I'm pleased to announce that we are proceeding with a much-needed facelift to the Hollenbeck church offices. We are:

- replacing all carpet and repainting all the hallways and stairs,
- moving the pantry refrigerators into the kitchen,
- moving the Bookkeeping Office to the room that had the refrigerators,
- restoring the room across the hall from the Rectors office to function as a small meeting and counseling room for Rev. Michelle, and
- refinishing the hardwood floors in the Rector's office, the Bookkeeping office, and the Counseling Room and repainting.

We discovered a plaque commemorating the last time Hollenbeck was refurbished dated 1980 (43 years ago!). The work will start Monday, Feb. 27, and the contractors promise it will be completed by April 1 when Rev. Michelle arrives. Watch for before and after pictures in the April Clarion!



This Bible study is a structured, meditative approach to learning about our Christian faith from scripture. It not only discourages but also disallows crosstalk during the collective reading. It encourages self-reflection as well as listening to others.

Outline of African Bible Study or Lectio Divna

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

Procedure:

- 1. One person reads passage slowly.
- 2. Each person identifies the word or phrase that catches their attention. (1 minute)
- 3. Each shares the word or phrase with the group. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation, if possible.)
- 5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today. (1 minute)
- 6. Each shares. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation, if possible.)
- 8. Each person names or writes: "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
- 9. Each shares their answer. (5-10 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 10. Each prays for another person in the group, naming what was shared in other steps. (5 minutes)

Closing: The Lord's Prayer

THANKS for the T.P.!

Ours is one of the few pantries to give out toilet paper. While T.P. is

something most take for granted, this necessity cannot be purchased with SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) cards. Donating a package of toilet paper is a great way to contribute to this amazing ministry! Place donations in (or near) the basket outside the elevator on the upper level of the church.

Clients' Choice Table

Our pantry has a table from which clients may choose among items they may need but are not covered by SNAP cards. We both accept donations for this table and order items from Second Harvest. If you are interested in directly contributing to this effort, below is a list of items that are greatly appreciated by our clients.

- aluminum foil, waxed paper, and plastic wrap
- plastic storage bags
- trash bags
- paper plates/bowls/plastic utensils
- deodorant and soap
- cleaning products (window cleaner, bathroom cleaner, toilet bowl cleaner, general-purpose cleaner)
- diapers
- paper towels
- laundry soap or fabric softener
- feminine products
- salt and pepper
- Note that herbs and spices may be covered but are often cost prohibitive and are appreciated.

Sharing the load

In 1969 the Hollies released "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother." Here's the story behind that title

Fifty years earlier in Omaha, Nebraska, a boy with polio was abandoned at Father Flanagan's Home for Boys, predecessor to Boys Town. Soon several older residents started carrying Howard—with his heavy leg braces — especially up the stairs. Father Flanagan saw an older boy, Reuben, doing this and asked if it was hard work. Reuben replied, "He ain't heavy, Father. He's my brother." Years later, these words and the image of one person carrying another became the Boys Town brand.

All of us have been "carried" at some point, and we've likely "carried" someone else. The Hollies' song declares: "His welfare is my concern." Jesus said it this way: "Love your neighbor as yourself." The load isn't too heavy to bear because Jesus himself is always carrying us.
