MONDAY 14th and 28th at 10:00AM - “Canoe Mosquito Lagoon”. Reservations will be accepted a week before the canoe date. Join a guide as you explore this rich and diverse estuary up close. Some experience is preferred. You must be at least 8 years old and able to paddle. You must wear completely enclosed shoes (no sandals or flip-flops). Bring water, sunscreen, and a hat. Dress to get wet. There is a \$25 canoe rental fee. Call (386) 428-3384 ext. 0 to reserve your spot. Meet at the Pavilion behind the Visitor Center. (2 hours)

WEDNESDAY 2nd, 9th, 23rd, and 30th - “PLANT WALK” 10:00AM. Join us every Wednesday for a walk to identify the plants of Canaveral National Seashore and find out how they have been utilized over the years. Each walk is led by an experienced volunteer and covers a different part of the park. Please bring water for hydration and wear shoes for trail walking. (2 hours) The walks in March will be as follows:

1. **Mar. 2nd** - Turtle Mound. Meet at 9:45am. Use the Turtle Mound parking area or boat ramp parking lot and walk down.
2. **Mar. 9th** - Eldora. Meet at 9:45am at parking lot number 8.
3. **Mar. 23rd** - The loop trail on Eldora Rd. Meet at 9:45am at parking lot number 9.
4. **Mar. 30th** - Castle Windy. Meet at 9:45am at parking lot number 3 (ocean side).

Learn a little about their fascinating story. We'll walk on the boardwalk to the top of Turtle Mound, the largest shell midden in the mainland U.S. Because its location straddles both the temperate and subtropical climate zones, there is also a great variety of plant life to be discovered. Meet in Parking Lot 1 for the short walk to the mound. (1 hour)"Visitor Center. (2 hours)

Tuesday 8th 11:00AM - "BROWN BAG LUNCH". Join us for a monthly discussion of interest to the community. Bring a lunch to share after the presentation.
