Shawn Healy, PhD, leads the Robert R. Healy chaired the Illinois Task Force on Civic Education in 2014 and later led the separate legislative campaigns for a required civics course in Illinois in middle and high school. Healy also serves as an adjunct professor in Public Administration at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Before joining the McCormick Foundation, he served as a social studies teacher at West Chicago Community High School and Sheboygan North High School. A 2001 James Madison Fellow from the State of Wisconsin, he holds a M.A. and PhD from the University of Illinois at Chicago in political science and earned a bachelor's degree with distinction in Political Science, History and Secondary Education from the University of Wisconsin at Madison.
