Your AAUW membership year runs from July 1 through June 30. So, if you haven't paid your 2023-2024 dues yet, it's <u>past</u> time to do so. To be included in the upcoming yearbook, please renew now. Deadline is the Summer Social on Sunday, August 6th. Members who joined after 7/2/22 will receive a renewal notice twelve months after they joined.

You should have received your membership renewal notification from <a href="memberinfo@AAUW.org">memberinfo@AAUW.org</a>. By simply clicking on the personalized link included in this email, you can directly access your own account and make your payment online. If you can't locate that email, just go to <a href="mailto:aauw.org">aauw.org</a> and login. No check to write, stamp to find, or need for that trip to the post office. Unlike in the past, National doesn't send notifications of renewals.

National dues have increased by \$5.00 this year. State and Branch dues remain the same. Combined, the dues for 2023-24 are \$101.00. This is the last of three planned incremental increases. Ever increasing expenses, combined with a greater-than-ever need to proactively support our membership and our mission, necessitated this decision.

For those who are interested, AAUW does offer a Paid Life Membership. Basically, this option equates to the prepayment of twenty years of National dues at the current rate (\$72). Life Members are still required to pay State and Branch dues on an annual basis.

### **Policy Update from the Public Policy Committee**

Dear Austin Branch Members,

I have volunteered to co-chair the branch Public Policy Committee because I have been a "gold-star" member of Mary Ellen's committee, a Legislative Chair in Michigan in a former life, and a member of other advocacy groups like Citizens Climate Lobby (CCL), League of Women Voters (LWV), Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) and Texas Impact. I am a networker and have been an avid behind-the-scenes advocate for educational and environmental issues for years. I'd love to have someone new and younger join me in co-chairing this vital work.

AAUW Austin's public policy committee advocates for laws that support strong public schools from the elementary grades through university, maternal and child health care, fair election laws, and gun safety. We oppose vouchers and book bans, abortion bans without medical exceptions, voting restrictions and gerrymandering, irresponsible gun ownership and gun violence. A national goal (and one of the branch strategic goals) also involves pay equity for women. AND don't forget the final adoption of the ERA to the U.S. Constitution.

To quote President Obama in his letter of gratitude to librarians, "I hope you'll join me in reminding anyone who will listen – and even some people you think might not – that the free, robust exchange of ideas has always been at the heart of American democracy. Together we can make that true for generations to come."

Mary Ellen Scribner has led the public policy committee so conscientiously and comprehensively with about two dozen of us members. Legislative work continues through the legislative "interim" between sessions. We are open to new ideas, as well as continuing efforts to understand and follow legislation and politics that are relevant to the mission of AAUW. Join us in this work at the heart of American democracy. I hope to see you at the summer social.

## AAUW Austin Branch - Centennial Celebration Looking Back at Our First Hundred Years

Members of the Austin Branch proudly point to the Branch's important role in the founding of Austin Public Library in 1926. It was the start of a special relationship and, over the years, the Branch has continued to support the library in various ways. This support has been typically directed toward building projects and providing new services. One effort was a little different; it was a special gift for the enjoyment of library users and staff. For the new Austin Public Library building — the 1979 "new" library that was later renamed in honor of John Henry Faulk — Austin Branch members worked with Friends of the Austin Public Library to commission a work of art. With this commission, Damian Priour designed and created *Question Mark*, a stained-glass window, for installation in the library.

Damian Priour was an Austin-based artist who later built a reputation primarily as a sculptor. He graduated from the University of Texas in 1972 and had a business, Skylight Glass Studio, at 8033 Mesa Drive (near the intersection of Mesa and Spicewood Springs). The studio was located in a neighborhood close to various branch members (then and now), and this is perhaps how Priour's work came to their attention. Priour was <a href="https://doi.org/10.1001/journal.org/">honored</a> with burial in the Texas State Cemetery and here is <a href="https://doi.org/10.1001/journal.org/">one</a> of the memorials written to celebrate his life.

At the time of the installation, the six by nine-foot piece was described as being located on the second level and hanging over the central staircase. Photos, such as the one from the <u>Public Art Archive</u>, show it in what appears to be another location within the building — apparently along an exterior window. So, it seems that the piece was moved at least once.

The same newspaper report by Kathryn McKenna Bolger that describes the stairway location and the cosponsorship with the Friends (*Austin American Stateman*; June 3, 1979; p. H10) also tells us that Priour worked on the piece for a year. Bolger notes the relative freedom given the artist. He was asked to coordinate the glass colors with the colors of the library interior but was otherwise to work with creative independence.

Bolger writes in the *Statesman* piece, "Patterns of light and color are forever changing as the library visitor walks around the work. The rust, gold and green tones glisten [and] seem to be in motion." Bolger also cites the, "symbols of knowledge, unity, inquiry and mystery — all brought into the library atmosphere by its patrons."

Austin Public Library staff confirm that the current location continues to be the Faulk Building. *Question Mark* is on the southeast corner of the first floor and is visible outside the library from the intersection of Guadalupe and 8th Streets.

#### Our First Hundred Years Continued.....

The Faulk Building has been repurposed from being the central library to space used by the Austin History Center, so there is no expectation of the piece being lost as public art. The Branch's gift to the community lives on.

## Support the Centennial Celebration: Have Your Business Card Ready



#### Report from the Contemporary Literature Book Group

I think Culture & Cuisine was the very first. As activities such as bridge and art tours were added, it seemed appropriate to change the name from study to interest groups. Contemporary lit met at night because many members had day jobs. The first Monday night of the month September to May has been this book group's night since its beginning. As the branch and interest groups have matured, so have we. Even though we no longer like to drive at night, we still need a book group that meets at night. We are all great techies well, email & Zoom!), so we still meet on the first Monday evening of the month at 7 p.m. but on Zoom.

There can be exceptions! Monday, September 4, 2023, is a holiday and no one has to work, so we are going to meet in person in broad daylight (11:15 a.m.) at BJ's Brewhouse/Restaurant (10515 Mopac Expressway) for some lunch and some book talk. **Ann Berasley** will facilitate the discussion of *The Cartographers*. The buzz about this book is huge, and if you haven't read it, you have plenty of time before September 4. It was suggested last year that interest groups do a service project that related to their area of activity, but CL didn't get its act together. We started early this year, and we have created a framework and more for organized opposition to book bans at public and public school libraries. Our focus will primarily be HB 900 (sex and sexuality mentioned in any context in both textbooks and library books) which the governor signed into law the minute it reached his desk. #### Reports from the 2022-23 Fellows

In May 2022, the Austin branch awarded fellowships to three University of Texas doctoral candidates. In accepting the funds, each agreed to report to the branch about how she used the fellowship. These reports explain the work they accomplished in the past year. All of the women thanked branch members for the fellowship funds and the honor of being named a recipient.

**Patrizia Perazzo** completed her last year of graduate school in Counseling Psychology. Her dissertation is entitled "The Venezuelan Diaspora: The experience of immigrants in the U.S. fleeing the political and economic crisis in Venezuela." One of her program's requirements is to complete a one year full-time clinical internship. She was matched to an internship in Houston and used the fall fellowship funds to make the transition. She used the second half of the award to pay her dissertation research participants who completed one-to-one interviews. It was important for her research participants to be paid for their time and effort because they were crisis migrants from Venezuela. She



will graduate in August and has accepted a post-doctoral position working as a psychologist for the University of Houston College of Medicine. She is grateful for the financial support the branch provided.

**Emily Lessig** used the fellowship to continue her dissertation work on the neural basis of context-dependent social behavior. It allowed her to focus on several research projects examining how the brain processes and responds to socially salient information when exposed to familiar versus unfamiliar individuals and competing stimuli. The fellowship provided support for her to present her research findings at conferences. During the year, she expanded her involvement in DEI efforts where she now serves as the graduate assistant for the Student Engagement and Outreach Office. She is the Senior Student Associate for UT Austin's Summer Research Academy. That work helps



others achieve their research and educational goals. She is passionate about that work and will continue supporting it in her academic career.

**Maria Roxana Loza** is a doctoral candidate in the English Department. Her dissertation is entitled: "Shelter(ed) Childhoods: Mental Health and Immigration in Lantinx Children's and Young Adult Literature." The AAUW support allowed her to focus on job applications during the academic year while she continued her research and writing. She secured limited child care for her two young children to free up time for writing. She applied for three tenure-track jobs in Texas (Texas State, Baylor, and Southwestern). She received a job offer for a tenure-track job in Children's Literature at Texas State but financial constraints prevented her accepting it. She has postponed



her graduation to make another round at the academic job market in the coming academic year as she continues to work on her dissertation.
