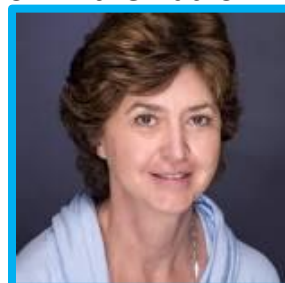

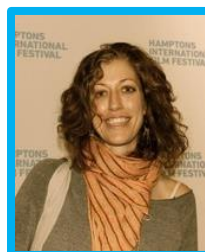

It has been a long road to finish St. John Neumann Catholic Church, but when considering that Antoni Gaudi's famous Sagrada Familia Basilica in Barcelona is still not finished after 134 years, this journey is looking a lot shorter.

Joanne Senn orchestrated the project as the pastoral associate for development. She was aided by a small, dedicated team of parishioners who spent 10 years researching the design and collaborating on the creation of the artwork. Joanne will be our host and guide.

"This is an historic moment in our history as we bring to fruition a decade long project that has been touched by priests, bishops, parishioners and designers," Senn said. "The theme for the church is 'Trinity Through the Cross.' It was created in a modern renaissance style that is typically found in Florence, where the Mellini Art Glass and Mosaics company created and fabricated the tiles," under the direction of liturgical designers Rohn and Associates.

The artwork everyone has been waiting for is the vibrant dome. It is composed of 10 million mosaic tiles in more than 1,300 colors and took more than two years to draw and three years to fabricate. This crown jewel is believed to be the largest mosaic dome in Texas and one of the ten largest in the country. A team of international artisans from Italy, Holland and Poland installed the artwork, making two trips to Austin: one in the summer 2014 and another in 2016.

A celebrated Italian master, the late Romano Cosci, created the artwork for the dome. His work is also found in the Vatican collection. Unfortunately, he passed away after creating the mosaics, on the first day workers began installing it: June 5, 2014.

This ceiling is one of the most beautiful artworks in our country and certainly in Austin. We hope that you will join us

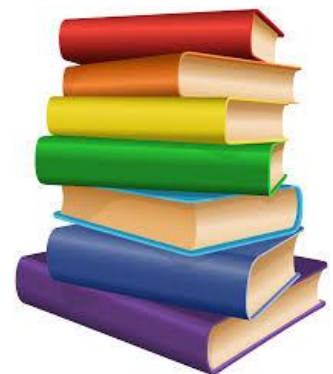

During the last year all of us have experienced an extraordinary amount of stress in our lives. The impact of the recent campaign season and elections seemed to last forever. And coming during the Covid-19 pandemic with all of the life adjustments required for life under restrictions made it even more stressful. Siri Bletzer is a mental health expert who addresses the impact of recent events on mental health and prevention or mitigation of stress for a more positive life. Ms. Bletzer received a Master's DMs degree in Counseling from St. Mary's University in San Antonio. She is a licensed professional

counselor and a licensed marriage and family therapist. As a member of the American Counseling Association since 1998 and a clinical member of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapy since 1995 she is known as a top professional in her field.

With 22 years of private practice she has worked with many people coping with anxiety and/or depression, anger and stress management, those going through career changes, and facing life transitions and crisis. She states, "I have always been fascinated by how people change, learn, and grow. I believe that given the right context, such as a safe, stimulating and nurturing environment, people can make the changes they need to make to live a happier, more productive and positive life. Given the right tools, everyone has the capacity to engineer their life in a healthier way."

**Annie Silverstein** is an award-winning filmmaker and media educator based in Austin, Texas. Her films have screened at international festivals including Cannes, SXSW, Silverdocs and on PBS Independent Lens. Before attending film school, Annie spent ten years as a youth worker and community media educator in Seattle, and her film "Bull" reflects her career as a social worker. Her company NewFilmWorks has contracted with businesses, government institutions and non-profit organizations to develop and produce documentaries, web videos, PSAs, news cuts, promotional videos, and educational trainings. She has worked across the United States, South America, and Africa, as a producer, director, cinematographer, and editor. Annie has a B.A. in history from Macalester College in MN.

**Monique Walton** is a creative producer of director-driven fiction and non-fiction independent films, working with Bluestack Media. Her fiction feature debut, "Bull", written and directed by Annie Silverstein, was an official selection at the 2019 Cannes Film Festival - Un Certain Regard. It was awarded the Grand Jury Prize, Best First Film, and Critics' Prize at the Deauville American Film Festival. She was selected for the 2016 Sundance Creative Producing Lab and was named the Mark Silverman Honoree for "Bull". She has a B.A. with distinction from Yale University in Latin American studies. Special thanks to film-buffs **Janet Ridoff**, **Mary Kate Fredriksen** and **Anita Knight** for putting together this exciting program.

## **Mainspring Schools**

2021 marks the 80<sup>th</sup> year of our connection to Mainspring Schools; they will celebrate their birthday October 15, 2021. In July of 1941, our AAUW branch decided to start a preschool for low-income white children. Over the ensuing 80 years, Mainspring Schools has evolved to reflect the wonderful diversity of Austin.

With a mission “to provide children and their families with a **community** (emphasis added) for high quality early education and holistic support so each child and parent has the tools necessary for success and life,” Mainspring Schools had an enrollment of 95 children with 75% of the families receiving tuition subsidies<sup>1</sup>. AAUW is a proud part of the community that supports the families of Mainspring Schools. Mainspring has three central commitments<sup>1</sup>:

1. ***Innovative Learning*** comprised of low child-to-teacher ratios, child-directed learning, and focus on social, emotional, and executive function skills.
2. ***Physical and Emotional Health*** supported by farm-to-table meals, trauma-informed education and care, case management, and ample outdoor play and wellness learning.
3. ***Family-Centered Engagement*** through parent education on topics such as nutrition, discipline, personal finance and relationships and individual and group counseling.
