

### **AAUW Member Spotlight-FERN CHESTER**

Fern Chester has been a member of AAUW since 1989 and at the young age of 92 is a shining example of how to live a life of purpose and meaning. She calls herself a *Dust Bowl Child*. Growing up in Amarillo, Texas she has vivid memories of sitting on her front porch watching the monstrous, engulfing clouds of dust roll in. She knew that Jesus must be arriving since her preacher had taught that He is "coming with the clouds"!



Fern's father was a college graduate who taught secondary math in public schools. When he earned his Master's degree his thesis topic was *Girls can Learn Math as Well as Boys!* Fern's mother earned a teaching certificate as well. Both parents were involved in volunteerism and were twice invited to the White House by two presidents to receive acknowledgement for their work.

Fern's parents had two requirements for her: to go to college and to marry a preacher. She accomplished both! She graduated in 1950 with a degree in Home Economics from Abilene Christian College and married Ray Chester, an up and coming new minister. She began her career working for the electric utility company as a Home Economist. She taught women how to cook on electric and later gas stoves, making healthy food choices and using other electrical appliances. She and a co-worker developed a cooking program for Girl Scouts, teaching the girls on six electric ranges and providing a special cookbook for each Scout.

She traveled with Ray to several cities as he preached, Washington, DC; Searcy, Arkansas; and Austin, raising three children along the way. Her daughter is Director of Bereavement for Hospice Austin, one son is a musician and another son is a lawyer. Fern also has six grandchildren.

For twenty-one years, Fern worked at the Presbyterian Seminary in their Doctor of Ministry program in Feminist Theology. Fern says she has always been a feminist and strong supporter of women's rights. She refers to her late husband, Ray, as a "forward thinking man in the church." He was in the crowd in Washington to hear, in person, Martin Luther King Jr.'s I Have a Dream speech.

Fern is currently an active participant in three AAUW interest groups: Culture and Cuisine, Contemporary Literature Book Club and Creative Stitchery. She is also involved with various activities with her church.

What is her secret to being such a lively 92-year-old? Fern says to stay active. Her grandmother "lived until she died" even having a piano recital at age 80. Her dad lived to be 95 and was always busy. She has not enjoyed quarantining with Covid-19, but her kids make her abide by all the rules! She still stays in contact with others through Zoom meetings.

When asked what she would share with the young women of today, Fern said that they should realize and appreciate that the women's liberation that they enjoy today was hard fought. Their voting rights and job opportunities should not be taken for granted.

#### **Drop Off Mail-In Ballots-**

If you are going to receive a vote-by-mail ballot and are concerned about the United States Postal Service's ability to deliver your ballot properly and on time, you have the option to do an in-person turn-in at your County Election Office.

You can only turn in your own ballot and you must bring proper photo ID. Don't forget to wear your mask bring your own pen and practice safe distancing.



# The Mom Project

The Mom Project has launched an initiative to provide technology certificate scholarships to 10,000 women of color over the next three years to address what it calls a "dramatic backslide" in workplace equality due to Covid-19.

The RISE initiative will offer women of color the opportunity to earn certification in Salesforce Administrator, Google IT Support or Microsoft Learn to boost their earning potential while continuing to work and support their families.

Recent findings show Black women were <u>twice as likely as white men</u> to be out of work or furloughed during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Black women are <u>paid just 66 cents</u> to a white man's dollar, per the Economic Policy Institute. Another estimate from the National Women's Law Center puts it even lower, at 62 cents.

"Women of color are in the fight of their lives and we can't sit on the sidelines," said Allison Robinson, founder and CEO of The Mom Project. "We know moms are the backbone of the family and investing in her development has the opportunity to transform the trajectory of her family's life for decades to come."

The Mom Project will partner with technology upskilling providers including Career Circle to provide candidates with one-on-one program support and guidance through the curriculum and future job search, the organization said.

RISE also will offer mentoring and pro bono coaching through The Mom Project's RALLY and Unity programs, along with educational resources for children.

Participants will have all upskilling and mentoring expenses covered, including fully funded technology certificate programs for both entry- and mid-level professionals. Graduating candidates will receive job placement assistance through The Mom Project and its network of program and corporate partners.

### **Mainspring Schools Update:**



Mainspring Schools Executive Director **Jason Gindele** reported that the school reopened on September 8, aligning with Austin ISD. While the school's financial situation is not good, they are stable. Fundraising and grants will be important this year.

Kudos to **Terry Whaley** and **Anita Knight!** When it was reported during our September meeting that the school needed masks for children and adults, these two immediately stepped up. Terry Whaley, a Georgetown dual member donated leftover masks from her daughter's recent Covid-19 wedding and Anita Knight was able to get masks from her colleague, **Aditi Joshi**. The school could still use masks for 3 and 4-year-old children and their older siblings. #### **Mainspring Challenge:**

Our branch's historic approach to community problems is to study the issue and identify solutions. We did just that nearly 80 years ago in the summer of 1941 when our branch voted to start a nursery school. That school started long ago eventually became Mainspring School. Now, during this most troubling time, the challenges of Mainspring Schools, an institution we continue to support, reveals to us how fragile our childcare system is. This is a systemic community-wide problem that disproportionally impacts women, particularly women of color. This issue could benefit from our study.

A recent group of early childhood educators from across the country issued a manifesto demanding changes to a system that exploits Black and Brown women. The introduction says it well:

Human capital constitutes a nation's most important natural resource. Therefore, those who nurture young children are of fundamental importance to America's welfare. Nevertheless, for centuries, there has been a wrongful devaluation of the work performed by Americans who contribute significantly to the full range of children's development from birth through age 8. Recently, the 2020 Covid-19 Pandemic underscored the reality that early childhood educators, most of whom are women, are quintessential essential workers providing childcare so that parents may work without worry or distraction. Ironically, they are among the lowest paid education professionals and, within their ranks, there are salary disparities according to race with Black women being paid the least. Unfortunately, this is in keeping with the fight for equality and justice during the ongoing Racism Pandemic that plagues our nation.

Join the Mainspring Schools Committee to learn more about the challenges facing the school and the childcare system. Now, more than ever, the school needs our best thinking and support to weather these uncertain waters.
