The Anti-Racism Working Group suggests that church members might do the following:

## **READ**

<u>Women of the Dawn</u>, University of Nebraska Press, available online through several book sellers. Approximately \$15.00.

Women of the Dawn is a personal biography of 3 Wabanaki women who lived in Maine, Massachusetts and one of whom was a fine dancer who studied and lived in France then returned to Maine. The stories are drawn from historical source documents, interviews with a historian who knew one of the Wabanaki women and writings about the seasonal migration pattern of the Wabanaki people.

## **WATCH**

The Anti-Racism Working Group suggests watching Dawnland. Dawnland is the untold story of indigenous children removed in the US through the nation's first Truth and Reconciliation Commission. This commission investigated the disturbing impact of Maine's Child Welfare practices regarding the Wabanaki people. You can find <u>Dawnland</u> on PBS.org.
