Employee Spotlight

RUSS SPARKS, SE Farm Bill Program Support Specialist

Q: As one of the newest NRCS employees, please help us get to know you better. Tell us a little bit about yourself.

I grew up on a family farm near Shirley, Indiana, and still help when I can. We currently have about 1,200 acres of corn and soybeans, and about 50 head of cattle. We've also raised hogs and goats. We are proud to have received the Hoosier Homestead Award for over 100 years of family farm ownership.

Agriculture has always been a part of my life. I showed hogs for 10 years in 4-H and was in FFA for 4 years. Going to Purdue for a degree in agriculture seemed like a no-brainer. I graduated in 2016 with a degree in Agronomic Business and Marketing.

Q: How did you become interested in conservation?

Coming from a farming background, conserving our natural resources for the future has always been important to me. I didn't really consider conservation as a career choice until I graduated from college and realized that selling equipment, seed, or other ag-related products didn't really interest me. Conservation seems like a better way to make a lasting impact and leave me with something to look back on with pride.

Q: Where did you work and what did you do before coming to Indiana NRCS?

I was fortunate to work for the Shelby County Soil and Water Conservation District as a resource specialist for nearly three years before joining NRCS. I focused on CRP, HEL determinations, and reviewing stormwater pollution prevention plans for the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

Voluntary Leave Transfer Program

Under the Voluntary Leave Transfer Program (VLTP), a covered employee may donate annual leave directly to another employee who has a personal or family medical emergency and who has exhausted his or her available paid leave. There is no limit on the amount of donated annual leave a leave recipient may receive from the leave donor(s). However, any unused donated leave must be returned to the leave donor(s) when the medical emergency ends. An employee may participate concurrently in both the VLTP and the Voluntary Leave Bank Program, if available.

To donate leave, please follow the steps below:

- Leave donations are submitted through WebTA
- From the employee main menu select "Leave Donations"
- From LTP Donations select "Add Donation"
- Click on "Search LTP Account"
- Type in leave recipient's name and hit "Search"
- Hit "Select"
- Type of leave is automatically shown as 61-Donated Annual Leave
- Input the number of hours you wish to donate
- Search accounting that is associated with your division/section
- Hit "Save"
