

#### Michelle Ackroyd, Childhood Cancer Chair



During a recent Relay for Life, Lions met two wonderful families who have heard those words, "Your child has cancer" at a very young age. We heard the story of James who at 11-months old heard those words and his family had to make the decision if they wanted him to do a trial treatment for his cancer. The money that is raised for Gold Together goes towards research into Childhood Cancer. This is one of the ways that the Lions can help families who are dealing with Children with Cancer – support research for a cure. Thankfully James is now three and is cancer free and full of energy.

#### Kris Pavlik, Diabetes Chair

Fear. That is the first emotion to hit someone when they are first diagnosed with Diabetes 2. The fear that everything is about to change in your life. Fear of never being able to eat your favorite foods again. Fear of the medications. Next comes the feeling of being overwhelmed. What can I eat? How does this food or that food impact my glucose? Monitoring your glucose levels becomes a way of life – and let me tell you, some days you just can't tell how something will impact you. You can eat something in one moment and not see a change in your glucose levels for an hour or more. You can eat something one day with little to no change in glucose, and the next the same thing spikes your glucose out of an acceptable range. It's not just what you eat or drink. It is the combination of Food, Stress and Activity.

All of this is from my own experience. Throughout this year I will share my experiences with diabetes along with tips, recipes, advice from experts, and ideas for Service Projects.

#### Recipe/Tip:

Snacks – crackers and chips are not diabetic friendly, so ditch them. Some of my favorite go to snacks –

- 1) Cucumber slices with salad dressing or hummus
- 2) Apple slices with cheddar cheese and sliced pepperoni
- 3) Peach slices with balsamic vinegar. (it's amazing!)
- 4) Grapefruit sliced and sectioned, with 2 drops of honey and a sprinkle of cinnamon. Broil for 20-25 mins.

#### **Service Project:**

Ask a local chef or Nutritionist to do a low carb/diabetic friendly demonstration. Many libraries will let you cook in their community rooms. Check with your local grocery store. They may allow a demonstration of this kind. Talk to the local gym. Serve low carb snacks. Be creative!

#### Jeri Maynard, Environment Chair

Did you know, according to recent estimates, at least one-third of all food produced in the world goes to waste. Again, an estimate, but that translates to 1.3 billion tons of fruits, vegetables, meat, dairy, seafood, and grains either never leave the farm, get lost/spoiled during distribution, or are thrown away by hotels, restaurants, grocery stores or home kitchens- that is enough to feed every underfed person on our planet!

But since this is an environmental column, we will focus on the environmental impact and not the humanitarian (hunger) impact. When we waste food, we also waste all the energy and water that it takes to grow, harvest, transport, and package it before it arrives to the market and finally, your home. The food cycle does not end at our trash can--- it ends up in landfills where it rots and produces methane - a greenhouse gas that is more potent than carbon dioxide. One more estimate: the food wasted in landfills is responsible for roughly 8% of all global emissions!

#### Why is so much food wasted??

- Food waste can happen right at the production stage due to unskilled labor, natural disasters, or just plain poor practices- food never makes it to the consumer
- Food wastes occurs when edible food is allowed to spoil, goes past its expiration date or is just thrown away
- Food waste can also happen from overproduction- grocery stores, restaurants, etc. order more food than needed
- Food waste may occur because it does not conform to the retailer's quality and aesthetic standards

#### How can you do your part to reduce food waste?

- 1. Plan, buy only what you need (do not go to the store on an empty stomach)
- 2. Use your freezer frozen food is just as nutritious as fresh food (even better in some cases)
- 3. Use your leftovers be creative with what you have (some websites can give you new recipes for the food you already have on hand)
- 4. Imperfect fruits and vegetables may not look pretty but are delicious in smoothies, jams, sauces, bread, or soup stock
- 5. Feed to life stock and save on expensive commercial feeds (my little visiting bunnies love the salad greens)
- 6. Finally, COMPOST, one final estimate: the average household could divert about 330 lbs. of food waste from landfills by adopting home composting.

Do you know the difference between "best buy", "use by" and "sell-by" dates???

#### Martha Ackerman, Hunger Chair

Grow Nashua - 20 Broad Street Nashua, NH 03064; thinking outside the box.

"Imagine a reliable and just community where resources are shared, and people know their neighbors. We believe in this future and are laying this foundation one neighborhood at a time through sharing land, fresh food, and other valuable community resources." Grow Nashua creates urban vegetable farms in our city and schools and uses this common ground to empower people to foster relationships in our community. They continue to sow the seeds of hope and community connectedness, through their urban growing spaces and educational programming that will lead to a resilient Nashua. Their programs fit cohesively together and provide participants with the education and resources needed to successfully grow, cook, and eat healthy; while advocating for our local food system.

Grow your own food... They've built raised bed gardens throughout the city to share with families to grow their own nutritious produce! No experience required and they are available throughout the season to share growing tips, offer a hand, and learn from one another! Priority is given to families of Nashua that have insufficient access to fresh foods and a place to grow them. Everything is free to participate, and they share seeds, water, nutrients and education throughout the season to help you grow successfully. You'll have your own plot and also be connected to some of your neighbors that also grow in the space!

Impact future generations.. Let's make a shift for our children from just being "food consumers" to being "food producers". They have urban garden sites in eight different neighborhoods throughout Nashua, so when signing up please specify which neighborhood is most convenient for your family. They have tried to place the gardens in neighborhoods that qualify as food deserts (a.k.a. no fresh produce stores within walking distance).

Through their Growing Education programming, they offer fun and interactive learning experiences where children are:

- Given a platform to share their experiences and build new knowledge
- Provided a safe outlet to connect with nature


