

## *Insignificant Events in the Life of a Cactus*





### About *Hello Universe*

The universe comes together unexpectedly when a unique set of circumstances cause four tweens to cross paths. Central to the story is Virgil, an 11-year-old Filipino American whose grandmother, Lola, helps him to come out of his shell and face the world. When Virgil and his pet guinea pig, Gulliver, end up trapped in a well in the woods at the hands of a bully, Chet, it is up to the stars to align before it's too late. Coming together like spokes on a wheel, everyone converges in the woods—Valencia, a Deaf girl on whom Virgil has a crush; Kaori, an adolescent fortune-teller and free spirit; Kaori's sister, Gen, her jump-roping apprentice; a feral dog Valencia has befriended; and a snake, which is the only thing Chet fears. Unlikely friendships are formed and heroism abounds as the group of young people try to find their way in the world. Plucky protagonists and a deftly woven story will appeal to anyone who has ever felt a bit lost in the universe. VERDICT Readers across the board will flock to this book that has something for nearly everyone—humor, bullying, self-acceptance, cross-generational relationships, and a smartly fateful ending.

Erin received the 2018 Newbery Medal for *Hello, Universe*, the 2017 APALA Award for The Land of Forgotten Girls, and the 2016 Golden Kite Honor Award for *Blackbird Fly*.

Erin was raised in Louisiana, but now lives in the Philadelphia area. She is a professor of children's literature in the graduate fiction and publishing programs at Rosemont College, where she earned her MFA. Erin is also a short story writer. Her short fiction has been nominated for the [Philippines Free Press Literary Award for Short Fiction](#) and the Pushcart Prize. Erin has a bachelor's degree in women's studies and liberal arts from McNeese State University and an MFA in creative writing from [Rosemont](#). Erin is [mestiza](#) and identifies as Filipina-American. Her mother is [Visayan](#) and lives in Cebu, which is why many of Erin's Filipino characters speak [Cebuano](#) rather than [Tagalog](#).
