I invite you to reflect on the question – in what way is your local church a spiritual community? What would your church look like if it were a spiritual community with clear responses to – Who, Why and What?

Human communities have a tendency, as time goes by, to become exclusive membership clubs, to serve

members only and make them happy. They become tradition bound and hold on to what is good only for their members. Their only purpose asserts serving the membership who support and pay for the services.

I have learned that if a local church is not attentive to the Spirit, does not have a clear identity and purpose it becomes an exclusive club that serves its members alone, ceasing to become a spiritual community called by God and empowered by the Holy Spirit to embody Christ in the world.

A Spiritual community defines itself by the One who has CALLED it into BEing. A Spiritual community is not exclusive but inclusive and expansive. It is not only tradition centered but balances tradition with innovation to remain relevant to the world in which it lives. It is not membership oriented but invites all participants to be part of the life of the community. It is not made up of separate boards, each with their own agenda, but is bound by a common vision and leadership toward a common calling for Who, Why and What. It does not serve itself but the wider community, the needs in its neighborhood, and even the world. A Spiritual community is always in movement as the Spirit guides, inspires and leads it to embody and represent God in the world.
