


Unfolding future human potential

Pan African Waldorf Teachers Conference - Michael Mount Waldorf School, Johannesburg, South Africa April 8th-12th, 2017

The Pan African Conference at the Michael Mount Waldorf School was the first conference of this kind in Africa. This conference was inspired and stimulated by the last World Teachers' Conference in Dornach 2016.



Over 350 attendees from Africa and international guest lecturers designed a diverse conference program. In the various lectures held in the morning, the development of the human being from birth to adulthood was the focus.

Florian Osswald, Clara Aerts, Martin Rawson and Bernd Ruf created important impulses for the conference theme, unfolding future human potential.

Florian Osswald presented rhythms and their meaning, in particular the importance of day and night rhythms. Here he drew particular attention to night-time learning. In addition, he also emphasised how instructors become more sensitive and attentive through the training path towards the encounter with colleagues, students and life itself.

Martyn Rawson gave the auditorium a lively presentation of the task of teaching in upper classes. He explained that this is not just about conveying the abstract presentation of the content. Learning is also a matter of feeling and perception. The student has to connect to the lessons and to be approached in a variety of ways! A special help can be a circus project. From the diversity of these tasks, qualifications such as teamwork, social competences and practical activities are transformed into an experience that makes learning quite different from that inside a classroom.

Florian Oswald concluded the conference with a very humorous speech: Let's get together! Let us be open to life in a way taught by the fairy-tale "Hans im Glück" by the Brothers Grimm! If we look at our encounters, we will discover that our future is shaped by this.
