying rent, paying for utilities, buying medication for your family – and buying food. For many, those choices are unimaginable, but for thousands of New Hampshire residents it is a reality they face every day.

The New Hampshire Bank is fighting back against hunger in New Hampshire. They distribute millions of pounds of food each year to more than 400 partner agencies statewide. They are not just sending canned goods to local food pantries and walking away. They are waging the hunger battle from all angles by leveraging their network of partners, donors and other nonprofits and government agencies to deliver food, yes and an ever-expanding array of strategic programming and resources designed to fight the root causes of hunger.

How does this work? They train those in need of careers in the culinary industry through their Recipe for Success Culinary Job Training Program. They provide meals to Boys and Girls Clubs to serve club members and their families as a supplement to free and reduced lunches at school. They are a sponsor for the USDA Food and Nutrition Service Summer Food Service Program in northern New Hampshire which provides meals to kids in the summer months when they don't have access to free lunches. They connect people with federal SNAP (food stamp) benefits and shows them how to amplify benefits when used on fresh fruit and vegetables through the Granite State Market Match and Double Up Food Bucks programs.

COVID-19 left more people food insecure – they no longer have access to the nutritious food needs to lead a healthy life. New Hampshire experienced an estimated 55% increase in food insecurity over the last 2 years. In New Hampshire, an estimated one in nine people including 12 % of children, struggle with food insecurity.

The New Hampshire Food Bank stares down hunger each day from all sides. To learn more about how the New Hampshire Food Bank is creating systemic change visit nhfoodbank.org.

Vision by Emily Lovely

August is Children's Vision and Learning Month



- This month was started in 1995 with a presidential proclamation from Bill Clinton to help parents and educators understand that undiagnosed vision problems can block learning.
- One in four children has an undiagnosed vision problem.
- Experts estimate that up to 80% of what a child learns in school is information presented visually
- Visual problems are often confused as laziness, a learning disability, or ADHD
- Vision is more than 20/20
 - Unfortunately parents and educators often incorrectly assume that if a child passes a school vision screening then there is no vision problem
 - School vision screenings often only test for visual activity but the skills needed for successful reading and learning are much more complex
- Vision can change frequently during the school year , so it is important to keep and eye out for the following symptoms between appointments:
 - Headaches, particularly eye strain
 - Short attention span
 - Excessive blinking
 - Poor hand-eye coordination
 - Difficulty remembering what was read
 - Holding reading materials close to the face
 - Covering one eye
