
EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST Divine Service, Setting One—LSB 151

Faith in Christ Is Rich Toward God

To live for earthly things "is vanity and a striving after wind," and work that is driven by such vanity "is an unhappy business" (Eccl. 1:13–14). The man who lives like that has nothing to show for "all the toil and striving of heart with which he toils beneath the sun ... all his days are full of sorrow" (Eccl. 2:22–23). So, too, your "covetousness, which is idolatry" (Col. 3:5), makes a god out of that which cannot give you life or happiness. For "one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). But "Christ who is your life" (Col. 3:4), in giving you Himself, gives you all the wealth of heaven. Instead of striving to lay up treasures for yourself, be "rich toward God" in Him (Luke 12:21).









Old Testament Reading

Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-26

Vanity of vanities, says the Preacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity. . . .

I the Preacher have been king over Israel in Jerusalem. And I applied my heart to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven. It is an unhappy business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. I have seen everything that is done under the sun, and behold, all is vanity and a striving after wind. . . .

I hated all my toil in which I toil under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to the man who will come after me, and who knows whether he will be wise or a fool? Yet he will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. So I turned about and gave my heart up to despair over all the toil of my labors under the sun, because sometimes a person who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave everything to be enjoyed by someone who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. What has a man from all the toil and striving of heart with which he toils beneath the sun? For all his days are full of sorrow, and his work is a vexation. Even in the night his heart does not rest. This also is vanity.

There is nothing better for a person than that he should eat and drink and find enjoyment in his toil. This also, I saw, is from the hand of God, for apart from him who can eat or who can have enjoyment? For to the one who pleases him God has given wisdom and knowledge and joy, but to the sinner he has given the business of gathering and collecting, only to give to one who pleases God. This also is vanity and a striving after wind.






Nicene Creed





Music Notes:

A quick note on the two hymns with the asterisk (*): The synod's officially appointed hymn of the day is number 782, which we have moved to the opening hymn and appointed an alternate suggestion for singing immediately prior to the sermon. While the synod does provide an appointed "hymn of the day" in coordination with the lectionary, unlike the rest of the lectionary appointments (readings, introits, graduals, etc...), the hymn is more of a recommendation. It is understood that not all congregations know all 180+ titles the synod has appointed across the three-year cycle, and will make substitutions as necessary. In addition, on times where the hymn is known, but is either brief or less verbose, we will often sing it at another point in the service and substituted with a hymn that is equally appropriate for the readings of the day. As the hymn of the day is the "chief hymn" of the service, it most directly supports the themes and teaching of the readings. It is also sung in a position where the assembly is seated and the rhythm of alternating between listening and singing has brought us to a heightened contemplative state where we are better able to receive and process ideas. As such, hymns that are more didactic and lengthy are better suited for this position in the service, as well as this function.
