

## **Policy Update from the Public Policy Committee**

By the time you get this newsletter, the Texas Special Session of the Legislature may be finished. Did we, along with the League of Women Voters, Texas Freedom Network, TX Impact, Equality Texas, Texans for Strong Public Schools, et al., successfully oppose the "voucher", aka "school choice" or "education savings accounts"? If so, a voucher plan will be back, because it is part of a nationwide conservative movement. **Joshua M. Cowen**, professor of education policy in the College of Education at Michigan State University, said after studying school vouchers for two decades that he is now firmly opposed to them. Read his statement HERE.

Be sure to understand the fourteen propositions for constitutional amendments on the November ballot. Did you know that the Texas Constitution is one of the longest in the nation and is still growing? As of 2022 (the 87th Legislature), the Texas Legislature has proposed a total of 700 amendments. Of these, 517 have been adopted, and 180 have been defeated by Texas voters, and three amendments never made it to the ballot. Thus, the Texas Constitution has been amended 517 times since its adoption in 1876. Our U.S. Constitution is considered by many as a "living document", and it only has 27 amendments. Thirty-three amendments to the Constitution of the United States have been proposed by the U.S. Congress and sent to the states for ratification since the Constitution was put into operation on March 4, 1789.

The AAUW Texas October newsletter UWT was in your Inbox recently. It provides important information for advocacy and action. It has an LWV-provided link to video explanations of all the propositions on the ballot for the November 7 election. Link to Video

For sure you will vote YES on Proposition 9: a pension increase for retired teachers.

Citizens Climate Lobby (CCL) encourages you to *vote NO on Proposition 7*, which appears on the ballot with this statement - "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the Texas energy fund to support the construction, maintenance, modernization, and operation of electric generating facilities." Reason: While we do need to modernize our energy infrastructure here in Texas, we need to focus on making more clean energy. Proposition 7 leans into dirtier sources like natural gas while discouraging energy companies from investing in solar, wind, battery storage and energy efficiency.

Some of us have been following **Heather Cox Richardson**, history professor and author, whom I recently met on a webinar and introduced in last month's newsletter. A few of us attended the conversation with her at the LBJ Library on Wednesday, October 18, moderated by the LBJ Library Director **Mark Lawrence**. Her purpose is to emphasize the principles of American **DEMOCRACY**: people's right to be treated equally before the law and to have a say in their government. So do continue to have your say by voting, communicating with your elected representatives, attending school board meetings, even running for election. Experts on our branch public policy committee are available for your further education and involvement: **Mary Ellen Scribner** for book banning, **Jackie Hardee** for voting rights and elections, **Sarah Averill** for public education, **Ann Berasley** for state government.


## Report from the Contemporary Literature Book Group
