Rules & Restrictions:

- Toys must be new, unopened, and recently purchased. Toys from your home, even if they haven't been used, are not allowed due to possible contamination with harmful household allergens like dust, dust mites, pet dander, tobacco smoke, food particles, etc. Many patients are immunosuppressed, so they have very strict infection control policies.
- Place newly purchased items in plastic bags right away and keep them in there. Do NOT wrap any gifts.
- Stuffed animals and soft toys are allowed, but must also be recently purchased and immediately closed in a plastic bag.
