

Michelle Ackroyd, Childhood Cancer Chair

Childhood Cancer Facts:

- Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease in children under the age of 19 in the U.S.
- Childhood cancer research is vastly and consistently underfunded.
- One in 285 children in the U.S. will be diagnosed with cancer by the time they are 20 years old.
- Every year, an estimated 250,000+ new cases of cancer affect children under the age of 20 worldwide.
- Two-thirds of childhood cancer patients will have long lasting chronic conditions from treatment.
- One in five children diagnosed with cancer in the U.S. will not survive. (For the ones who do, the battle is never over.)
- Because of the treatments they had as kids, more than 99% of childhood cancer survivors will have a chronic health problem and 96% will have severe or life-threatening conditions.
- Much of what we know about treating adult cancers has been learned from childhood cancer research.
- In 80% of kids with cancer, the cancer has already spread to other areas of the body by the time it is diagnosed. (That's why so many children with cancer need to begin treatment right away. Many adult cancers can be diagnosed early.)
- Every two minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer.
- The average age of a child diagnosed with cancer is 6.

ENVIRONMENT

Did you know that between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, Americans throw millions of trash away? Most holiday wrappings and packaging, not to mention shipping methods, all lead to waste and elevated carbon pollution. - SOOO - why not try to <u>Go Green</u> this year!

Here are some ideas to Go Green:

- 1. Make your own wrapping paper or go without ex: wrap gift in a pretty scarf or towel. Wrap with old newspapers, old maps, or use gift bags that are reuseable. There is recyclable wrap available if you must wrap.
- 2. Buy energy saving LED Lights: they last longer, are brighter and will save on your electricity bill
- 3. Add organic and local foods to your Holiday Dinner- healthier for you and supports your local farmers, etc.
- 4. Get a real tree: artificial trees have a short life span (unless well taken care of) and cannot be recycled. Real trees can be chipped, mulched, or recycled. Best yet, buy a live potted tree and plant outdoors after the holidays (be sure to dig a hole for it before the ground freezes).
- 5. Make homemade gifts (baked goods, jams, soaps, etc.) or give DIY craft sets
- 6. Give experimental gifts: ex; tickets to a ball game, play, passes to theme, water park or museums. How about giving Intro music lessons, art classes, craft classes.
- 7. Unsure what to give? How about gift cards to a local favorite shop, restaurant, or food merchant.
- 8. Buy locally- cut down on shipping costs and packing materials while supporting your local merchants

Aaah - The Holidays! A time full of parties and gatherings. A time laden with cookies, cakes, treats of all sorts. When preparing for a gathering or a gift for neighbors, skip the cookies, cakes and other treats for some diabetic friendly treats.

Savory Spiced Nuts:

3 Cups Nuts (almonds, pecans, walnuts)
3 Tbs melted butter
4 tsp garlic powder
5 Tbs Salt (Kosher or fine sea salt)
1/8 tsp cinnamon

½ Tbs chopped fresh rosemary Sprinkle of nutmeg and/or Allspice

¼ tsp chili powder

Preheat oven to 325 degrees Combine butter and spices Toss butter/spice mix with nuts until all nuts are coated Spread coated nuts in single layer on a cookie sheet Bake for 10-15 minutes, stirring every 5 minutes

Veggie Dip:

½ Cup Mayonnaise½ tsp garlic powder½ Cup Sour cream¼ tsp dried onion powder

1 ½ tsp dried parsley 1 ½ tsp fresh dill chopped (or ½ tsp dried dill

1/8 paprika 1 tsp lemon juice 1 ½ tsp fresh dill chopped (or ½ tsp dried dill Salt & Pepper to taste

Mix all ingredients and refrigerate till ready to serve. (at least 1 hour) Serve with veggies for dipping

Service Project Ideas:

<u>Food Pantries</u> in NH are running low this year. Why not have a Healthy Food Drive? Ask people for eggs, fruits and vegetables, nuts, common spices. Add in some high protein items – nut butters, beef jerky. Stay away from the Macaroni and cheese and pasta. Talk to your local food pantry before you go. Make sure they have the space for the fresher items. Note: POPCORN IS NOT A DIABETIC FRIENDLY TREAT! (trust me, I know!)

<u>Santa Party</u> – Heavy on games light on sweet treats. Put on some fun dance music. Sing songs. Have some prizes for the kiddos to win.

<u>Dance Party at a local nursing home</u>: Play some music, Dance with the residents. Sing some Carols. Give out little gifts – whistles, little cars, fun little items.





All Grant Applications meeting the following guidelines will be reviewed at the next Lions Youth Services Meeting. Our meetings are held at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of every month at the Airport Diner in Manchester. We encourage all clubs to join us to present their request.

- 1) All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H.
- 2) The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Club per Lions year (July June) for different projects.
- 3) Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- 4) Each application should benenfit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- 4) Grant Applications <u>MUST</u> be mailed to: LYS, PO Box 156, Atkinson, NH 03811 by the last day of the month *prior* to the start of the project. *No reimbursements will be approved*.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the youth of our state, not to replace your club's support.

Tax Reminder

Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

2022-2023 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and	990-EZ or 990
total assets less than \$500,000	
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by <u>November 15</u> each year. Please note that *an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N*.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may apply for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an EIN online, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.

Please note that Lions Clubs International is not authorized to provide guidance regarding your club's filing. For frequently asked questions about tax issues and regulations affecting Lions clubs and leadership, visit the Lions Tax FAQ. Visit www.irs.gov/eo for complete details and to sign up for Exempt Organization's free email newsletter, EO">EO" Update, to receive up-to-date information posted on the charity pages of irs.gov.
