Reports from the 2020-21 Fellows

In May 2020, the Austin Branch awarded five fellowships to University of Texas doctoral candidates. By accepting the funds, they agreed to report to the membership about their use of the fellowship. These reports demonstrate that the fellowships are funds well spent to encourage and support intelligent women working on their doctoral degrees.

Lucy LeBlanc reported that the AAUW Fellowship helped her complete her dissertation. She wrote her dissertation in Spring 2021 entitled "Regulation of Death and Differentiation of Embryonic Stem Cells" and successfully defended it in front of her committee on April 14th. She graduated in May. Additionally, she had a first-author review article published in February 2021 ("Context-dependent roles of YAP/TAZ in stem cell fates and cancer", published in *Cell & Molecular Life Sciences*).

Caroline Johnson used the fellowship funds to cover the costs of her final year without pursuing a secondary loan. The funds went toward tuition and final charges related to her dissertation including image rights and archival documents requested virtually during the Covid-19 pandemic. On April 12, 2021 she successfully defended her dissertation entitled "Clouds Like Glass: The Deterrence and Determination of U.S. Women Airline Transport Pilots, 1973-2001". On May 22, she became the first member of her family to obtain a doctorate. She accepted a position as the 2021-2023 Andrew W. Mellon Postdoctoral Curatorial Fellow at the American Philosophical Society in Philadelphia, PA. In this role, she will serve as co-curator for the 2022 Climate Science exhibition and as lead curator for the 2023 exhibition entitled "Women in Science: Unequal Recognition." Caroline writes that the mission of AAUW remains close on both a personal and professional level, as her primary goal is to honor the stories of women past, present, and future.

Maro Youssef used the fellowship to offset the costs of medical care during the 2020-2021 academic year. As a cancer survivor, her medical bills are higher than the average graduate student. This often meant working 2-3 jobs during her Ph.D. The fellowship helped her focus on her research full-time. This resulted in producing several manuscripts and submitting them for publication, and finishing her Ph.D to graduate on time. During the fellowship year, Maro presented her dissertation research on "Women's Political Participation after Revolution in Tunisia" at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UN CSW). Over 100 individuals attended the event, including policymakers, activists and academics. She produced several manuscripts based on her dissertation research during the award year such as one on unlikely feminist coalitions between liberal and conservative women in Tunisia. She coauthored an article on feminist mobilization around gender-based violence before and during the COVID-19 pandemic in Tunisia. She also co-authored an op-ed in openDemocracy on women's rights since the Arab Spring (over the past decade) in North Africa.

Willa Granger presented at the Universities Art Association of Canada (UAAC) as well as at the Southeastern Society of Architectural Historians (SESAH)'s annual conference in September and October. It was at this latter event that her 2019 peer-reviewed article was awarded SESAH's "Best Journal Article" award for the year.



An excerpt of this piece was also reprinted by request through Rice University's CITE magazine. In November of 2020 she was awarded the Senate of College Council's William C. Powers Jr. Endowed Scholarship in recognition of her teaching. She served as a Teaching Assistant for World Architecture: 1750 to Present, all while completing her dissertation chapter drafts by December. In the Spring semester she had the opportunity to craft and teach her first-ever course as an Assistant Instructor. In April she successfully defended her dissertation. Next year she has been named a Fellow-in-Residence at the Edmond J. Safra Center for Ethics at Harvard University, where she will continue to revise her dissertation for book publication.

Sierra Mendez was able to move her research from a conceptual place to a place of production thanks to the AAUW fellowship. She is currently quantifying, through archival texts, San Antonio's homogenized reproduction of Mexicanx distributions of labor, resources and space. She used the fellowship funds to build her collection of of San Antonio's 20th century tourism texts, specifically the purchase of postcards. She also used the funds to purchase a subscription to ArcGis, a digital storytelling and mapping tool to produce a curated digital archive for her project. She is currently working on early drafts of her dissertation. She has submitted some articles for publication. She is very grateful for our financial support especially during the past year as COVID disrupted her research.

AAUW National Election Results



Last Spring, AAUW members across the nation voted in an important AAUW election. Here are the results:

- **Julia Brown** was re-elected to serve as Board Chair for three more years.
- **Malinda Gaul** was re-elected as Board Vice Chair, and **Elizabeth Haynes** and **Joseph Bertolino** will also retain their board seats. All are three-year terms.
- AAUW's public policy priorities were approved by 92% of voters.
- The ballot initiative to eliminate the membership requirement received 63% of the vote, which was just below the two-thirds majority needed to enact a bylaw change. Therefore the initiative did not pass.

Thanks to all of you for your active participation in this election.

Yearbook Update

The 2021-22 Yearbook is scheduled to be distributed at the September Branch meeting on September 11, 2021. Yearbooks not picked up on September 11 will be mailed, unless other arrangements are made.

Policy Update: Redistricting

Following the release of the 2020 Census results, Texas lawmakers plan to tackle redistricting this fall in a special session. The redrawing of maps for the state's congressional, legislative and State Board of Education boundaries will be both complicated and contentious.

Whom you can elect at the national, statewide and even local levels depends on which district you live in. And the way those district maps are drawn often decides which party controls the national and state legislative bodies. The maps will remain in use for as long as 10 years. Politicians have the power to group voters in a way that will give them a partisan advantage as long as they are not discriminating on the basis of race.

To learn more about how the redistricting process works, how it may impact you and how you can advocate for a fair and open process, <u>All on the Line Texas</u> is offering **Redistricting Summer U**, a series of four workshops that will be conducted before the Census Bureau releases redistricting data. 
Great Job Austin Branch!
