




History Highlights

- 1920 Founded

19th Amendment to the Constitution

- 1924 Organized in 80% of congressional districts
- 1930s Focus shifted to local organization
- 1940s Formal roles in the World Bank, IMF, and UN
- 1950s Established LWV Education program
- 1960s Apportionment
- 1970s ERA, support for popular elections, presidential debates
- 1980s Voting Rights Act of 1986, Tax Reform Act of 1986, 1988 Intermediate Nuclear Forces Treaty
- 1990s National Voter Registration Act (NVRA), known as “motor-voter”
- 2000s Help America Vote Act of 2002 and the Bipartisan Campaign Finance Reform Act of 2002
- 2010s Lawsuits challenging gerrymandering

Every eligible voter should have a fair and equal opportunity to register to vote and to cast their ballot. Millions of Americans miss the opportunity to vote because they don't know how to register or they miss their state's deadline to register.

WHAT WE'RE DOING


Our volunteers register hundreds of thousands of voters and host community voter registration drives across the country each year. We concentrate our registration drives at locations that reach large numbers of unregistered voters, including high schools and community colleges, transit hubs and naturalization ceremonies. Each year, we also help tens of thousands of Americans register online at VOTE411.org.

Redistricting/Fair Elections

- North Carolina: ground-zero for gerrymandering since at least 2010

• *I propose that we draw the maps to give a partisan advantage to 10 Republicans and three Democrats because I do not believe it's possible to draw a map with 11 Republicans and two Democrats.*

• *In response to claims that intentional racial discrimination animated its action, the State offered only meager justifications. Although the new provisions target African Americans with almost surgical precision, they constitute inapt remedies for the problems assertedly justifying them and, in fact, impose cures for problems that did not exist.*

- Every legislation district formed following the 2010 census has been challenged in court and found to be unconstitutional

Why North Carolina's House district lines have been upended – again

North Carolina's 10.3 million people are represented in the House of Representatives by 10 Republicans and three Democrats — although only a small majority of votes cast in 2016 were for Republican candidates. That lopsided result came courtesy of Republican gerrymandering, and on Aug. 27, a panel of federal judges declared that the GOP map-making is unconstitutional. [They said new districts were needed](#), throwing the midterm elections into chaos, but the plaintiffs now have asked the court not to order new maps by Nov. 6.


Fighting Voter Suppression

- We're also ground zero for racially-targeted voter suppression
- 2013 "Monster" anti-voter law – ruled unconstitutional
- 2018 Voter photo ID amendment passed
 - Photo ID prevents voter fraud: a 0.000020% rate of occurrence in 2016.
→ the real purpose is to prevent minorities, poor, and disabled citizens from voting
 - An aide to the NC House speaker asked the Board of Elections for "a breakdown, by race, of those registered voters in your database that do not have a driver's license number."
 - Somewhat less onerous than the 2013 version, but still problematic
- 2018 voting "issues"
 - The 9th Congressional District Vote Harvesting in Bladen County
 - Irregularities in Robeson and Columbus Counties
 - Issues going back as far as 2010!




Equal Rights Amendment

- Just one more state is needed for ratification!
- Bills will drop in NC Senate and House on March 5, 2019
- Grassroots effort underway: advocates in all 100 NC counties persuading their representatives to support, co-sponsor and vote FOR ratification


