Lecture By Andrew I. Port, Ph.D
Professor of History, Wayne State University

Germany will remain indelibly associated with Nazism and the genocide of European Jewry. But since 1945, the Federal Republic of Germany has served as a haven for refugees and others seeking asylum.

This talk discusses how German efforts to deal with their country's sordid past have stimulated a variety of humanitarian efforts since World War II – including support for mass groups of refugees fleeing genocidal regimes across the globe.

Why have Germans so successfully embraced the lessons of the past while Americans struggle to do so?
