Meet the AAUW Austin Branch Fellows for 2025-2026

Vicki Deng

Vicki Deng is a Ph.D. candidate in Molecular Bioscience. Her dissertation is titled “Bioinspired Materials and Cellular Innovation: Lessons from a Giant Single-Celled Algae.” She explores the unique biology of the single-cell algae, *Caulerpa*. Upon injury, *Caulerpa* secretes a gelatinous substance that hardens into a protective plug. Vicki discovered a novel enzyme that forms this wound plug, laying the groundwork for developing algal-derived adhesives as sustainable medical biomaterials. As a first-generation college and Ph.D. student from an immigrant family, she has experienced firsthand the barriers underrepresented individuals face in STEM. Mentorship has been key to her success, and she is committed to paying it forward. She plans to apply her interdisciplinary expertise to develop bioinspired solutions for climate change and food scarcity. She aims to translate fundamental scientific discoveries into real-world applications by working at a national lab or company. Her three most outstanding achievements are:

- (1) breaking barriers to be the first in her family to attend college and graduate school while serving as primary caregiver for her immigrant family;
- (2) leadership in collaborative scientific discovery illustrated by uncovering the process behind *Caulerpa*'s wound healing;
- (3) commitment to mentoring the next generation and making science accessible by designing and teaching science courses for middle schoolers, and winning the Planet Forward Award for her journalism on scientific research.



Paula Lezama

Paula Lezama is a candidate in the Latin American Studies department working on her dissertation titled “Conocencia: Women’s Demonic Lifeways and Autonomous Social Reproduction in the Colombian Black Pacific.” She first encountered *Conocencia* when attempting to visit their territory as a volunteer in 2015. She uses qualitative and quantitative methods to understand rural Afro-descendant women’s experiences. She wants to pursue a dual career path as a faculty member in a research university while continuing her advocacy work with Rios Unidos and similar grassroots initiatives, contributing to the global fight for racial justice and gender equity. She considers her three most significant achievements to be:

- (1) achieving social mobility through education and providing her children with better opportunities;
- (2) her journey of healing trauma and facilitating the healing of family;
- (3) building meaningful connections with grassroots organizations grounded in empathy, mutual care, and commitment to social justice.



Carolyn Watkins

Carolyn Watkins is a doctoral candidate in the Chemical Engineering department. "Engineering Sequence-defined Peptomers for Targeted Chemotherapeutic Codelivery" is the title of her dissertation. Her project aims to improve current drug delivery mechanisms for small molecule chemotherapeutics to limit off-target toxicity and associated side effects. Most cancer patients undergo combination therapy, where multiple types of drugs are administered on different dosing schedules. Her new technology enables more targeted delivery to improve drug bioavailability, reduce side effects, and allow for coadministration, decreasing patient burden and promoting adherence.



Carolyn plans to pursue a career in the biotechnology or pharmaceutical industry, hopefully in cancer research. Outside of research, she hopes to use her position in the industry to advocate for improving general treatment accessibility.

Her three most outstanding achievements thus far are:

- (1) receiving a National Science Foundation cancer research grant;
- (2) mentoring four undergraduate students who are going on to achieve great things;
- (3) finding balance in graduate school to pursue non-academic passions such as playing ice hockey in an adult league and volunteering as a run club pacer.

April Meeting Recap

At the April program meeting, branch member Dr. Linda Quintanilla talked about her book, *Warriors for Social Justice and Equality*, and the long process to get it published. The book is based partly on interviews with Mexican American activist Maria Jimenez, where Linda learned how Maria came to work for social justice. Originally, Linda had titled her book "Soldiers for Social Justice," but Maria suggested changing "Soldiers" to "Warriors," and Linda agreed because the word soldier has a military connotation.

Linda's thesis is that the fight for social justice promoted equality. She explained the history of discrimination against Mexican Americans since the 19th century. The Rodriguez case in 1897 gave Mexican American immigrants the right to be naturalized even if they lacked education. Linda talked about the lynching of Mexican Americans – including children – by white vigilantes in the early part of the twentieth century. In a 1954 case, *Hernandez v. Texas*, the Supreme Court extended 14th Amendment protections to Latinos.


Maria Jimenez was born in Mexico but moved to Texas as a child. She became an activist to help immigrants become citizens. She was very concerned about the militarization of the border. She worked to get justice for the family of 14-year-old Esequiel Hernandez, a shepherd and U.S. citizen who was killed by Marines in 1997.



Linda used Critical Race Theory (CRT) and conflict theory to prepare her dissertation for a doctorate in educational leadership and cultural studies. In 2006, she began working with the North Texas Press to publish her dissertation. She sent the publisher a draft in 2017 but did not hear back for two years. Other delays followed, which were associated with copy editing. In late 2024, she was given two weeks to create an index and make corrections. The book was published in February 2025. Copies of the books can be ordered at www.tamupress.com, by calling 1-800-826-8911, or by scanning the QR code. There is a 30% discount using **code 3B** at checkout. Linda leads The Central Book Group, and they will discuss her book at the June meeting.

At least half a dozen of our members were there, along with approximately 3000, as counted for the public school rally! I met several women I know in the morning, when the crowd was smaller and audio was better, but it was all great!



From Red, Wine, and Blue: Use this [CALLING TOOL](#) to call both your Senators today. Tell them that we will not stand for Congress passing this bill, which restricts access to voting more than any law has done before! The Federal **SAVE** Act would require a passport or a birth certificate that matches your current name, in person, to register to vote or to update your voter registration for any reason. It would also end online and mail-in voter registration and voter registration drives. It would keep tens of millions of us from voting in future elections.

Per AAUW-TX, there are also Texas versions of the **SAVE** Act. HB 5337 was heard and left pending in the Texas House Elections Committee on April 24th. It is the same as SB 16, the Senate version that already passed out of the Senate. Call your legislator today and tell them that SB 16 & HB 5337 hurt married women. Over 12 million Texans don't have the necessary documents readily available—staff in the Chair Representative. Shaheen's office cited work with the Secretary of State to assure this will not be a problem.


