

AAUW Austin 2022-23 Progress towards Our Goals

Membership Recruitment and Engagement

- Twelve new members have joined AAUW for the 2022-23 year thus far! Thanks to each of you for sharing our work with friends and colleagues and interested folks. Please continue to invite folks to our program events.
- Interest groups are beginning plans for service projects. The Southwest Book Club has already acted to support literacy by collecting books for Williams Elementary which serves a disadvantaged population and where their entire budget for new library books was eliminated this year. The Central Book Club is researching schools for a similar project.
- A Wine and Cheese recruitment and orientation night is in the works for the spring.

Public Policy

- Sample Letters for the ERA were developed by **Jackie Hardee** and shared with the branch.
- Get out the vote efforts were promoted through the newsletter and through members becoming Volunteer Deputy Registrars to register new voters.
- Research has been done on what other states are doing related to pay equity. Pay equity bills introduced to the 88th Legislature are being tracked.
- Plans are in place to be a strong presence at the Texas Legislature. AAUW Texas has hired a lobbyist, **Kate Kuhlmann** of HillCo Partners.

Visibility and Partnerships

- An AAUW business card template is available for member use.
- The State Strategic Plan for 2022-2024 is under review to support increased visibility.
- Since AAUW National no longer has promotional kits, the group is identifying a new approach to highlighting AAUW's resources for women and girls.

Scholarships and Fellowships

- AAUW Women Fellowship Fund provided \$10,620 in funding for UT fellowships from 9/1/2021 to 8/31/2022.
- The Frances Malmberg Endowed Scholarship at ACC provided a total \$3,400 for the current Academic Year for two ACC students. See the January newsletter for thank you notes from the awardees.

January Meeting Recap

Sharon Watkins, owner of Chez Zee restaurant was the speaker at the January program meeting. Sharon delighted the audience by talking about how her father, a football coach and high school principal, and her mother, also a teacher, affected her. She did not want to be a teacher but liked drama and acting and was a very creative young person.

She received training at Princeton University in theatre arts and was invited to establish and direct the Creative Theatre Unlimited while there. She returned to Texas and worked at Texas Commission on the Arts designing and directing programs. She then ventured into advertising and set up her own agency. Through some of her clients, she was introduced to the owners of the Chez Fred restaurant. Soon thereafter, she was put in charge of the restaurant while the owners did other things. She shared with us the story of how she came to own the restaurant after the previous owners left and filed for bankruptcy.

Besides her busy schedule running Chez Zee, Sharon has been involved in many nonprofits and community organizations for over thirty years. She is also a lifetime member of the Fine Arts Council at the University of Texas in Austin.

WOMEN'S MARCH

The "Bigger than Roe" Austin Organizers are moving the date for the Austin event to mid-February. The new date you are seeing is tentative and may be updated. Our voices and our physical presence will have the maximum impact when the legislators are in the building. The Plan: Texas legislative committees will be formed in early February. Organizers will specifically monitor the Healthcare Committee to see which bills the committee will be hearing. The focus will be on bills that attack our choices for body autonomy. Then we will meet at the Texas Capitol South Steps with our signs. This will be a picketing. Please bring signs, plenty of water, and snacks. Make sure to dress appropriately for the weather, wear comfortable clothing, and comfortable shoes.

Policy Update from the Public Policy Committee

In January the Texas Legislative seems to hum with movement and activity, but most of what you see happening on the floors of the House and the Senate is for show—photo ops with family, friends, colleagues, the media. Behind that scene, however, some very important business is actually getting done: bills are being filed, committee assignments are being made, and those bills are being

assigned to those committees. Soon there will be committee hearings, full House or Senate hearings, debates, fiery speeches plus lots of droning, but it's time for us to get to work. The public policy committee has been getting ready for this moment for months now, and it was great to have so many other branch members at the January program sign on to help us track bills, lobby for or against bills as needed, appeal to and encourage sympathetic legislators, and to persuade our families, friends, and perfect strangers whenever possible to work for just laws that serve our incredibly diverse Texas population. Our association's state public policy committee has selected five major issues to follow closely: Women's Healthcare (especially post-natal access with reintroduction of the former Medicare extension bill); Open & Fair Elections; Reduction in Gun Violence; Education-related Issues (such as libraries and book censorship, CRT, teachers' retirement COLA, vouchers, curriculum, and public-school accountability); and Pay Equity on the state level. It appears from the brief survey on our January signup sheet that local members are especially interested in LGBTQIA+ issues, gun safety, and all education-related issues.

If not already acquainted with Texas Legislature Online (https://capitol.texas.gov), spend a few minutes discovering just how much and what you can do on this website. It is your primary tool for tracking bills through the entire legislative process. The question of how do I find the numbers for bills I want to track has been asked. The Statesman and some other Texas media offer useful coverage including bill numbers, and you can use the TLO website above to get the numbers of bills introduced by your own and other sympathetic legislators. There is also a link on the site that lists the bills that are introduced each day. Get on the action notice lists of organizations that focus on the issues that matter most to you. Texas Freedom Network (https://ttn.org) is superb for LGBTQIA+, education including intellectual freedom, voting rights issues, and more. Try Texas Gun Sense (https://texasgunsense.salsalabs.org/signup0/index.html) for gun safety bill numbers and other campaign ideas. You do not have to be a member to receive the action alerts from the League of Women Voters (https://www.lwvtexas.org/#gsc.tab=0), and their priorities strongly parallel those of AAUW. Send an email to maryescribner@gmail.com if you want to be added to our *ad hoc* email list for the duration of the legislative session.

I am not one for using the telephone, but it is a very effective way of expressing your support or opposition to a bill. I did not plagiarize these telephone tips (see page 13); I stole them directly from Joanne Richards, co-chair of Ranked Choice Voting for Texas! RCV is not an AAUW priority, but it is something I have followed for a long time, and Joanne's telephone instructions provide an excellent pattern to follow for any issue that concerns you. You may also access the telephone tips by clicking Joanne Richard's Telephone Tips.

Branch member Myrtle Bell is an active member of the Austin Chapter of Sisters Inc. (SNI) and is eager to share information about this outstanding organization. SNI is committed to increasing local and national attention to the devastating impact that breast cancer has in the African American community.

Breast cancer is an imperative health issue facing African American Women. Though Black women get breast cancer at a slightly lower incidence rate (3%) than white women, Black women are 42% more like to die of breast cancer than white women. That is an astounding number and indicative of a variety of factors, many reflecting racial disparities.

SNI was founded in 1994 by Karen Eubanks Jackson, a 29 year and four-time breast cancer survivor. Today SNI is the oldest, largest, and only national Black breast cancer survivorship organization in the United States. SNI is the leading voice in the fight against breast cancer in the Black community. The organization has over thirty survivor-run affiliate chapters nationwide.

Joanne Richard's Telephone Tips

These tips are provided by Joanne Richards, the co-chair of Ranked Choice Voting for Texas!

If you call, you'll either get a real person or a voicemail. In either case deliver your script. Voicemails are listened to! The person you speak with will likely be a staff member. They may ask for your name, zip code and maybe your city of residence. If you leave a voicemail, include your name and zip code.

Script

My name is ____ and I am a constituent. Thanks for taking my call.

I want to express to [Sen. ____] / [Rep. ____] my support for ranked choice voting. If you want to say more, give a reason such as:

- "Ranked choice voting is a nonpartisan change that is being adopted in both red and blue jurisdictions around the U.S."
- "Ranked choice voting will save Texas money by eliminating runoff elections."
- "Ranked choice voting leads to more positive, issue-oriented campaigning rather than mudslinging."
- "I like multiple candidates who are running. Why must I choose only one of them?"
