Mike Frost

Mike Frost will be your guide for the tour of Cedar Grove Cemetery. You will learn the history of the city's oldest municipal cemetery, which was established in 1825, including why it is located where it is and why it was established. In addition, you will learn about the burial practices of the period and about some of the prominent individuals who are interred there.

Mike Frost began his involvement with the Norfolk Society for Cemetery Conservation in the Fall of 2014. He first attended one of the tours of Elmwood Cemetery led by Joshua Weinstein, then participated in the From Here to Eternity 5-K Run. This led him to participate in the volunteer workdays where he learned how to repair the cemetery monuments. He also learned what needed to be done to monuments that have fallen over to place them upright again.

"I enjoyed the experience because I felt like I was doing something meaningful with my time," he said, "and I got to see how our work was helping to preserve the cemetery."

The city of Norfolk will mow the grass at the cemeteries but does not have the funding or the manpower to repair the monuments. It is considered the responsibility of the families to do this, but in many cases, there are no family members left to do so. In the case of Cedar Grove, Elmwood, and West Point Cemeteries, the result was that the cemeteries were deteriorating. That's why the NSCC was established in 2013.

"One of the projects we worked on in the Summer of 2016 was to paint what remains of the iron fencing around the individual plots in Cedar Grove and Elmwood Cemeteries," he said. "I found that I enjoyed this particular project and volunteered to come on my own time outside of the weekly volunteer days."

His extra volunteer hours led to him being selected as Volunteer of the Year for 2016.
