For foreigners Address misconceptions

- Vietnam is at war (war ravaged).
- Vietnam is indistinct from other Southeast Asian countries.
- Vietnam is a smaller version of China.
- ★ Long-term sustainable growth can only be achieved with a multi-party system.
- **★ Communist countries have non-market economies.**
- ★ There is no accountability in one-party states.
- ★ The country's development is unplanned and unstructured.
- Culture restricts the ability of women to contribute to the economy.

For Vietnamese Build awareness

- Understand what is happening and why.
- Build confidence in the fact that other countries have succeeded before.
- Focus attention on the medium and long term.



SIX METRICS FOR A TIGER ECONOMY



Numbers

There is net growth of most business and economic metrics for at least 10 consecutive years

Expertise

The workforce is becoming more highly skilled and educated in the public and private business sector

Exports

There is consistent movement up the value chain of export quality manufactured products

Markets

There is significant access to multiple global markets for Made-in-Vietnam products

Industrialization

Industrial development is in place in terms of policy and the country's physical infrastructure is being built

Leadership

There is leadership coming into place that is more a meritocracy and less an oligarchy

Numbers

Net growth for at least 10 consecutive years

Hard 'Yes'

Expertise

A better educated and skilled workforce is in place and relevant

Soft 'Yes'

Exports

Consistent movement up the export value chain

Soft 'Yes'

Markets

There are multiple global markets for Made-in-Vietnam products

Hard 'Yes'

Industrialization

Industrial policy is in place with physical infrastructure being built

Soft 'No'

Leadership

Strong leadership that is more a meritocracy than an oligarchy







Current urbanization rate is 3.4%.


This equates to 1.27m people moving into the cities each year.


About 1,500 people move into HCMC each day






