

Childhood Cancer by Michelle Ackroyd

Childhood Cancer Facts:

- Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease in children under the age of 19 in the U.S.
- Childhood cancer research is vastly and consistently underfunded.
- One in 285 children in the U.S. will be diagnosed with cancer by the time they are 20 years old.
- Every year, an estimated 250,000+ new cases of cancer affect children under the age of 20 worldwide.
- Two-thirds of childhood cancer patients will have long lasting chronic conditions from treatment.
- One in five children diagnosed with cancer in the U.S. will not survive. (For the ones who do, the battle is never over.)
- Because of the treatments they had as kids, more than 99% of childhood cancer survivors will have a chronic health problem and 96% will have severe or life-threatening conditions.
- Much of what we know about treating adult cancers has been learned from childhood cancer research.
- In 80% of kids with cancer, the cancer has already spread to other areas of the body by the time it is diagnosed. (That's why so many children with cancer need to begin treatment right away. Many adult cancers can be diagnosed early.)
- Every two minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer. · The average age of a child diagnosed with cancer is 6

ENVIRONMENT

WILL YOU BE GREEN THIS CHRISTMAS???

Did you know that between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, Americans throw away approximately a million extra tons of trash each week? This includes seasonal decorations (trees, wreaths, garland), holiday wrapping (paper, bows) and packaging (includes shipping materials). When you add in the electricity (cost and extra usage) of the holiday lights, we use more than some countries use in an entire year! It is a shame that so much water, oil, and trees are wasted every year just to produce items that are only used once and then thrown away...

How can we help by striving for a "Green Christmas"? Here a few ideas:

1. **Make your own Christmas wrappings:** Can use craft paper (decorate yourself if you wish); comics of local newspaper, old maps, a pretty scarf, bandanas or any useful cloth item (dish towels)
2. **Buy LED Holiday Lights:** LED lights use 80% less energy and save you money as well. LED lights are cooler than traditional lights (less chance of fire) and will last for a much longer time- use a timer for even more savings
3. **Natural trees:** Studies show that a cut or a potted live tree are a much better choice for our environment. Potted trees can be replanted and will provide wild life habitat. Cut trees (try to purchase your tree from a pesticide free grower) can be recycled by chipping it into mulch, cut into firewood, use it for craft projects or compost it- visit Earth 911 for recycling ideas
4. **Artificial trees:** If cared for properly, artificial trees can last for many years. However, artificial trees are made mostly of PVCs (polyvinyl chloride) as well as other toxic metals that can lead to environmental and health-related problems. Since artificial trees can not be recycled, they must be burnt (releases toxins into air) or go into the land fill. You might want to consider an alternate tree like a book tree, wine bottle tree – use your imagination.
5. **Give DIY gifts,** ex: wood craft kits, puzzles, baking/cooking ingredients- again, use your imagination...
6. **"Experience Gifts"** How about tickets to a ball game, play, concert; zoo/museum/theme park passes; spa day gift card, lessons, or classes for a favorite hobby- help fulfill someone's "bucket list"
7. **Purchase eco-friendly and/or locally made gifts:** Local purchases not only help your local small businesses to survive, it will the amount of time using your car, shipping costs and less packaging. If not sure what to buy, purchase gift cards from area shops and restaurants, etc.
8. **Stuff those Santa stockings with yummy and natural treats:** Stocking stuffers tend to be small plastic trinkets that usually are broken, lost or end up in the trash. How about returning to the good old days and fill stockings with fruit, nuts, clementines, candy and homemade cookies

Douglas X. Alexander, from Brooklyn, New York, USA, was elected to serve as international president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 103rd International Convention, June 25 through June 29, 2021. As of June 28, 2022, he will serve as Chairperson for Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) through July 11, 2023.

Past International President Alexander is a retired vice president for J.P. Morgan Chase Bank.

A member of the Brooklyn Bedford Stuyvesant Lions Club since 1984, he has held many offices within the association, including club president, zone chair, region chair, vice district governor, district governor, cabinet secretary, cabinet treasurer and DGE group leader. He also served as a Lions Eye Bank transporter, a member of the District and Multiple District PDG Association, a trustee of the New York State and Bermuda Lions Foundation, and was appointed as the Lions representative to UNICEF-New York from 2012-2014. He has served on the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Planning and Host Committees and has been a presenter at several USA/Canada Forums.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards including the club Lion of the Year, Club President's Award, the Robert J. Uplinger Service Award, several District Governor Appreciation Awards, and the Multiple District Membership Growth Award. He is also the recipient of numerous International President's Certificates of Appreciation, multiple International President's Awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is a Dr. Franklin G. Mason Fellow, a W. P. Woods Fellow and a progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lions activities, Past International President Alexander is active in numerous professional and community organizations. He has served as chairperson of the advisory board for the New York Urban League and as a board member of the St. Francis DeSales School for the Deaf. He is also a recipient of the Congressional Record Award.

Past International President Alexander has two daughters, and his partner in service, Shabiki Cazabon, is a Lion and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Once again, this winter we will be having our burn pile party. Hot dogs and drinks will be served. Check the newsletter for the date.


Volunteers have been awesome, but more are needed to finish up in the spring, so get involved!


