FCR is the intrusive thinking and preoccupation with checking (for cancer) that has a negative impact on the patient's quality of life, psychological adjustment, ability to establish goals.

Halving Readmissions Rates: Effectiveness of Cano Health TEACH II (Telehealth After Critical Hospitalization) Study on 30-day Readmission Rates Among Latino Medicare Advantage Patients

Description: 50 MA subjects were enrolled within 72 hours of discharge from their local acute care hospital stay between March 2019 and November 2019. Mean age was 76 (76% female). 100% of patients were of Latin ethnicity; 100% expressed preference to receive care in Spanish. CM protocols and all other materials were validated in the previous Cano Health study, the TEACH Study [1]. ForaCare measures, vital signs, medication reconciliation, compliance, medication availability, exacerbations, and implemented CM protocols were documented in electronic health records and visit logs which were enriched via telehealth monitoring within the MDFlow CM platform and interfaced with Cano Health's population health and CM platforms. Missing medications triggered pharmacy fulfillment and home delivery within 24 hours.

Description: US Hispanics, currently the largest minority group in the country, face disparities in the recognition of the effects of trauma and treatment of the medical-socio-cultural complications leading to negative health-related behaviors like substance use. Under-recognition may be related to language differences, health literacy barriers, somatic presentations, and use of cultural idioms for reporting issues relating to abuse and neglect, violence, and sexual assault. Financial barriers (lack of insurance) limits access to adequate care. Through the UTRGV Multicultural Laboratory and VIDAS Community Outreach Program, a population health approach to improve early detection, diagnosis, treatment, and research in the Rio Grande Valley is now in place.

Traumatic Stress in Latino Immigrant Adolescents

Description: We consented, enrolled and distributed surveys to English or Spanish speaking adolescents who immigrated, or whose parents immigrated from a Spanish speaking country. We evaluated basic demographic information including age, gender, ethnicity, and whether trauma was experienced prior to, during, and/or after immigration. The Trauma Symptom Checklist for Children (TSCC) was used to measure the presence of symptoms of traumatic stress in these children. The TSCC is a self-report measure with 54 items that yield two validity scales (Underresponse and Hyperresponse); six clinical scales (Anxiety, Depression, Anger, Posttraumatic Stress, Dissociation and Sexual Concerns); and eight critical items (examining potential self-injury, suicidality, desire to harm others, etc.). Two supplemental questions were added to evaluate current available mental health services. Descriptive statistical analysis was the primary means of evaluating frequency of participant responses to experiencing trauma before, during and after immigration; as well as the frequency of participants with positive responses in each of the six clinical categories of symptoms. This project was developed with CME funds.

Description: In 2019, NEI asked one of its NEHEP partners, Ventanillas de Salud (VS) to help identify local partner organizations that could implement a pilot program among underserved Hispanic/Latino adults:

- VS operates through 50 active VS sites located in Mexican Consulates across the United States, and 11 Mobile Health Units that travel to community sites – such as churches, schools, and community centers – to deliver primary and preventive health services for Hispanics/Latinos and their families.
- Upon learning of the Ojo pilot's needs, VS identified MC and UA as appropriate partners to carry out the Ojo pilot in New York City and Phoenix respectively, mainly because they operate two Mobile Health Units. After several conversations with NEI, MC and UA agreed to support the Ojo pilot.

The evaluation of the Ojo pilot related to its partnerships with MC and UA aims to achieve the following:

- Assess whether exposure to a training increases the capacity of CHWs to educate about eye health to

Hispanic/Latino adults (a) age 18 years and older with diabetes or hypertension, or (b) age 40 years and older, in New York, NY, and Phoenix, AZ.

- Track how closely CHWs deliver the eye health education to adults according to a protocol.
- Explain the systemic and individual factors that keep CHWs from delivering the eye health education to adults according to the protocol.

In February 2020, two bilingual NEI contractors will co-facilitate separate trainings with MC in New York City and UA in Phoenix: Each training will involve the organization's supervisors and CHWs and will last a maximum of 8 hours, divided across 2 days.

The training will teach CHWs how to use a protocol to:

- Recruit Hispanic/Latino adults into the Ojo pilot.
- Lead in-person group sessions with Hispanic/Latino adults that focus on their risk for eye diseases and the need for dilated eye exams (the content of the education is based on NEI's Diabetes and Healthy Eyes Toolkit).

- Carry out patient navigation telephone calls with Hispanic/Latino adults.
- Collect process and outcome evaluation data from Hispanic/Latino adults.

Drawing from the Health Belief Model, the NEI contractors will conduct a process and outcome evaluation of the Ojo pilot's partnership with the organizations through:

- In-person pre-and post-test surveys with 10 CHWs immediately before the start of and at the end of the training in February 2020.
- In-person observations of the second or third in-person group sessions conducted by the 10 CHWs in March 2020.
- In-depth telephone interviews with 3 organizational supervisors before the start of the implementation of the Ojo pilot in February 2020, during the middle of the implementation in April 2020, and at the end of implementation in June 2020.

This mixed methods approach will (a) assess whether the partnership worked, and (b) show why the partnership worked or did not work.

As a critical analysis project, an extensive literature review and retrospective review of interventions and studies was done in order to gather accurate data regarding the main causes of maternal mortality and to better understand the health problem and its context.

In order to evaluate the quality of the literature review the COCHRANE review criteria checklist was used to evaluate quantitative studies. Additionally, to evaluate qualitative studies the COREQ checklist was also used as well as A Measurement Tool to Assess Systematic Reviews 2 (AMSTAR 2) to evaluate randomized and observational studies. The literature review included quantitative and qualitative reports, as well as cross-sectional analysis, cohort studies, case-control studies, and systematic reviews or innovative interventions designed to improve access and utilization of prenatal care.
