A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARK



WORSHIP ROLES

Some stories and observations

Dear siblings in Christ,

When I used to do training of acolytes, I would usually start by asking them,

"What is the most important thing for you to remember before you go up and light the candles?"

I remember asking that once, and a girl said,

"To not burn the place down?"

Wise girl. I have decided her answer IS the most important, so I now ask,

"What is the second most important thing to remember."

Here is the answer I give.

"You are helping to create an environment where people can worship."

When an acolyte does their responsibilities smoothly and with purpose, it points to something bigger. The candles remind us of God's presence. Reverencing the altar (bowing to where the sacrament will be celebrated) is a way to remind us of God's sovereignty. The flame carried out from the candles at the end of the service reminds us that the light of God is brought out into the world.

I remind acolytes to be reverent and deliberate in all their movements, not drawing attention to themselves. If they mess something up, continue as calmly as possible. Keep the attention on worship, and God.

I remember one acolyte years ago, stepping out (too soon) to receive the offering. There was special music first. A solo. She might have reacted in horror, hurrying back to her chair to wait, and then coming back a second time, looking around to see who noticed. People would have watched her. Instead, she quietly folded her hands and turned slightly to face the musician, then just quietly stood there, listening to the music, refocusing the whole congregation on worship. When that was done, she turned back to the ushers and received the offering. Brilliant! One of my favorite acolyte moments ever.

Acolytes are not the only ones leading us in worship, and focusing our attention on God. We have a whole host of volunteers in a variety of roles, leading us, supporting us, and providing for us, as we gather each week in worship.

There are those who are up front, assisting in worship or reading the Bible reading of the day. I love seeing the brand-new volunteer, whether youth or adult, step up and read for the first time. I love the seasoned veteran who makes God's word live for us in the reading. I love having youth joining the adults as worship assistants, leading the congregation in worship. I remember, before I was a pastor, loving those opportunities to be worship assistant; I see that same passion in others. I'm not saying they are future pastors. I <u>am</u> saying there is a joy and purpose we can experience in leading worship.

There are behind-the-scenes roles like those who bake Communion Bread, and people who set up the Altar for communion. We have a bunch of bread-bakers who do a fabulous job and make that experience of the sacrament more real and earthy, God's promise in something tangible and tasty. And I have heard people who set up the altar in advance talk about a quiet reverence they experience, pausing to providing something so holy, and discovering a spiritual focus sometimes

in the midst of a chaotic week. There is meaning in that sort of service.

I reflect on ushers, doing a variety of things that help prepare for worship, direct us in the midst, and clean up afterwards. I think about the teamwork I've seen, whether a mentor and a confirmation youth volunteering together, or a family with a bright, energetic, young child who beams as she greets and welcomes everybody and hands out bulletins, or a woman who dispenses hugs and smiles as people come into the sanctuary. There is something extra holy about such regular work done for such a special reason.

I think about those who assist with communion, sharing the wine and grape juice, cleaning up after the second service, helping to provide an experience of Christ in a special way each week. That is holy work.

I think of probably our biggest need (behind the scenes except for a short moment after the reading of the gospel and before the sermon) – the nursery care people. These youth or adults volunteer each service to help our Nursery attendant, Morgan, as she provides a safe and comfortable and fun place for children during the worship service. By the way, I always want to be clear that we welcome children in worship even as we fully know they are not going to be perfect little angels for that full-time. But I also want parents to feel totally comfortable having their children in Nursery if that helps them concentrate and participate a little more fully. The Nursery volunteers allow that to happen and, almost without exception, seem to love that special role - that holy work - of caring for God's beloved children.

So... A lot of people helping out with worship. A variety of roles, a variety of gifts being used, a

variety of personalities and experiences joining together to help lead and support and focus us in worship.

If you are part of that great assembly of volunteers, thank you, thank you, thank you. I hope you find it rewarding and fulfilling. Please know that you are an immense blessing to this congregation!

For those of you who have not tried out volunteering in a worship role, or have considered expanding your involvement with another opportunity, I invite and challenge you to take the plunge. Let me know you are interested. Sign up in a week when the December sign-up genius goes live. I have rarely seen anyone try out a new role and not be smiling or nodding when they are done.

By the way, this whole topic is about good stewardship - using the time and talents and abilities God has given in a way that honors God. And... when people do that, like just about any other example of good stewardship, it tends to deepen their sense of belonging, and increase an experience of spirituality and of God. Getting involved "for the sake of God and others" ends up making a difference in our own lives. How cool is that?

To all those good stewards – thanks for your service. And to those considering – now is the time.



Hugging You to Life

Embraced by God. Embracing Others.

"Do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share"

1 Timothy 6:18

We hope you enjoyed and found meaningful the stewardship series of sermons in October. The Bible has many stories of Jesus healing and teaching – hugging followers to life. Pastor Mark's preaching focused on how we as followers of Jesus can let go of the things that constrain us in our human life – ownership, greed, the illusion of self-sufficiency and legalistic rights. By letting go of these constraints we can open ourselves up to the endless possibilities of hugging others into life.

"Hugging You to Life" reflects a heartfelt approach to stewardship - one that embraces people, purpose, and resources with love, accountability, and joy. Just as a hug offers comfort, strength, and connection, our stewardship embraces the mission, the community, and the future with intentional care.

If you have not already done so, please review the information in the Stewardship brochure you received and take time to think, pray, and discuss how you and your family will respond to God's grace in your life. We strongly encourage all families to provide an Estimate of Giving as this establishes your commitment to our ministry work and allows the church council to properly plan for the coming year. There are many opportunities for you to be engaged in our ministries. Please consider how you might participate and serve in our ministries.

We are requesting that you return your Estimate of Giving forms provided in the Stewardship packet on or before Commitment Sunday, November 9^{th} . Forms may be placed in the regular offering plates or mailed to the church office. We thank you for your generosity in support of our staff, ministries, and building.

Systematic Giving Options

- Simply Giving: For most people, we can grow significantly in our giving just by making our gift on a
 regular basis. Please consider signing up for this electronic giving program. In 2025, 63 Advent
 families are using the automatic giving program.
- **IRA Minimum Required Distributions:** Give in a tax efficient way. If you are age 70.5 or older, you can give directly from a traditional IRA/401k to the church and have that distribution qualify as your Required Distribution. **In 2025, 9 families or individuals are utilizing IRA giving. See info on the next page for more details.**

Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD)

The current tax law indicates that when a person reaches 73, they must take their required minimum distribution (RMD) from their traditional IRA accounts The amount of the distribution is determined by the balance of the account and your life expectancy determined by the IRS.

In the past, the RMD age was 70 ½.

Under the new law, a person can make a charitable contribution from their IRA account at 70 ½, they do not have to wait until 73. The taxpayer must inform the trustee of the IRA (i.e. the bank or investment company where the IRA is held) that they want to make a charitable contribution from their IRA. This is called the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). The trustee will be given the name and address of the nonprofit organization. By doing this, the amount of the QCD is deducted from the total distribution and sent to the nonprofit organization.

For instance, if your RMD is \$25,000 and you decide to give \$10,000 of that to your church or other nonprofit, you will only be taxed on \$15,000. This reduces your adjusted gross income; you cannot deduct a charitable contribution as an itemized deduction, since it has already been deducted from income.

Please discuss this further with your tax advisor and/or investment professional.

MEADOW GARDEN LUNCHEON AND PLANTING SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 15 @ 12NOON



Please join us at noon on Saturday, November 15 for a luncheon and meadow planting. We invite all those who are interested to join us! After lunch, thanks to a Thrivent grant, we will uncover the meadow areas and hopefully find that the grass is gone. We will plant and like all gardeners—we will wait—patiently wait.

Some curious Advent members joined us at Adult Forum to learn about how changing these areas of mowed lawn to wild meadow will attract and shelter the creatures of God's creation. We also gave out meadow seed mix packets and so, in addition to the two meadow areas at Advent, there will be some meadows sprouting in backyards and front yards all over our community. We're going to be learning and growing together.

Here's an update on our meadow areas:

The mowed lawn was successfully eliminated for the areas under the tarp, but the area that was tilled and then lightly covered in compost grew grass back even greener than the surrounding lawn! We learned that covering the area works best. So, we covered the entire area and it should be ready to plant.

If you missed the Adult Forum and would like some seed mix to plant a mini-meadow in your yard, we will still have some to share on our planting day.

Come let us sow together—join us in pulling the tarps and cardboard off then FINALLY sowing the seeds.

Minister of Music Trip Report

In October, I had the pleasure of visiting my friend David Furniss at his home in Oaxaca, Mexico. David and I have been friends for nearly 30 years (since I first began working at Advent). In 2020, he retired from his long career as Director of Music at St John's UCC in Lansdale, and now spends his time equally here and in Oaxaca. There is a strong organ culture in Oaxaca, with some beautiful historic instruments - a few of which I heard and played. In addition, I met some fantastic young organists who play these instruments regularly; they freely shared their expertise, knowledge and music.


About the organs:

Basilica de la Soledad. This 1719 instrument, by an unknown builder, is one of the oldest and most imposing organs in all of Mexico. The profile and dimensions, as well as the exquisite carved, painted, and gilded decoration, resemble those of the organ of Yanhuitlán, which may have been built around the same time. I am pictured playing this instrument.

The organ of San Jerónimo Tlacochahuaya is one of the most beautiful and also one of the most enigmatic of Oaxaca's baroque instruments. Unfortunately its provenance is unknown, but it is believed to have been built around 1725-30. The case and facade are exquisite! In the picture you can see the bellows to the right. (Both instruments in the photos can be dually operated, either with a blower or manually. This organ is exactly built like our Orgelkids organ, only bigger.

Besides the organ visits, I also saw overwhelming colors - everywhere! On the streets, in the lights, restaurants, clothing, rugs. Of course, there was mezcal (a tequila made from the agave plant) - a drink that I didn't care for... but it flows very freely. Oaxaca is the mezcal capital since the agave plants abound. Some of my favorite experiences were the parades. They happen almost daily, for any reason: wedding, funeral, Marian or Patron Saint feast, you name it.

Finally, I was thrilled by seeing all the VW Bugs! They're ubiquitous. In every color imaginable. With






