Our chapter's roots came from a desire to host MROPs in Arizona. We hosted our first MROP in 2005 in Oracle, Arizona, which is a small town about 35 miles northeast of Tucson. I was initiated there in 2005.



During my initiation, it became clear in my heart that I needed to continue working to bring men back to God. I have been involved in Men's Spirituality work since 1998 and my initiation reinforced my calling to continue this work.

During my time in the desert, I had a vision of a place of many trees along a softly flowing river, with leaves shimmering in the sun from a gentle breeze blowing through. Several months later, when I shared this story with Brad Kuluris, he looked at me with a smile and said this was Aravaipa Canyon. He had a similar story, from his MROP in 2003, of seeing a place with golden vistas. When he shared this with Fr. Richard Rohr, he said, "Oh, I know that place. It's Aravaipa Canyon."

In 2008, Brad, my son Chris, and I went to Aravaipa. When I saw the creek and the cottonwood trees, I knew this was the place I saw in my vision. We said, "This is where we need to host M.A.L.Es [now Illuman] events." At this point, we met David, who has a ranch in Aravaipa Canyon. Richard knows David and when David dedicated the ranch as a place for spiritual renewal, Richard was there. We then began planning to have events at Aravaipa and, in 2009, hosted our first event with a FIRMinG. Since then, we have hosted another FIRMinG, five MROPs, and several other retreats. We had to postpone our April 2020 MROP, but look forward to April 2022 for our next one. Aravaipa Canyon is a great place for transformative experiences. If you have not been, I hope to see you there in the near future.

As mentioned, I feel called to continue in men's spirituality work in ways I am led and with the gifts I have been given. It has been an interesting journey. My spiritual growth has slowly increased as I am more connected with God and the people around me. Through this process, I have met many great men.
