Welcome! We encourage you to follow along with either the printed service, or with the hymnal. The page numbers for the hymnal are posted at the front of the sanctuary and on the next page. We realize it can take a while for newcomers to become familiar with our liturgy, so please feel free to ask someone near you for assistance—he or she would be happy to help.

We love children in our church! But if your little one gets fussy

you may use the **cry room** that is located at the north end of the hallway behind the sanctuary on your right. You are able to see and hear the worship service from there. We also have **"Quiet Bags"** available for children to use during the service. Please ask an usher or elder if you need assistance. The Quiet Bags are returned after the service.

The Lord's Supper is celebrated in our services today. In this supper, our Lord Jesus Christ graciously feeds the humble sinner with His true body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. Scripture clearly teaches that anyone who eats and drinks the body and blood of Christ without discerning that body and blood receives a judgment rather than a blessing from God (1 Cor. 11:29). Therefore, out of a Christian concern for souls, we require a thorough instruction in the teachings of the Lutheran Church before participating in this Sacrament. Participation at the altar is also a testi-




mony of unity of faith with all others who partake (1 Cor. 10:17). Since unity at the altar presupposes unity in doctrine and confession (Acts 2:42), we kindly request that only those who are in confessional fellowship with the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod participate. This includes active members in good standing of all sister Missouri-Synod congregations.

We recognize that Closed Communion is a sensitive issue for many and have a brochure to explain it more thoroughly. It is available in the narthex or from an usher. If you have any questions or concerns, you are welcome to speak with our pastor. However, we welcome both children and adults who are not communicant members of the Lutheran Church to come to the altar during communion for a pastoral blessing. Please indicate the request for a blessing by crossing your arms over your chest.

BLESSED REFORMATION DAY!

Today's service is a special occasion, and one of the most important celebrations of the year for Lutherans. Today we commemorate the events of the 16th century that led to the Reformation and the beginning of the Lutheran church! It was on October 31, 1517, that Martin Luther nailed his *Ninety-five Theses* to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. This set in motion a series of events that led to a rediscovery of the Gospel and the reforming of the church so that grace, mercy, and forgiveness would be proclaimed as the free gift of God to all people. Today's service will be marked by music written by Martin Luther himself, including his settings of the songs from the communion rite when he first adapted it to the language of the people. The entire service is printed here in this bulletin. May our celebration together proclaim with joyfulness the goodness of God in sending his Son to bear our sin and be our Savior!

MARTIN LUTHER 1483-1546



Martin Luther was born on November 10, 1483 in Eisleben, Germany, to Hans and Margarethe Luther. It was his father's wish that Martin become a lawyer, and it was toward this goal that he began his education.

Luther was deeply religious, and the question of his salvation troubled him during this period of his life. On July 17, 1505, he entered the Black Cloister of the Augustinian Order, having taken a vow to become a monk. Still not finding the peace of mind and soul that he sought, Luther became a priest and was ordained on May 2, 1507. One year later he began his career as a professor at the University of Wittenberg. Here, Luther began His studies and lectures on the Bible.

St. Paul's Letter to the Romans presented Luther with a clear understanding of the Gospel - salvation by grace alone! Luther's heart leapt for joy at this revelation, and he searched the Scriptures for further understandings. Luther's insight created a problem, however - the Church taught salvation by works. These two parties were headed for conflict.

On October 31, 1517, Luther nailed a list of Ninety-five Theses for Debate to the Castle Church door in Wittenberg. *Out of love for the elucidation of the truth, the following theses will be debated...in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.* Luther's Ninety-five Theses were designed to clear up doctrinal questions, but church leaders were not interested in these questions. The end result was Luther found his views, which the Bible clearly supported, were not welcome. He was asked to appear before the Emperor Charles V and the Diet of Worms to answer the charges against him. His reply to the Emperor is historic: "Unless I am convinced of error by the testimony of Scripture or by clear reason...I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against one's conscience. God help me. Amen."

Luther died on February 17, 1546, but the legacy of hymns, lectures, and theology that form the rich heritage of the Lutheran Church live on after him.

Catechesis for the week of October 26

But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

What is the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed?

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. What does this mean?

Epistle Romans 3:19–28

Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

From a Sermon on John 1:29, Martin Luther writes:

May you ever cherish and treasure this thought. Christ is made a servant of sin, yea, a bearer of sin, and the lowliest and most despised person. He destroys all sin by Himself and says: "I came not to be served but to serve" (Matt. 20:28). There is no greater bondage than that of sin; and there is no greater service than that displayed by the Son of God, who becomes the servant of all, no matter how poor. wretched, or despised they may be, and bears their sins. It would be spectacular and amazing, prompting all the world to open ears and eyes, mouth and nose in uncomprehending wonderment, if some king's son were to appear in a beggar's home to nurse him in his illness, wash off his filth, and do everything else the beggar would have to do. Would this not be profound humility? Any spectator or any beneficiary of this honor would feel impelled to admit that he had seen or experienced something unusual and extraordinary, something magnificent. But what is a king or an emperor compared with the Son of God? Furthermore, what is a beggar's filth or stench compared with the filth of sin which is ours by nature, stinking a hundred thousand times worse and looking infinitely more repulsive to God than any foul matter found in a hospital? And yet the love of the Son of God for us is of such magnitude that the greater the filth and stench of our sins, the more He befriends us, the more He cleanses us, relieving us of all our misery and of the burden of all our sins and placing them upon His own back. All the holiness of the monks stinks in comparison with this service of Christ, the fact that the beloved Lamb, the great Man, yes, the Son of the Exalted Majesty, descends from heaven to serve me.

Such benefactions of God might well provoke us to love and to laud God and to celebrate this service in song and sermon and speech. It should also induce us to die willingly and to remain cheerful in all suffering. For how amazing it is that the Son of God becomes my servant, that He humbles Himself so, that He cumbers Himself with my misery and sin, yes, with the sin and the death of the entire world! He says to me: "You are no longer a sinner, but I am. I am your substitute. You have not sinned, but I have. The entire world is in sin. However, you are not in sin; but I am. All your sins are to rest on Me and not on you." No one can comprehend this. In yonder life our eyes will feast forever on this love of God. And who would not gladly die for Christ's sake? The Son of Man performs the basest and filthiest work. He does not don some beggar's torn garment or old trousers, nor does He wash us as a mother washes a child; but He bears our sin, death, and hell, our misery of body and soul. Whenever the devil declares: "You are a sinner!" Christ interposes: "I will reverse the order; I will be a sinner, and you are to go scotfree." Who can thank our God enough for this mercy?

"Liturgical Vestment: Chasuble"

You may have noticed the special vestment worn by one of the pastors today, known as the chasuble. The word chasuble comes from the Latin casula, which means "little house". The ancient Romans wore the casula, a thick poncho-like cloak, when they travelled because it provided a "little house" for them in bad weather. In the middle ages, clergymen likewise wore the casula while travelling. Over time, as travel became easier, these garments became more ornate in the church and took on a symbolic function.

Today, the chasuble serves various purposes. First, it identifies the wearer as the presiding minister, i.e. the minister who presides over the Lord's Supper, often called the "celebrant." Second, it highlights the importance of Holy Communion. If the Lord's Supper is the high-point of the Divine Service, it's fitting that the presiding minister should be vested in the finest the church can provide him. Finally, it serves to reinforce the liturgical color of the day (much like a pastor's stole) and may also be used particularly on high feasts and special occasions.

First Reading: Revelation 14:6-7

Then I saw another angel flying directly overhead, with an eternal gospel to proclaim to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people. And he said with a loud voice, "Fear God and give him glory, because the hour of his judgment has come, and worship him who made heaven and earth, the sea and the springs of water."

Epistle: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it— the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former

sins. It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

Holy Gospel: John 8:31-36

So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." They answered him, "We are offspring of Abraham and have never been enslaved to anyone. How is it that you say, 'You will become free'?"

Jesus answered them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not remain in the house forever; the son remains forever. So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed."
