Our guest speaker will be **Jorge Babot**, husband of branch member Sharon Babot. Jorge has spent over forty years in the petroleum, energy and construction industries. After retiring from his corporate career in California, he came to Texas where he designed and then served as general contractor for his and Sharon's beautiful home in Dripping Springs.

Jorge will be sharing his own personal story with us in his presentation: *Cuba, the Peter Pan Airlift: Then and Now.* He will give a summary of his family's life under Batista, then under Castro, both dictators in Cuba. This will include the story of his and his family's journey to freedom. He will also be sharing his perspective on Cuba's politics, its economy and the daily life of those remaining in Cuba, who are not high-ranking officials of the military or the communist party, including some of the heroic efforts by groups like the Damas de Blanco (Ladies in White).

In keeping with the theme of the day's presentation, the meal will be a Cubano sandwich (shredded pork, ham and cheese). Steve shared how his organization brings together people with opposing viewpoints on a contentious issue through a structured communication process to break apart assumptions and find common ground. Now, more than ever, finding common ground across the political divide is vital to our democracy.



iACT (Interfaith Action of Central Texas) has a similar goal of improving understanding across diverse groups through its <a href="Red Bench">Red Bench</a> program to improve interfaith understanding and civil discourse through a structured process of dialogue.

# "Equations of Hope for a Democracy in Distress" Steve Saltwick, Braver Angels

Since Steve Saltwick was a last-minute substitute for the scheduled speaker who had COVID, you did not see his bio in the last newsletter. We are including it after the fact.

Steve is a Senior Fellow of Braver Angels focusing on key strategic initiatives for advancing its mission. He is also the founding conservative co-chair of the <u>Braver Angels of Central Texas</u> Alliance. The Alliance is the fastest growing field unit of <u>Braver Angels</u> - expanding from eleven founding members in 2018 to 1500 subscribers and members in 2022. Steve also co-founded the National Office of Field Operations for Braver Angels. The office supports the growth and impact of all grassroots local Alliances as well as State Coordinators in all fifty states.



Steve has been profiled on Braver Angels in the Wall Street Journal, and Fox News in Austin. Steve began his career as a neuroscientist and has academic publications in *Science* and book chapters in Academic Press. His business career specialized in solution engineering on six continents for a variety of high-tech companies. He serves on the boards of Modius and Partner One.

The four elements of the Braver Angel Way are as follows, with the focus on finding common values without necessarily changing each other's minds:

- 1. Practicing Good Civic habits We strive to continually build our skills in depolarization, to balance our media diet, and to respectfully interact with those whose viewpoints we may not agree with.
- 2. Getting all stakeholders involved, honoring different viewpoints with no winners/losers
- 3. Focusing on the method best for the community Action not Advocacy
- 4. Sharing success, positive results THE END RESULT IS GOVERNMENT OF "WE THE PEOPLE"

Braver Angels is confident that citizens of Good Faith, including elected representatives, using the Braver Angel Way, have the power to revitalize the American Experiment and restore hope and trust in both our politics and ourselves.

After describing the various workshops, Steve invited us to explore the equation of hope directly. He shared the QR code for the website of Braver Angels of Central Texas, the local Alliance of Braver Angels. "You won't know how you really feel until you discuss the issue." Hardly profound, but definitely thought-provoking. It set me thinking of the public policy committee meeting from a few days before when there had been wide-ranging, thoughtful discussion on many of the political and social issues that concern us and our AAUW sisters. Carrying that level of civil discourse into the various social circles and communities we inhabit is something we can all do in these last critical weeks leading up to one of the most significant midterm elections in American history. We want to discuss, perhaps debate, but not preach! We must be informed and be willing to listen as well as to speak.

Before we can influence how people vote, they must be persuaded to vote! If you aren't a VDR (Volunteer Deputy Registrar) yourself, you know a bunch of branch members who are — we love referrals! The <u>election calendar</u> from the Travis County Clerk has all the deadlines you need to know until you cast your ballot:

Learn all you can about who and what to vote for by listening to the candidates, the people around you, and the media, but don't believe everything you hear! Read and research for yourself from a variety of sources! "The League of Women Voters is proud to be nonpartisan, neither supporting nor opposing candidates or political parties, but always working on vital issues of concern to members and the public." Their voting guides will soon be available online and in libraries. A good place to start is their Vote411 LINK. By voting for and electing the best-qualified candidates at every level from congressional representative to local school board member, you can address the most pressing issues from gun safety, climate change, healthcare issues, down to what school children are being taught and what books are in our school and public libraries. The public policy committee has decided to hold regular monthly meetings on the first Wednesday of the month at 4 p.m. The Zoom link is sent a few days in advance, and we'd love for you to join us. The next meeting is on October 5. Among other actions and advocacy, we'll be getting ready for the 88th Texas Legislature which convenes at noon on Tuesday, January 10, 2023, and for which bills are already being filed.

# In Memoriam - Jan Rooker

Janet "Jan" Rooker passed away on August 24, 2022, after persevering through protracted illness. Jan was the mother of Tyler, Amy, and Griffin, grandmother of Dean, Lily, Everett, Mia, and Ryan, dog mom to Charlie, and the beloved life partner of Robert Cahn. Jan was a gifted educator, nurturing hundreds of students throughout her career. She started her career as a high school teacher in Ridgewood, New Jersey, later starting her own company in New Canaan, Connecticut to guide students through the college admissions process, helping them find their academic homes. Jan graduated from Cornell University (BA),



Stanford University (MA) and Columbia University (MA) and earned numerous professional awards. She actively supported her students up until her final days. Jan had countless passions. She was an avid tennis player, lover of literature, enthusiastic gardener, and lifelong learner, always remaining as much the student as the teacher. Jan was a champion of women's rights, volunteering for the Austin branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and the League of Women Voters. Jan was a resident of Austin, Texas, and spent her final days in Cape Cod, one of her favorite places to garden and walk on the beach.
