Dr. Brigitte Colley was born in Normal, IL, and was raised in Macomb. She is a 2013 graduate of the University of Missouri St. Louis College of Optometry. Prior to completing her optometric education, Dr. Colley earned a BA in Biology from Truman State University. In her sophomore year of high school, she was assigned a career speech. Her choir director, who had retinitis pigmentosa suggested she interview their local ophthalmologist. She reflects that she “was interested in a career in healthcare, but ophthalmology didn’t feel like quite the right fit.
