Following a rigorous selection process, Georgia and Ben, KDS juniors, were chosen to represent the school during the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution's 128th annual Continental Congress in Washington, D.C., this June.

All junior students were invited to apply for this honor. Applicants' names were passed on to a nominating committee, resulting in ten finalists who were interviewed by a panel comprised of members of the KDS Executive Committee, Administrative Staff, and High School faculty.

Georgia Turner is the 17-year-old daughter of Tilghman and Diana Turner. She has been a student at KDS since Kindergarten. An excellent student, Georgia holds a GPA of 4.30 and is ranked 5th in the junior class. Her favorite subject in school is English because she loves to read.
