TRANSITIONS AND NEW BEGINNINGS

Moving from Summer into the Program Year

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

There's an old joke about a group of explorers hacking their way through a dense jungle as they try to find a nearby town. They pause as one guy carefully climbs up the tallest tree in the area to take a sighting. He climbs back down and announces, "I've got good news and I've got bad news."

The group asks, "What's the good news?" With a smile on his face, he replies, "We're making great time." They follow up. "What's the bad news?" Sadly, he shares, "We're heading the wrong direction."

Which direction are you heading? We have some choices this fall.

We often talk of the New Year as a time of resolutions and new things, but at least in the church (and in much of our society), it is Autumn that is a time of new starts. And choices.

School is starting up, with families transitioning...into days with kids at school...with a parent alone at home...with the stress of after school activities...with empty nests again, or for the first time.

Sunday mornings at church are transitioning...from one service to two...from occasional special events to weekly Sunday Church School and Adult Forum...

The rest of the week gets busier at church...with choir rehearsals...and confirmation classes...and youth nights...and adult Bible Studies...and the Fall Stewardship mission focus and invitation...

We add a few more special events, like...a yard sale...Trunk of Treat...bringing back the Progressive Dinner...

There are special opportunities like...youth retreats...a women's retreat at Bear Creek Camp...maybe a service trip event?...

It's also a time to try some new things. I'm hoping to plan for...a Blessing of the Animals (on a new day/time) ...perhaps a spiritual gifts workshop for those who didn't attend yet...maybe young parents gathering to share ideas and ways to bring devotions and Bible into the home...

Lots of ideas and opportunities.

Here are a couple of suggestions from me. (Not to overwhelm with more stuff and busier schedules, but to invite to some healthy choices and balance for body, mind, spirit, and relationships.)

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARK CONTINUED

<u>**1 – Get involved.**</u> This is more for newer worshipers, or people less active. Try something new.

Maybe you've been here for years but never tried ushering or helping with communion.

Maybe you are newer, and don't know that many people, and an event like Trunk or Treat or the Progressive Dinner would expand those relationships.

You might be dealing with some loss or transition, or you're just ready to grow, and a Bible Study or small group (Tuesday REST or book club or...) might be a needed experience and community.

Perhaps you're ready to roll up your sleeves and get involved in a ministry team.

Dare to step into something new.

<u>2 – Don't assume.</u> This is more for leaders and people who have been around for a while. When you advertise, or announce, or invite, "tell the impact story." Go beyond the facts and share the experience, the impact, the blessing. (The longer we have been here, the easier it is to assume everyone knows.)

I have talked with a couple newer members recently and mentioned the Progressive Dinner. "Do you know what that is?" I'll ask. "No." So, I tell the impact story.

We might just make the announcement that, "We're doing the Progressive Dinner again, so make sure you sign up." Some people will excitedly sign up, some might ask about it, but some won't even consider it because they don't understand, and so it seems like this event is not for them.

When I talked with newer members about it, I shared the experience...going to several homes... meeting a different group at each place...perhaps a chance to host one of them...laughter and community and good food and making or deepening friendships. The impact story.

Consider how we might tell that impact story with our ministries, with service projects, with small groups and worship opportunities. How can you let someone know, not just what is happening when (There's a Women's Retreat at Bear Creek Camp), but what the impact is (here are some of the activities, and here's how someone from last year's retreat described the experience).

Returning to my opening illustration, as fall gears up, it's easy to just get busy, reacting, with no particular vision. We might be "making good time" but going in the wrong direction. How might you step into something new that might step the right direction – deepening relationships, growing in Christ, living out your faith in a new way? And how might we invite each other in ways that share the impact stories and point to what God is doing in our midst?

Let's grow together.

You are welcome to join a group of Advent members, and guests and friends, for a monthly gathering at Branch Creek Taphouse, in Souderton, 30 W. Chestnut St. Souderton, PA 18964.

What is Pub Theology?

It is an open gathering (you don't have to be a church member, or even regular worshiper, so bring that friend or neighbor)



where we pour a pint (you can pour your own at the taphouse)and discuss a faith-related question (NOT a Bible study or teaching, but a conversation).

The setting is public, the atmosphere is welcoming of all viewpoints, the invitation is to be yourself and welcome others as we listen and share.

For regular members, we come trusting that God's presence and spirit is there inviting and caring in a non-judgmental setting. For others, it's a safe place to ask questions or share perspectives and step into some faith conversations. For all of us, it is a time of honest sharing and questioning and pondering together.

Past topics we've discussed are Space for Faith, the Power of Symbols, and Traditions.



TUESDAY REST, Tuesday, September 2, 6:00pm

We offer a short half-hour devotional and centering worship service on the first Tuesday of the month. It's called Tuesday R.E.S.T. (Restore Eachother's Spirit & Time).

The service is loosely based on ELW's "Perfect Love Casts Out Fear: Evening Prayer." In a time of stress, anxiety, and concern, you are invited to gather in a way that centers your spirit and nurtures your faith.

As August arrives, the air begins to shift

ever so slightly—school supplies fill store shelves, calendars get updated with new schedules and families prepare to return to more regular rhythms of daily life. There's something about this season that invites reflection. A

turning of the page. A beginning again.

In the church, we mark our beginnings at the waters of Baptism. Whether we were splashed as infants or immersed as adults, we carry those waters with us. We are marked with the cross of Christ forever—and that mark shapes how we live, how we love, and how we move through the world.

This fall, as life picks up speed again, I want to invite you to consider: What spiritual rhythms shape your daily living? When the calendar fills up and the pace of life quickens, it becomes even more important to ground ourselves in the practices that give life.

In Baptism, we make promises—not just once, but every day we rise and remember we belong to God. So how might we live them more fully this season?

- How do we live among God's faithful people? Maybe it's returning to worship regularly or connecting with a small group. Community is not a luxury; it's a lifeline.
- How do we hear the Word and share the meal? Could you carve out time each week to read Scripture or join a Bible study? Or simply come to the Table on Sunday and let grace nourish you?
- How do we proclaim Christ through our words and actions? A kind word, a generous gesture, an act of forgiveness—they preach louder than most sermons.
- **How do we serve all people?** Look around. Where is God calling you to show up—with hands ready, and a heart open?
- How do we strive for justice and peace in all the earth? This world is aching. Don't underestimate the power of your voice, your vote, your presence at the margins.

Yes, life is busy. I get it. Kids to school, work deadlines, appointments, aging parents, news cycles. It's overwhelming.

But here's what I know: Tending to your spiritual life won't drain you. It will ground you. It may be the very thing that saves you when everything else seems to fall apart.

So this fall, fall back into church. Fall back into rhythms of grace. Fall back on Jesus—and see just how strong those arms can be.







SEPTEMBER WORSHIP VOLUNTEERS

WORSHIP ROLES

Please consider signing up for worship leadership and volunteering. Not only will you be serving and helping your congregation in worship; many people find some of these roles to be opportunities to deepen faith and become more invested in the worship service.

If you volunteer for something you haven't done before, we can pair you up with someone who's a "pro" (e.g. with ushering or altar guild) or provide some training for you (e.g. lector or worship assistant).

Here are some of the roles, and a brief description:

WORSHIP ASSISTANT: You will be robed, and have your own binder which includes hymns and prayers. Partner with the pastor in being up front and leading worship, with both liturgy and sharing the bread in communion.

LECTOR: You will receive a copy of the Bible reading (and intro) for Sunday, and will come forward to share that reading after the Psalm.

COMMUNION ASSISTANT: Two of you will come forward to receive communion, then will be offering the wine or grape juice to worshipers as they come by. After the first service, prepare communion for the second service. After second service, clean up – instructions and training are available.

ALTAR GUILD: You will set up communion (for the first service), and make sure all is attended to afterwards. There are additional opportunities to help with Sunday prep as you wish and are able. This is a great role to do with a partner, including being paired with a "pro" your first time.

USHERS: You two will welcome people and hand out bulletins, make sure the room is prepped (windows etc), count the attendance, usher people for communion, secure the offering, and clean up after worship. There are detailed instructions.

ACOLYTE: You will be robed, and will light the candles at the beginning of the service, and put them out at the end. Open to younger youth, but certainly not limited to any age.

WELCOME TABLE: You will welcome worshipers, especially those new to Advent. (The pastor can help identify people for you.) Give out a gift and invite them to sign our guest book if they are new.

BREAD: Bake and provide bread to be used for communion. We have a special recipe you can use, but you can also provide your own choice of bread.

NURSERY: Join our nursery attendant in watching children during the worship time, including bringing them to the sanctuary for the children's sermon, and again at communion time.
